Car in Accident Traveling West

A car operated by Jack Wayne Thornton, 24, of 971 Ross lane, Medford, was traveling west on Highway 238 near Bybee corner early Sunday morning when it was involved in an accident, according to state police. An earlier story said the Thornton car was going east.

Thornton's vehicle and one operated by Willis Ralph Huff, 20, of route 2, box 220, Medford, were involved in the accident.

Police said Thornton told them he and a car in front of him, both going west, had to pull off onto a shoulder because they saw another car approaching, passing another vehicle. Thornton was unable to get out of the way in time, and the cars collided, he told police.

Huff told police the accident occurred after he had completed passing the vehicle, police said. The impact of the collision forced Huff's car to leave the highway and strike a California Oregon Power company pole.

Four persons, including Huff, were injured in the accident.

Chaplain Mrs. Chet Wendt reported Mrs. I. M. Cuthbert as ill.

The legislative chairman announced candidates night for Oct. 23.

Roscoe Roberts was present to speak on insurance. Roberts is now agent for Josephine, Jackson, Klamath and Lake counties.

Promotion Program For Wood Explained At Medford Meeting

A promotion program for wood, particularly West coast lumber, was explained Monday evening at a regional meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's association at the Jackson hotel.

It was attended by nearly 60 representatives from Jackson and Klamath county lumber mills. H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of WLCA, Portland, told of the planned national wood advertising campaign and how it ties in with local production.

The campaign, the first million dollar project attempted by the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, will gear itself to the selling of lumber in all markets.

Simpson explained, with colored advertisements in family and trade publications, the organization's plan to build up its lumber market in the United States.

He also mentioned the technical division staff needed by the association to build up its lumber market in the United States.

Simpson explained a lumber grading rule change to conform to FHA requirements. He stated that the change, the removing of coarse grain lumber from standard grade, would not affect the local mills.

Also speaking at the dinner-meeting was Arthur W. Priaulx, public relations director, who showed the amount of public relations work done through the media of newspapers, magazine supplements, radio and television.

He mentioned plans by the association to further the use of woods in the construction of buildings for the Oregon centennial next year.

Master of ceremonies for the meeting was T. K. Oliver, Medford, Timber Products. Among those present were Emmett Stoddard, Portland, director of field service of WLCA; Harry Fimmel, Portland, assistant manager of the trade promotion department; Edward Thompson, of Portland, district supervisor of the West Coast Lumbermen's inspection bureau; and Frank Solter, Medford, district supervisor of the association.

The local meeting was the sixth district meeting in a series of 16 being held by WLCA. An average of two meetings are held in each district each year, it was explained, with additional ones scheduled as needs arise.

various fields not touched by the national association would be covered with advertisements by the regional associations.

Adams Resignation Speech Refers To Hearing Testimony

He referred to the Subcommittee on Legislative Oversight, headed by Rep. Over Harris (D-Ark.), which disclosed expensive gifts to Adams from his millionaire Boston friend, Bernard Goldfine, including a vicuna coat, the "loan" of an oriental rug and expensive stays in lavish hotel suites.

Testimony also showed that Adams had obtained information for Goldfine, a prominent textile manufacturer, from federal agencies with which Goldfine's mills and financial company were in trouble.

Implication Rejected

Democrats on the subcommittee charged, and reiterated after Adams' resignation speech, that the evidence did show Adams used "improperly" the power of his gift-giving friend.

Adams rejected any implication his departure constituted "retreating under fire."

President Eisenhower, in a letter of acceptance, said he agreed to the departure of his 59-year-old aide "with sadness, warm regard and highest esteem." He holds "complete trust, confidence and respect" for Adams.

The Maine election, in which Adams' affairs played a part and which resulted in an unprecedented Democratic sweep, brought simmering Republican resentment over Adams to the boiling point—particularly from GOP candidates and their party campaign leaders.

Sen. Andrew F. Schoepel of Kansas, chairman of the GOP Senatorial Campaign Committee, said bluntly that Adams' resignation was the "prudent and practical" course. He said since the Maine voting he had received "information that if Mr. Adams remained on it would be detrimental in many cases to the Republican cause."

Rep. Richard H. Simpson (Pa.), chairman of the House GOP Campaign Committee, said equally bluntly that Adams "should have resigned earlier."
