

Neuberger Sees Inflation Control

Salem, Ore.—(UPI)—Sen. Richard I. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Monday he will introduce at the next session of Congress a bill to give the President standby powers to impose drastic inflation controls.

Neuberger said his bill would permit the President to freeze prices, wages and profits. Controls would be imposed whenever the board of economic advisors reported inflation was reaching a point dangerous to the nation's economy.

Neuberger said that prices since the end of OPA in 1946

have gone up 61 per cent. He said prices have been going up steadily for the last two years and the present minor dip was due only to seasonal farm prices.

He also said that with such a heavy national deficit general tax cuts are "frivolous."

The Medical Roundup

One of the best books that has come across my desk for some time is "Lou and Your

Job," by Walter Lowen (Hawthorn Books, N. Y.). It is written by a man who has been this country's leading placement expert

about men: men who are hunting for a job and men who are interviewing an applicant. The book tells much about the difficulties that men have in getting and holding a good job. It tells of the many defects in character that wreck careers.

As Lowen says, many men in a business fall into a number of interesting categories. (1) The coddler who is constantly staying home to nurse himself at the first sign of a cough or a sneeze. He stays home, no matter how badly he is needed at his desk. Perhaps his desk is a miniature medicine cabinet. He is constantly spraying his throat, or filling himself with pills of several varieties. (2) The pious overtime worker who loafs through the day and then piously stays on after everyone has left. He mismanages his time, and thereby upsets the routine of the others around him. (3) The chest pouter who is forever trying to impress others with his own importance. He minimizes the work of others. (4) The windbag who likes the sound of his voice, so he talks long on the telephone, insists on talking too much at every meeting and conference. He wastes the time of his associates. (5) The bluffer who bluffs his way into a job, and then keeps on bluffing until he is found out. (6) The pacifist who is willing to go to any length for the sake of attaining peace. He sacrifices his own ideas instead of fighting for them. He agrees with everybody on everything. He never stands up for what he feels is right. (7) The filibusterer who is just the opposite of the pacifist. He goes about arguing with everybody about everything. He doesn't think any idea is good unless it is his own, and he keeps arguing until everybody is tired out. (8) The Gandhi Disciple who outwardly agrees but who inwardly resists. He agrees to what the boss says and then does as he pleases. He calmly ignores the wishes of his leaders. (9) The boozier, who drinks, and keeps a bottle in the drawer of his desk. He, of course, is not dependable in any way. (10) The "touchman" who is always borrowing from everyone. (11) The meek soul who dreads a responsibility. He may have ability, but he doesn't impress anyone with it. (12) Sloppy Joe who is careless about his personal appearance, and who comes to work in a frayed or dirty shirt. He often looks as if he needed a shave; his clothes need pressing, and his shoes need shining.

(13) The green pasture kid who is forever complaining about his job, about his superiors, and about his salary. He thinks that there are greener pastures somewhere else. He envies the hard workers around him for what he thinks are their "lucky breaks." He wonders why he isn't getting ahead faster and earning more. (14) The babbler who talks anywhere and everywhere about his firm's private business affairs. He doesn't realize that the word "confidential" means.

Artificial Hands, Noses and Ears

Many persons in this world

are much distressed because they have lost an arm or an ear or much of the nose through some accident. Very skillful plastic surgeons, of course, can build an ear or they can put on a nose, but some persons who, for a time, cannot afford the operation, can get great help from having what is called a prosthesis made. This is a nose or an ear or a hand or arm made out of plastic or a combination of waxes. Years ago, Dr. Arthur B. Bulbain, Director of the Fine Medical Museum in Rochester, Minn., developed methods for making noses and ears and hands so realistic that one can hardly tell them from the normal. I remember one day standing in the Museum alongside of some people who were arguing. One said that the specimen of the hand that they were looking at in a case was made of a wax-like substance, perfectly painted, while others maintained that nobody could fool them; they knew that it was a real hand.

I see now that another person is making prostheses for people, particularly those who have lost an arm or a hand. Her name is Lillian Bettenger. She has a laboratory at 33 West 42nd st., New York 18, N.Y. Anyone interested can write her for a folder which will show what type of work can be done to help handicapped people.
