

# Fanning Bee Sets Record As Phils Triumph 3-2, 1-0; Orioles Beat Senators 2-0

That was quite a fanning bee in Philly, but no one could buzz the ball by Richie Ashburn, who regained the National League batting lead with a .343 figure.

A total of 38 strikeouts—which set two major league records—were registered Monday night as the Phillies swept a two-night twin-bill from the Pirates. The Phils won the 14-inning opener 3-2, and the nightcap, 1-0.

Ashburn was one of the few players on both clubs who didn't strike out once. He collected two hits in six trips during the opener and went four for four in the finale to boost his average five points and move ahead of San Francisco's Willie Mays, who is second with .342.

**Fan 21 Pirates**

Three Philadelphia pitchers—Seth Morehead, Dick Farrell and Jack Meyer—contributed to a record in the opener when they struck out 21 Pirate batters. That broke the previous record of 20 strikeouts set by St. Louis Browns' pitchers in a 15-inning game against the Washington Senators July 25, 1913.

Morehead fanned 12 in 9 innings, Farrell 2 in 2 innings and Meyer, the winner, 7 in 3 innings, including the first six men to face him.

Ronnie Kline went the route for Pittsburgh and had five strikeouts himself. He gave up the winning run in the 14th on singles by Bobby Young, Ed Bouchee and Dave Philley.

In the nightcap, Jack Sanford of the Phillies struck out 10 more Pittsburgh batters while pitching a seven-hitter and notching his 10th victory. **Break '57 Record**

Sanford's 10 victims, coupled with the 21 in the opener, set another record of 31 for a doubleheader that included an extra-inning game. The old record was set by the Dodgers and Cubs in a June 30, 1957, doubleheader that totaled 20 innings.

Bennie Daniels, the loser, struck out two and gave up the only run of the game in the seventh inning. Ashburn bunted safely, then stole his 29th base and came around on Ted Kazanski's single off second baseman Bill Mazeroski's glove.

Chief Pirate strikeout victims were Kline, who fanned

five straight time in the opener, and Bob Skinner, who went down on strikes four times in the first game.

Only Pittsburgh players who didn't strike out all night were Dick Groat, who played only in the first game, and Ted Kluszewski, who grounded out in a pinch-hitting role in the ninth inning of the nightcap.

**Still Can't Score**

The Baltimore Orioles beat the last-place Washington Senators, 2-0, in the only other major league game scheduled.

It marked the fourth straight game in which the Senators were blanked by the identical 2-0 score. That tied them for the major league record and they can set a new one if they are whitewashed again tonight.

Bob Nieman produced both of Baltimore's runs with a Texas league double off loser

Russ Kemmerer in the third inning. Hal (Skinny) Brown held the slumping Senators to six hits and allowed only two runners to reach second base as he gained his seventh triumph.

Strikeouts? Only a handful compared to the total in Philadelphia. Brown fanned five while Kemmerer and reliever Tex Clevenger struck out one apiece.

### Eagles Figure They Can Win With Van Brocklin

This dispatch on the 1958 prospects of National Football League teams.

Philadelphia—(UPI)—The Philadelphia Eagles, with only 11 victories in their last three National Football League campaigns, balance their "haves" against their "have nots" and the scales tip in favor of general improvement this year.

The Eagles have a new coach in Buck Shaw, a veteran of the NFL competition and they have what has been absent in recent seasons, a new winning quarterback in Norm Van Brocklin. Van Brocklin was one of the league's standouts for many seasons with the Los Angeles Rams.

Now, with the league season about to begin, the sunup is improvement over last year, a challenger which can whip any team in the league but not quite a first-plac club.

**Pass Attack Should Click**

"We can win a lot of games with Van Brocklin," Shaw said. "We have the receiver for his passes, and that improves our running game. Our defense looks good. Our weak weakness is in reserves."

Shaw, who replaced Hugh Devore for the 1958 campaign, looked to the "haves" for what appears almost certain to be an improvement over recent years, possibly

the club's first winning season since 1954. The Eagles would like a good record to mark their move to Franklin Field. They formerly played their home games in smaller Connie Mack Stadium.

**Returning Vets**

A flock of veteran Eagles are present and Van Brocklin needs the newcomers. Rookie Walt Kowalczyk, the All-America halfback from Michigan State, appears set to make good as a pro. Other new Eagles are Ed Meadows, a versatile ex-Chicago Bear who can be used at four different positions; rookie tackle Prober Jacobs of California and Ron Sabal of Purdue, and Don Owens, a tackle obtained from the Washington Redskins.

Bob Pelligrini, former Maryland All-America who has one pro season under his belt, is slated to finish a military service stint in October and be ready for guard or center duty.

Key players who were with the team last year include Chuck Bednarik, a veteran linebacker with a new lease on life as an offensive center; halfback Clarence Peaks running better than last year; halfback Billy Barnes, also on top fettle; Tommy McDonald at the flanker back for pass catching; and Bobby Walston, and Jess Richardson, an experienced lineman who was injured in the first 1957 exhibition game.

Miller could take the league earned run championship without going near the mound during this final week, but he'd like to try to boost his record to 500.

Little Stu has allowed only 46 earned runs in 172 2/3 innings for an ERA of 2.39—by far the best in the league. But his teammates didn't come through with the support he needed this season, so his record stands at six wins and eight losses.

Manager Bill Rigney agreed to let Miller go after the two wins needed to even his record before the season ends.

### Sport Parade

New York—(UPI)—College football coaches are split on the excitement value of the new extra-point rule but, in the battle for patronage against the wide-open pro game, they see a return to free substitution and goal posts on the goal line.

Free substitution, as the platoon system, was chopped down on the theory it would reduce the effectiveness of the football factories loaded with manpower. But, as it developed, the smaller schools were hurt more than the major powers.

The rules were eased this year to permit any player to return once in each quarter—instead of merely permitting the return of starting players.

"But some small conferences have made their own rules, permitting free substitution," says Lou Little, "and we will go back to it soon for everybody without a shadow of doubt."

**Doesn't Like It**

As for the extra-point rule giving one point for a kicked conversion and two points for a run or pass conversion, Buff Donelli, who succeeded Little at Columbia, calls it "a ridiculous rule."

"I don't see where it adds any excitement," he claims. "You still merely have the old question of 'did he make it or not?'"

Bob Ingalls, the former Michigan center now head coach at Connecticut, can't

see all the concern over the extra point.

"We scored six touchdowns last week," he explained. "We kicked one point. We were successful running for two others in five tries. That totals up to five points. That's a good average even if we had tried six kicks."

**More Field Goals**

Harry Wright, known as "The Horse" in his Notre Dame days and now coach at Kings Point, is one of those who feels the new conversion rule does add excitement for the fans.

"It's also going to put the foot back into football," he analyzed. "Meaning they'll have to bring the goal posts back up to the goal line to give you an added incentive for field goals."

Wright's theory is the field goal becomes a weapon to offset the unbalanced extra-point payoff.

"I know we'll go for the field goal as quickly as we can," he explained. "If we get down to within 15 yards and it doesn't look as if we can score, we want those three points. Then, if we do score, the heat is off the question of whether we go for one or two on the conversion."

The Dodgers can lift themselves out of sixth place at the expense of the Cards by whipping the St. Louis team tonight and again Wednesday in their final meeting of the season.

After a rest Thursday, the Dodgers return for a twin-nighter with the Cubs and a matinee on Saturday, winding up their first year away from Brooklyn.

Alston was expected to give the folks a chance to see his rookies in action. A group of the newcomers were called up on Los Angeles' final swing through the East.

General Manager Buzzie Bavasi said the rookies were called up to give them a chance to "get their feet wet."

The group included Ron Fairly, Don Miles, Frank Howard, Roger Craig and Bob Lillis. Fairly and Lillis have played well in their appearance with the parent club.

### Sonny Ray Underdog Wednesday

New York—(UPI)—Light heavyweight contender Jesse Bowdry is favored at 3-1 to beat Sonny Ray in their fight at Chicago Stadium Wednesday night.

Despite the odds, this 10-round shapes up as the most significant bout on the week's boxing schedule. It should include how much young Bowdry of St. Louis has improved recently.

Jesse, 21, is ranked sixth among contenders. Ray, 22, is unrated.

Ray of Chicago beat Bowdry in two of their three previous bouts, but he is an underdog this time because of Bowdry's unbeaten string of 11 starts since his last fight with Ray.

In their series, they divided two decisions in 1956, and Ray knocked out Jesse in the second round, July 24, 1957. Bowdry's 23-20 record includes 19 knockouts. Ray's 17-55 list includes six kayoes.

**Lightweight Scrap**

Friday's fight at Washington, D.C., brings together lightweights Gale Kerwin of Valley Stream, N.Y., and Frankie Ryff of New York. Neither is rated.

The Giants have virtually nailed down third place in the National League—and second is beyond reach. With five games remaining, one Giant victory or one Cincinnati defeat gives San Francisco undisputed third.

But Mays and Miller have plenty of work cut out for them tonight and Wednesday against the Cubs and Friday, Saturday and Sunday against St. Louis.
