

Deer Hunters May Enter Private Area

Prineville—Under a new private land game and conservation corporation, more than 900,000 acres of privately-owned forest and ranch land in central Oregon will be opened this year to deer hunting. The area is principally in Deschutes, Wheeler and Crook counties. The land, mostly owned by Hudspeth Land and Livestock company, has been closed to sportsmen for several years. \$25 Permit Under an arrangement with the new land corporation, hunters will be permitted on the private land after purchase of a \$25 permit following purchase of the regular state hunting license and deer tag. Permits will be issued on a limited basis for 12 separate areas considered as prime deer hunting locations, according to Ronald Hudspeth, spokesman for the corporation. All land covered by the organization has been posted with signs bearing the corporation insignia and is fenced, Hudspeth said. Special Patrolmen Fees received from permit sales will finance the project, including the salaries of 20 special patrolmen deputized as law enforcement officers. Hudspeth said the corporation rules do not apply to land in the public domain, including national and state forests and land under control of the Bureau of Land Management. Permits were scheduled to go on sale Monday at Prineville outlets or by mail.

The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors. Selma S. — I want to go out with older boys. Mrs. L. S. — We're afraid she'll get into trouble. Selma S. — I am 15, but very mature for my age. Sometimes I am taken for 19 or 20. That's my problem. My parents don't want me to go out with any boys over 18. I find these boys very babyish and silly. Besides, I look silly with them, as though I'm their grandmother. Wherever I go, older boys become interested in me. Recently I met one of 23. It was at a big party for a girl of 17 and there were several older fellows there. I made a date with this fellow without his knowing how old I was. Later, when I told him, he said it didn't matter since I was so mature for my age. But my parents don't want to let me go out with him. Mrs. L. S. — My husband and I are really worried about Selma. Why would a 23-year-old college graduate want to go out with a little high school girl of 15? It is true that Selma can, at times, dress up to look like a 20-year-old glamor girl. But when she talks to boys she is very childish and silly. I've listened to her and I know. Of course, sometimes she can put on the dog and act a more sophisticated part for about five minutes. Then it peters out. We realize that this is a hard period for Selma and at times we think we are being a bit too rigid with our no-boys-over-18 rule. But we're afraid Selma might get into trouble if we relax the rule. The Council: We wish we knew a rigid rule that would answer once and for all the question of how to handle teenagers. But we're afraid there just isn't such a thing. Parents must play it by ear. Too many rules, too much rigidity inspires many teenagers to complete rebellion. They may protest little to their parents yet they proceed to do just as they please. Others may rant, rave and threaten to disobey the rules — and yet abide by them. Such youngsters actually get a great feeling of security from knowing what the rules are and adhering to them. The fact that Selma contests her parents' wishes in this matter is a fairly good sign. She probably unconsciously wants her parents' protection from the older men. She wants to assure herself that there is a good reason to resist the temptation they constantly present. She may admire their superior know-how, their cars and their money, but she undoubtedly has many fears about going out with them. The L. S.'s are right in their suspicion that it is rather odd for a 23-year-old man to be willing to go out with a 15-year-old. It is possible that this man is simply rather childish himself and has difficulty making friends with girls in his own age group. In any case, there is no special reason why Selma should go out with such a man. The L.S.'s should explain to Selma that this phase of her life will pass quickly and she can have many good times even with the "babyish and silly" younger boys. 'Oldest Pros' In Italy Observe Red Lights' Extinction With Champagne

Rome—The world's oldest profession became illegal in Italy yesterday. The last of the nation's 560 officially recognized brothels closed down with farewell champagne parties. The red lights went out officially all over Italy at 12:01 a.m. Closing the brothels will cost the government 21 million dollars a year in taxes. The last of the 2,800 women who worked in the brothels packed their belongings and went their own way. Simultaneously, an estimated 36,000 streetwalkers lost their state licenses and technically were unemployed. Special Measures The police planned special measures to combat illegal prostitution. A special women's police corps is planned to keep prostitutes off the street. The end of legalized prostitution gave white-haired Angelina Merlin, a member of Parliament, her greatest victory. She had fought for ten years for approval of the anti-prostitution bill bearing her name. Merlin Law The Merlin law provides for establishment of houses of rehabilitation for prostitutes. But so far, more than three-quarters of the licensed inmates of brothels have refused to take advantage of the provision. Mrs. Merlin said that Italy,

by joining most of the Western Nations in banning prostitution, had made "a jump to light." Many Italians preferred to wait and see what happened after prostitution is forced underground before passing final judgment.

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Argonne Scientist Denies Fallout Risk

Lemont, Ill.—A scientist at Argonne National Laboratory said a four-year experiment indicates there is little danger of bone cancer or leukemia in the present rate of fallout from nuclear bomb tests. Dr. Miriam P. Finkel, an associate biologist at the laboratory, made the report Friday night, based on the effect of strontium 90 on mice. The study was carried out under contract with the Atomic Energy Commission. Strontium 90 is a product of nuclear explosions and when taken into the body, settles in the bone. A recent United Nations report warned up to 2,000 persons yearly might develop leukemia due to fallout. Mrs. Finkel said she injected strontium 90 into 810 mice during the four-year test. Another 150 mice were used for control and received non-radioactive injections. "The lowest dose injected was above present fall-out levels," she said. "It did not increase the normal incidence of bone cancer or leukemia." However, Mrs. Finkel said the minimum dose which would be harmful to man probably is so much higher than present levels "that it is extremely unlikely to induce even one bone tumor or one case of leukemia."

Gypsy Rose Lee Watches Judge Disrobe In Court

Los Angeles—Gypsy Rose Lee, one of the country's most famous strip-tease dancers, went to court Friday and saw a judge and some lawyers do a bit of stripping. Superior Judge Red Hardy, taking note of the smog-clogged courtroom and near 90-degree weather, took off his judicial robe and invited lawyers and others in the room to shed their coats. "I don't blame anybody for wanting to peel on a day like this," said the fully-clad dancer who nevertheless declined to follow the judge's example. She appeared in court with her sister, actress June Havoc, who has filed suit for \$62,914 damages against J. M. Friedman and his wife, Edith, as the result of a business deal in which Miss Havoc claimed she lost nearly \$60,000.

Braley Found Guilty, Faces Death Penalty

Portland—Harry W. Braley, 36, Portland, was found guilty of first degree murder Friday afternoon by a circuit court jury here in the May 19 butcher knife death of Judith Violet Knutson, 37, also of Portland. The jury, which returned the verdict in 45 minutes, made no recommendations to the court. Since the jury did not recommend life imprisonment, Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson said the death penalty was mandatory under Oregon law. The Knutson woman was fatally stabbed in an apartment at 1223 Southwest Columbia.

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Geiger Air Base To Be Bomarc Site

Spokane—Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) said here Friday that Geiger Air Force Base has been selected as a proposed site for a Bomarc defense missile installation to cost more than 10 million dollars. He said the Air Force advised him through the Senate Armed Services Committee that construction of the installation was scheduled to be included in the budget request to Congress in January. Jackson said the ground-to-air missile will defend the Inland Empire radius, including Coulee Dam, Hanford and Fairchild Air Force Base.
