Controlled Feeding Schedule for Hens

Storres, Conn. — (UPI) — Get sick, chick, or it's the sack. That's the word around the barnyard these days.

Poultry Scientist Edwin P. Singen of the University of Connecticut, has laid out a controlled-feeding schedule for hens to hold down their weight and make them more productive. Those who get too hefty get the axe.

Singen explained that the heavy meat-type White Plymouth Rocks used as layers to produce broiler-type chicks live longer and produce more eggs under this new feeding schedule.

Fat hens do almost as well so far as egg-laying is concerned, but on an unrestricted diet they have "lower efficiency" and their eggs are not as healthy as those from lean hens.

Outsiders Line Up To Enter Prison

San Quentin, Calif. — (UPI) — Some 2,000 San Francisco Bay area residents patiently stood in line to get into San Quentin prison one recent weekend.

The occasion was the state prison's first public art and crafts show. Fathers carrying babies and mothers tugging older youngsters shuffled through the prison recreation hall to view 450 entries—oils, water colors, drawings, pastels, tempera, sculpture, architectural design and various handicrafts. All were produced by inmates.

Many of the works were bought by visitors at prices ranging from 50 cents to \$100. More than \$1,000 was netted for the fund out of which prisoners receive money when paroled.

The show's grand prize went to Warren Parker's oil painting of a cell door in the prison's old Spanish cell block, which soon will be torn down.

Elmer Parsons, inmate-editor of the prison paper, said Parker's paintings are not for sale. "He's been promised a private showing when he got out," Parsons said. "People flip over his style."

Breakage of Paving Roller Overpaid

The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Clara J. — I want to move away from that woman.

Fred J. — She is just trying to punish me.

Clara J. — For some time before our marriage my husband carried on an affair with a woman who left town and has now, six years later, returned to live in our neighborhood. In the meantime, she has been married and her marriage has broken up. She is becoming part of our social circle, and I feel very uncomfortable about her presence.

I cannot help feeling that my father was the deciding factor in persuading my husband to give up the other woman so he could marry me. My father was then his employer and I was a "good catch." I do not believe my husband gave her up out of any upsurge of virtue or repentance.

I have asked Fred to move our home into another neighborhood where I would not be constantly confronted with her painful presence, but he not only disagrees but insists that he has every right to associate with her since, he contends, we have a great many mutual friends.

I brought a great deal to Fred in my marriage. But for my father's generosity, he could not have managed to start his own business. I feel I have every right to the consideration I am asking.

Fred J. — Clara is completely mistaken about Helen. I almost wish Clara's suspicious attitude were justified. Helen was very good to me and she gave me up when I told her that I had a chance to marry a girl who could insure my future.

Whatever Clara has done for me, she has been sure to let me know often enough to drive me to despair. I miss very much the warm affection I was accustomed to before my marriage, but Helen seems to have developed con-

tempt for me since we broke up.

If Helen would have me, I would gladly trade my prosperity for the happiness I used to know. The trouble is that if I were to ask Clara for a divorce, I would lose a great deal without gaining anything, since Helen shows no disposition to encourage me.

I would agree to move to another neighborhood if it would quiet Clara down, but I am sure it would not, since she would then accept my submission as proof of my guilt. I think Clara is pressing this point just to punish me for something she knew about before our marriage.

The Council: If ever there was a case where both man and wife are terribly wrong, this is it.

It appears that Clara was so eager to be married that she swallowed her pride for the moment, only to distort it into vengeance and nagging right after her marriage.

Fred was eager enough to make a good investment in marriage, but he had neither the good judgment nor the generosity to make an effort to persuade Clara that he loved her. He was, thus, just as cruel and vindictive as his wife. Now, both are trying to use the returned Helen as a club with which to hit the other over the head.

Both desperately need to find a touch of decency and kindness in their hearts, or they will continue to give each other the cruel punishment each has merited. Since both have been equally offensive, it may be difficult for them to find the virtue of forgiveness. But they are in for a miserable life together unless they relent and start anew.

As for divorce, it would leave both bankrupt and bitter. They should try their utmost to become human.

647 More Voters Have Registered

A total of 647 more voters have been registered since July 15, according to County Clerk Mrs. Bereth P. Hopkins.

Registration remains slow, she said. The total number of voters registered in the county as of today is 34,484, she said. This includes 17,391 Republicans and 16,341 Democrats, a margin of 1,050 favoring the Republicans. There are 752 with miscellaneous party affiliations, she said.

An estimated 14,000 additional citizens are eligible, but unregistered.

As of July 15, there were 17,173 Republicans, 15,935 Democrats, and 729 with miscellaneous party affiliations, making a total of 33,837 registered voters. The Republican margin at that time was 1,238.
