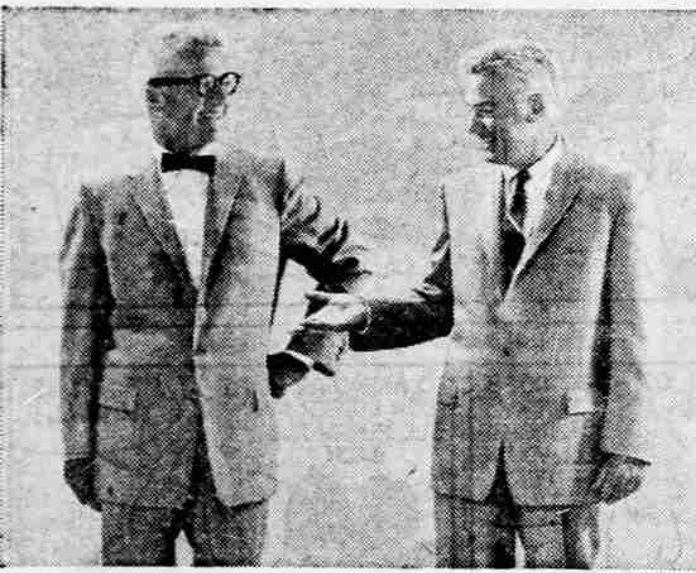

Baker, a Mormon elder, was accompanied by three men and a mongrel pup on the 60-day voyage from Redondo Beach to Maui Island on the raft Lehi IV, which ended Saturday night.

Mrs. Nola Baker, 39, gave her husband fair warning that she didn't plan to sit and stew if Baker goes on with plans to float from the Middle East to Central America.

"If he wants to take another trip, he has to take me along," she said. "I was snubbed on this one. They told me they had enough trouble without having a woman along."

Mrs. Baker and her daughters, Tammy, 18, and Jackie, 22, were scheduled to leave today for Hawaii where Baker and three crewmen stepped ashore on Saturday after a 69-day drift on the raft Lehi IV.

New York — (UPI) — CBS-TV's "Du Pont Show of The Month" ran off an experiment Sunday afternoon. A group of TV critics was invited to watch a dress rehearsal of "Harvey," a spectacular set for tonight over TV sets in the CBS of William Ewald files.

The aim of the venture was to give critics a chance to assay the show in advance. The idea is that a show of merit will attract more viewers if the critics recommend it.

Obviously, it's a little difficult at this date to view "Harvey" with a fresh eye. Elwood P. Dowd and his six-foot rabbit friend capered for four years on Broadway and again in the movies.

However, it's still a very serviceable vehicle and director George Seaefer has enameled the Mary Chase piece with pace and style. Whimsy can be awfully cloying and "Harvey" does have some limp moments in its serious scenes near the close. But it also packs a sufficient amount of engagingly wacky by-play to make it worth your time.

The cast is fine. Art Carney, Marion Lorne and Loring Smith carry most of the load and carry it beautifully.

EP Water District Penalty Assessment Policies Explained

Assessments are reported by due in two installments, on Feb. 1 and May 1 respectively. Both Flury and Mrs. Short stated Friday it was a district policy not to charge for delinquent payment of the first installment so long as the entire assessment was paid by the time the second installment became due.

This, Mrs. Short said, explained why she did not charge herself penalties in 1954 and 1956 either. In these two years, the records show, she did not pay the first installment on time but paid the entire assessment on March 30 and March 31 respectively.

In the case of the tract reportedly being sold by Ted Flury to Chet Flury, the records show similarly that in 1957 no first installment was paid before Feb. 1 but the entire assessment was paid April 3. No penalty was charged.
