Bull Run Area Recreation Urged

Portland — (UPI) — If watershed safeguards are guaranteed, Portland may offer a corner of the Bull Run Reserve for recreation, it was indicated Tuesday.

Mountain and sports groups for more than 25 years have urged the opening of a south-east area of about 19,000 acres for public use.

The city council supported Water Engineer H. Kenneth Anderson's insistence on a protective fence and firebreak clearing before the area would be surrendered. Utilities Commissioner Nathan A. Boody, with the council's endorsement, said he would lay the proposal before the U. S. Forest Service next week.

The Bull Run area under consideration is in the southeast corner of the 138,000-acre protected watershed and out of the actual drainage area. The heavily timbered land, some 36 square miles of it, is crossed by four mountain streams, all emptying into the Sandy river rather than the Bull Run.

The U. S. Forest Service would take over the area as a recreational adjunct to the Mt. Hood National Forest.

No Incomplete Report Made on Basin Project

He emphasized that the Portland district office has made no partial report or incomplete report to higher authority in Washington, D.C., and added that "no report will be made until completion of studies and public hearing have been accomplished."

"My report," he continued, "will be reviewed by the division engineer, North Pacific division, the chief of engineers, and the board of engineers for rivers and harbors. Upon completion of review by the division engineer, a public notice approved by the chief of engineers will be issued by the division office."

"That notice will contain information as to the findings and recommendations of the district and division engineers. If the people concerned are not satisfied with those findings and recommendations they may appeal to the board of engineers for rivers and harbors. That office will receive comments and suggestions and may hold a public hearing if conditions warrant," he said.

Final Recommendations
The final recommendations of the chief of engineers, Colonel Winegar, said, will be based on the recommendations of the district and division engineers unless modifications are made by the board of engineers for rivers and harbors.

Colonel Winegar said "It is the policy of the chief of engineers that the desires of local interests be given full consideration in formulation of plans and recommendations. Recommendations for construction of economically feasible projects are made only when a majority of the people concerned in the area would be affected by those projects are in agreement that the project is needed and wanted."

"The local people in a potential project area thus have the final responsibility to determine whether economically feasible projects will be recommended."

Sen. Morse Urges Special Session
Portland — (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) says Democratic leadership of Congress should call a special session to deal with the Quemoy problem.

Morse, in a letter to Robert Nathan, national chairman of Americans for Democratic Action, said he thought liberals made a mistake three years ago in supporting the Formosa Resolution which he opposed.

He said he and Sen. Herbert Lehman warned "that its adoption could easily bring the nation into a war unsanctioned by Congress. Three years later, we find ourselves on the verge, or brink, as Mr. Dulles prefers, of just such a war."
