

Group To Stay on Stand-By Basis

The executive board of the Jackson county branch of the Governor's committee on children and youth, which was active between 1950 and 1954, decided recently to continue on a stand-by basis.

At a recent meeting, the board reviewed its original purpose, which was to study the needs of children. Subgroups formed from the committee were the Jackson County Mental Health committee, employment of young people, and recreational needs and school health.

The Mental Health committee has met on a monthly basis since organized, and is currently organizing a volunteer family counseling service. The other subcommittees have ceased to meet, but there was a recent request for the

recreational report compiled by Dr. Alex Petersen, Southern Oregon college, the board said.

Fred Bruegger was chairman at the time the committee decided to suspend holding regular meetings. He noted that if a future need arises, the organization can be reactivated for study.

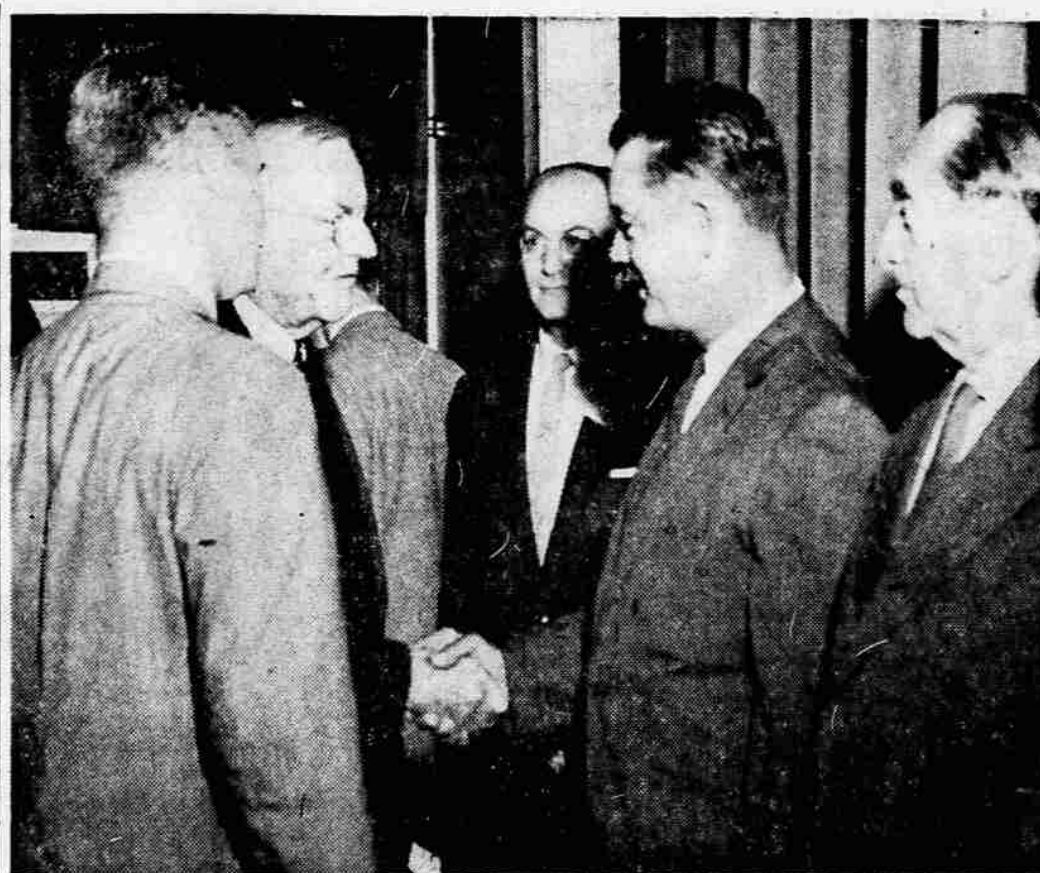
Bruce Nelson, in a talk entitled, "Talk, Talk, Talk," said some people can talk too much and others not enough or soon enough.

Dr. Richards Takes Oath as Delegate to UNESCO Meeting

Dr. John R. Richards, chancellor of the Oregon state board of higher education and chairman of the U. S. national commission for UNESCO, recently was complimented by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Dr. Richards recently was administered the oath as a member of the U. S. delegation to the 10th session of the general conference of UNESCO which will be held in Paris Nov. 4-Dec. 5. The U. S. National commission for

UNESCO interrupted their annual meeting to attend ceremonies of the oath administration.

Dulles noted that the National commission advises the government in the development of U. S. policies toward UNESCO, and the U. S. delegation to the general conference is the means whereby such policies are carried out.

Pleased With Delegation
Dulles said he was pleased that the delegation included "so many members of the national commission, including Dr. Richards, and that it has been possible to arrange a joint meeting between the entire national commission and the delegation."

At the joint meeting, the commission and delegation developed the U. S. position on the international program proposals for 1959-60. As approved by the general conference, the proposals will govern UNESCO's activities for the next two years.

Dulles said the state department appreciated the effective work of the national commission, and the work of the delegation will benefit from recommendations of the commission.

"True peace with justice must rest upon a greater measure of intellectual and moral understanding among all peoples. Your work in the national commission and the work of our delegation are powerful forces increasing that understanding," Dulles said.

Churches Fail, Graham Declares

Charlotte, N. C.—Evangelist Billy Graham said Monday night modern-day churches have failed to obey God's commandments because they have not spoken with the power and boldness of the early church.

Pacing the platform of the Charlotte Coliseum, Graham told 3,175 attending the second service of his crusade that "a handful of Communists are winning the world while 600 million Christians are losing it."

"Christ is the answer," he said, "to hatred, violence, prejudice and war."

"We will never win a changing world for Christ until we practice what we preach."

GENE AUTRY SUED

Hollywood—UPI—Cowboy actor Gene Autry was named today in a \$10,947 suit filed by public relations man Henry M. Fine, who claimed he was hired at \$300 a week to promote a rodeo at the Brussels World Fair. Fine said he was owed salary and entertainment expenses.

Novel Apple Pie Pillsbury Winner

New York—UPI—America's favorite dessert, apple pie, in a novel version won top prize money of \$25,000 today for Mrs. Don De Vault, 36, a mother of two from Delaware, Ohio, in the Pillsbury 10th Grand National Bake-off.

Mrs. De Vault, wife of a real estate man, won the grand prize for her "spicy apple twists," made from strips of pastry twisted around quartered apples and placing end down in a baking pan.

The 1958 version of apple pie is baked in a brief 20 to 25 minutes compared with 45 minutes required for ordinary apple pie.

Mrs. Lillian Jehlik, a legal secretary from Westchester, Ill., took second grand prize of \$5,000 for her "rich batter bread" recipe.

Escapee Returns To Avoid Weather

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Former Douglas Coroner Jailed

Roseburg—UPI—L. L. Powers, former Douglas county coroner, Monday was sentenced to 18 months in the state penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of conspiracy to commit a felony.

Mrs. Powers, indicted on a similar charge, also pleaded guilty but sentencing was delayed pending a pre-sentence investigation.

Indictments against the pair were returned Sept. 5 in connection with forged checks issued in the name of Chapel of the Roses, the mortuary business operated by Powers in partnership with E. L. Purdy of Portland. The conspiracy indictment accused Powers of conspiring to commit a felony against his business partner.

Purdy and Powers had operated the establishment since 1944 and Mrs. Powers was an employee of the firm.

Powers had been elected twice to the office of county coroner and had served more than five years in the office. He resigned on Aug. 27, citing poor health.

Pneumonia Blamed In Death of Youth
Portland—UPI—The coroner's office said today the immediate cause of death of Harold George Burgin, 18, Walla Walla, whose body was found in the YMCA last Wednesday, was pneumonia. Burgin was not identified until Sunday.

Berlin—UPI—A group of tourists from Communist China has arrived by air in East Berlin, the East German news agency ADN reported today.

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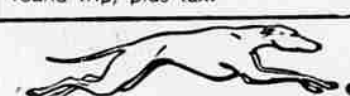
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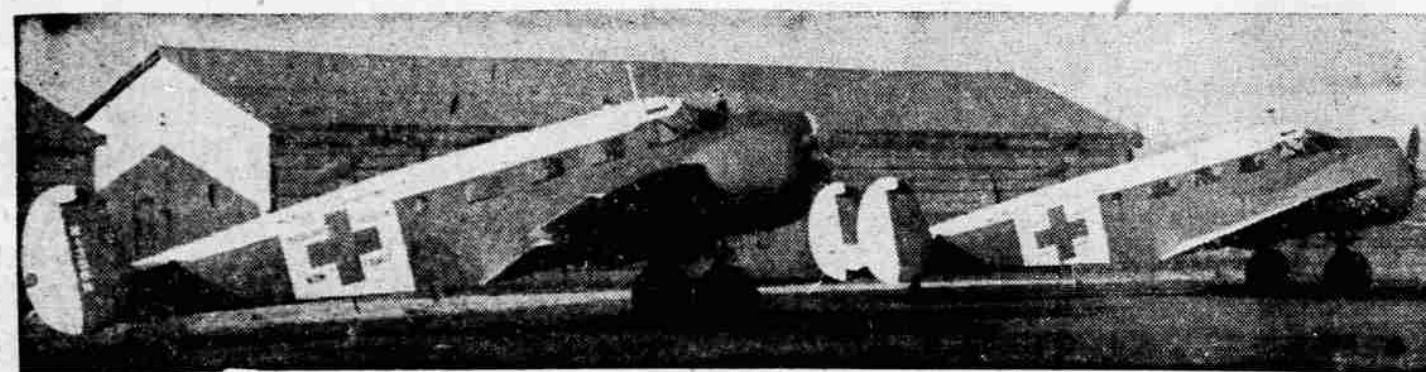
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
