Morse Says Ike, Dulles Should Be Impeached if Acts Continue

'War-Mongering' Formosa Strait Policy Charged

Porter Calls for Special Session

Washington—UPI—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said today that President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles should be impeached if they persist in their "war-mongering" Formosa strait policy.

Morse bitterly attacked Dulles' New York speech Tuesday night in which the secretary warned that U. S. forces might be used more actively if the Chinese Communists intensified their attacks on Quemoy and other off-shore islands held by the Nationalists.

"This evil man, bent on war, must be checked if our nation's glorious record of never having been an aggressor nation is to be preserved," Morse said in a statement, called "irresponsible men."

Morse, in the strongest Democratic attack yet on administration Far East policy, said the American people "need to be warned that the President and Dulles have become irresponsible men by their war-mongering over the Quemoy and Matsus."

"The leaders of the Democratic party owe it to the American people to speak up in this hour of crisis," he said. "If Eisenhower and Dulles persist in their present foreign policy based upon warlike action over the Quemoy and Matsus, they should be impeached."

Morse branded Dulles' speech to the Far East-American Council of Commerce and Industry as a "shocking deception."

Morse, an original backer of Eisenhower for president who later bolted the GOP, said the United Nations should act to preserve peace in the area.

He also called for a special session of Congress to consider any agreement involving the off-shore islands.

Earle Fichtner Says He Will Withdraw

Earle Fichtner, Democratic nominee for sheriff of Jackson county, has announced he will withdraw from the election race.

He said personal reasons are responsible for his action. Up to early afternoon today, he had not filed his formal withdrawal papers at the elections division of the county clerk's office, but he told the Mail Tribune he definitely is out of the race.

Meanwhile, James Redden, chairman of the Democratic Central committee, was investigating the possibility of the committee naming another candidate to take Fichtner's place on the ballot. Under certain circumstances this is possible, but whether it is in the present situation is still not clear.

National Guard To Limit Sunday Drills to One

Oregon National Guard units will have no more than one Sunday "multiple drill" per month from now to June, it was reported today.

Units of the 41st Guard division recently began holding two multiple drill periods per month on Sundays. Some objection to this was made, through governmental channels, and the modification in training procedures has been made.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes conveyed this information this week in a letter to an Ashland woman who had written to him concerning the Sunday drills. It was also announced at the same time in Eugene by Congressman Charles O. Porter, who also had conferred with Army and Guard officers concerning the Sunday drills.

Realignment of Training

The "multiple drills"—that is, two four-hour drill periods in one day, for which Guardsmen are paid for two days of training—resulted from realignment of training along the "pentomic" organizational plan.

Guard officers have reported that opposition to the Sunday training periods has virtually died out among Guard personnel and their families, and also pointed out that a full day of field training is more valuable than short, evening drills once a week.

The new order, limiting Sunday drills to once each month, exempts July and August, when preparations for the two-week summer camp training period are being made.

Additional Sunday drills are possible only under special circumstances, and with prior approval of National Guard headquarters.

Strikes Postpone Chrysler Showing

Detroit—UPI—Widespread local strikes in the auto industry, marked by violence for the first time Thursday night, were blamed today for postponement of the introduction of four lines of Chrysler Corp. cars.

A Chrysler spokesman said the company decided three weeks ago to delay introduction of its 1959 Imperials, Chryslers, De Sotos and Dodges because of the "erratic labor situation." The spokesman said introduction of Plymouths also might be postponed and unveiling of the other four lines further delayed if the situation does not clear up soon.

Dulles Puts War Or Peace Question Up To Communists

U. S. Said Ready To Negotiate Settlement

New York—UPI—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles put the question of war or peace in the Far East squarely up to the Communists Thursday night.

The United States, he said, is ready to negotiate a settlement with Communist China in the Formosa Strait.

At the same time, he warned U. S. forces may be used more actively if the Communists step up their attacks on Quemoy and other off-shore islands.

Position Flexible

"Although the United States is not prepared to retreat in the face of armed force, our position is otherwise flexible," Dulles said in a speech before the Far-East American Council of Commerce and Industry. The council is a non-profit association of businessmen dealing with Asia.

Washington diplomats were divided over whether Dulles was softening the U. S. position in the crisis or standing pat. Both possibilities found some support.

Willing to Settle

"We are prepared," said Dulles, "in accordance with our United Nations Charter obligation, to settle the dispute by peaceful means in such a manner that international peace and security, and justice, are not endangered."

The United States, he said, would "find acceptable any arrangement which, on the one hand, did not involve surrender to force or the threat of force, and on the other hand, eliminated from the situation features that could reasonably be regarded as provocative."

Dulles strongly defended the U. S. decision to help the Chinese Nationalists hold Quemoy, although doubt about the wisdom of this stand has been expressed in some Western quarters.

CP Post Office Dedication Set

A. M. Wellens, regional safety officer for the Post Office department in Portland, will represent the department at the dedication of the new Post Office building at Central Point Saturday. The public ceremony will begin at 1:30 p.m.

The Central Point Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the dedication, with John Smock in charge. Other speakers will include Mayor Don Faber of Central Point, and George Evans, superintendent of the Central Point office. Smock will be master of ceremonies.

The Crater High school band will assist in the program, as will the Boy Scout Troop 40 of Central Point. After the dedication ceremonies, guests will inspect the new office, and refreshments will be provided by the Jaycees.

The public is invited to attend the dedication, meet the postal officials and the staff of the Central Point office, and inspect one of the most modern post office buildings in Oregon, sponsors said.

The building is owned by Donald Faber, and is leased to the post office department for 10 years. It was constructed by C. V. Bower, Central Point contractor.

GOP To Intensify Registration Drive

Republican precinct workers in Jackson county have been urged to intensify their drive for registrations between now and Oct. 4, Donald L. Stathos, chairman of the GOP central committee, said today.

During the past two months Republican precinct workers have been contacting unregistered eligible voters and urging them to register. Several new registrars have been placed where the need exists, he said.

Stathos said transportation and baby sitting service is available for anyone who needs either in order to register.

He noted that apparently there still are thousands of unregistered eligible voters in the county, and reminded them that they must be registered to vote in the Nov. 4 general election by Oct. 4.

Orbit Success Of Navy Vanguard Is Undetermined

All Three Stages Fired Successfully

Cape Canaveral, Fla.—UPI—The Navy's temperamental Vanguard performed beautifully today but scientists could not confirm the weather-tracking satellite in its new orbit.

Four hours after the 7:38 a.m. (p.s.t.) firing an announcement from Washington said "sporadic signals have been received but all data available at this time will not allow confirmation or denial of the existence of an orbit."

Stages Fire Properly

All three stages of the Vanguard fired successfully and in proper sequence.

Navy men here were jubilant at the successful launching, but reminded that the odds on an orbit were about one chance in four.

If the tiny moon does orbit, the delicate instruments inside will be able to give the world the latest weather forecast including advance hurricane data.

For its observation mission, the satellite was equipped with two photocell "eyes," sensitive to red and near-infrared light reflections.

Because the tops of clouds and the earth's terrain reflect light differently, the photocells would be able to distinguish between the different light intensities and thus report what they see, the Navy said.

Best Possible Contrast

"Clouds reflect 30 to 80 per cent of the light striking them while land masses reflect about 15 to 20 per cent," the Navy said. "The near-infrared sensitive qualities of the photocells will provide the best possible contrast in detecting land, cloud and water masses."

A miniature tape recorder was tucked inside the satellite's instrument package. On a 75-foot loop of erasable tape, signals from the photocells would be recorded and would be transmitted back to earth during each orbit.

The Navy said the information would be "packed into a one-minute broadcast" and transmitted to Navy mini-track stations on a frequency of 208.3 megacycles.

The Navy said the satellite also would "allow meteorologists for the first time to develop a good theory on the flow of heat through our atmosphere and thereby improve long range weather predictions."

Fire Destroys Box Factory

White City Box company, operated by Joe Dix, Medford, in the Camp White industrial area, burned early today.

Central Point rural firemen contained the blaze in the two sections of the long former military warehouse structure that the business occupied. Fire broke out in the north section which was completely ablaze when firemen arrived. Exact origin had not been determined this morning.

North section of the building, which housed the box factory machinery, was described as a complete loss by firemen. They brought the fire under control about midway through the adjoining section in which stored box hook received water damage.

Blaze Under Control

The blaze was discovered about 3:30 a.m. and the alarm was turned in by Cascade Wood Products across Avenue G from the scene of the fire. Flames had extended through the roof of the box firm when the fire was discovered. Firemen brought the blaze under control about 5 a.m. and Rural Fire Chief L. C. Lisenbee stated that mopping up would continue most of the day.

Three pumpers and a tank truck were used in suppressing the fire. Fifteen volunteers from the rural department and eight from Central Point city fire department and 15 workers from nearby mills fought the flames.

The long one-story structure, owned by White City Realty company, is made up of several sections which are separated by concrete partitions. Other sections reportedly are in use for storage.

The building is just east of Agate rd. on Avenue G.

Garbage Dumps in County Toured

A tour of garbage dump sites in Jackson county was made yesterday by representatives of the planning commission, public health department and the county court.

The tour was in preparation for drawing up a proposed garbage dumping ordinance to be presented to the planning commission possibly at its meeting on Oct. 8, according to County Planning Technician Jack Eaton.

Eaton said in a majority of cases the group found open garbage dumps which are against a new state law. All garbage must now be covered with earth, Eaton explained.

Garbage dump sites visited included those of Ashland, the City Sanitary Service new dump near Jacksonville and the dump at the Siskiyou summit just west of Highway 99.

Those who made the tour were Jerry Latham and Ed Strother, members of the planning commission; Eaton; Orie Moore, city sanitarian; and County Judge Rodney Keating and County Commissioners Chester Wendt and Ralph James.

Mobile units will be at the Piggly Wiggly store, 745 Stewart ave. between 4 and 7 o'clock this evening, and at the Groceteria in Medford between 2 and 6 o'clock. A unit will be stationed at Ideal Drugs on Siskiyou blvd. in Ashland between 4 and 9 o'clock this evening.

Mobile units Saturday will be at the Big Y north of Medford between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., at Paulson's Thrift market, both in Central Point, between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., and at Ideal Drugs in Ashland between 1 and 7 p.m.

Council Paves Way For Purchase of Hospital Building

The Medford city council last night paved the way for prospective purchasers of the old community hospital building on East Main st.

It approved by a 6-2 vote the planning commission's interpretation of the zoning ordinance which would permit use of the building for "vocational office" purposes of any kind not involving the delivery, storage or display of merchandise on the premises.

The council also approved a 25-cent hike in garbage collection rates for the City Sanitary service. This was reportedly one-half the requested increase.

Amendment Passed

The council passed an amendment to the building code by which St. Mary's academy would be allowed to build a six-foot wire fence around its newly surfaced playground at South Holly and 12th sts.

On City Manager Robert A. Duff's recommendation, the council turned down a request from the Medford Public library board that a city emergency fund grant be made to finance restoration of the library's basement floor.

Duff recommended that temporary repairs be financed from the library's own funds at this time with the understanding that a special allocation might be made in next year's library budget for permanent repair.

Approve Amendment

The council also approved an amendment to the city's sign ordinance which would permit signs to be placed on rooftops without requiring that they be elevated. The action resulted from a request by Charles Bateman that he be allowed to erect a neon sign 50 feet long and four feet high atop his Richfield cafe, 2392 North Pacific highway, in such a way as to hide air conditioning ducts.

Council candidate Roy Wilkes addressed the council on the Lone Pine school's request to connect with the Grandview-Kenwood sewer, which is presently being installed.

He pointed out that since larger pipes in the project might be required to accommodate the school if the council approves the connection, action is necessary soon before the pipes now planned are installed.

Vernon Thorpe, public works director, asked time to investigate the matter, which first appeared before the council Aug. 21. He said that enlargement of the pipe might not be required, and that if necessary work could be postponed by the contractor on the particular pipe line involved.

Councilmen Don Hansen and Robert Van Sickle voted against approval of the hospital zoning interpretation. Hansen called it "a strained construction" and "not consistent with good planning."

Garbage Rate Boost

The garbage rate boost was approved by a 5-3 vote on condition that the increased revenue be devoted entirely to employees' salary adjustments and on the further condition that the City Sanitary service provide the council with comparative operational and financial statements each October.

Councilmen Ed Hall, Don Hansen and Jimmy Dunlevy voted against the increase.

The state traffic study, which apparently concerned uncontrolled intersections only, recommended a 25-foot set-back from the corner for fences over four feet high to allow safe visibility for drivers.

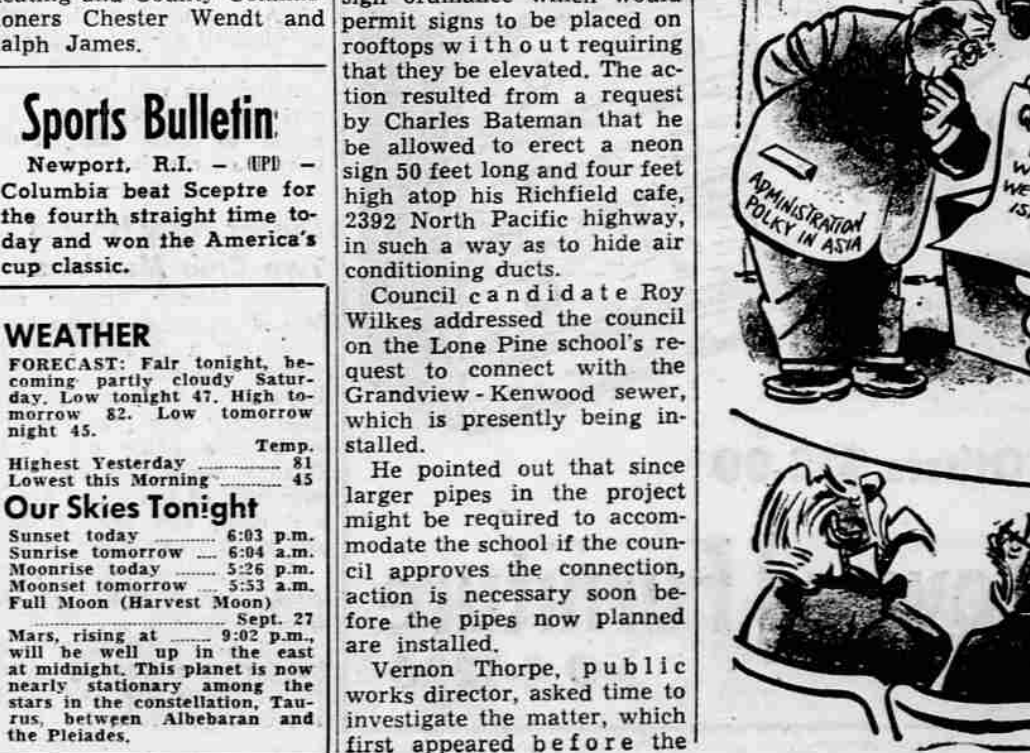
Other council business included approval of transferring a Class A Dispenser's liquor license to the present proprietors of Brown's cafe, 101 East Main st.

Coastal Areas Under Warning For Evacuation

Storm Expected To Hit About Midnight

Charleston, S.C.—UPI—Hurricane Helene, a massive tropical storm with winds of 100 miles an hour, roared today in the direction of the South Carolina Coast which was immediately put under "emergency" evacuation warning.

Another tropical howler, Ilsa, far to the south, was kicking up winds of 115 miles an hour.

Helene was expected to slam ashore in the vicinity of Charleston, clogged with shipyards and craft of all descriptions, about midnight.

A 2 p.m. (edt) 11 a.m. (pst) weather bulletin put the storm center 230 miles east of Brunswick, Ga., and contained fresh warnings to coastal residents, especially between Charleston and Cape Fear, to escape to high ground.

The urgent warnings sent hundreds of military aircraft in the danger zone hurrying inland, and the South Carolina state ports authority cancelled a scheduled Saturday dedication of facilities at Port Royal, S.C.

One of the biggest evacuations of military planes was from Hunter Air Force base, a strategic air command B-47 base. The fleet of big jets and refueling tankers took off for inland points.

Scores of installations on the coast began battening down.

The weather bureau made certain that plenty of advance warning was given on the storm. It had been criticized in some previous hurricanes for alleged lack of information.

High Tides Expected

"Safety precautions (for Helene) should be started immediately and completed by sunset," the weather bureau warned.

Dangerous winds and high tides were expected to sweep an area from Beaufort, S.C., to Wilmington, N.C., starting this afternoon.

"Storm tides and high seas will flood coastal lands... particularly from Charleston to Cape Fear to a height of four to six feet above levels reached by normal tides for this date," the weather bureau said. "In some local areas tides may be even higher."

Southeastern Red Cross headquarters rushed 10 disaster and field staff workers into strategic Georgia and South Carolina points. Evacuation centers will be set up along the coast.

Ilsa's position at 11 a.m. was 325 miles east northeast of San Juan, P.R.
