Oregon high school football teams swing into action in earnest this week end with many of the games counting in league standings.

The top clash of the night is between North Salem and South Salem, both of whom are rated top contenders in the Valley League.

Jefferson, the No. 1 team in the coaches' poll, is a favorite over Wilson while Marshfield, No. 2, plays host to Sweet Home.

Other top games on the agenda include Roseburg at Grants Pass, Ashland at Yreka, Calif., Redding, Calif., at Klamath Falls, Cottage Grove at South Eugene, North Bend at Springfield, La Grande at Lewiston, Idaho; Walla Walla at Pendleton, The Dalles at Pasco, Bend at Albany, Prineville at Corvallis, Redmond at Crater, Gresham at Beaverton, Clackamas at Astoria, St. Helens at McMinnville, Oregon City at Tigard, Lebanon at Newport, Union at Baker, Dallas at Forest Grove, Lake Oswego at West Linn, Newberg at Tillamook and Milwaukie at Central Catholic.

Lone 3rd Place Goal of Giants

San Francisco—UPI—San Francisco opens its final series of the National league season tonight with undisputed third place and the batting championship still at stake.

Johnny Antonelli will take the mound in the first of the final three games against the St. Louis Cardinals. He faces Bill Smith, who was just brought up from the Cardinal farm system.

Although the Giants need one more victory—or a loss by Cincinnati—to break the present tie for third, the fans will be cheering Willie Mays, specifically.

The flashy centerfielder has a two point bulge on Richie Ashburn of the Phillies—346 to 344—in their battle for the batting championship. Willie has batted .650 in his last twenty trips to the plate.

While Mays is trying to hold his own against Cardinal pitching, Ashburn will be hitting against the Pittsburgh Pirates, runners-up in the National league pennant race.

Oregon State Grid Club Tackles Kansas

Portland—UPI—Coach Tommy Prothro and his Oregon State Beavers seek to keep alive their record of never having lost a game on Oregon soil since Prothro took over in 1955 when they meet Kansas in an intercollegiate football clash in Multnomah Stadium Saturday night.

Game time is 8 p.m. A dry field is expected. Both Oregon State and Kansas took their lumps last week. The Beavers lost 21-0 to Southern California and Kansas lost by twice that amount, 42-0 to Texas Christian.

OSC Won Last Year
Oregon State trounced Kansas 34-6 last year at Lawrence, Kans.

The Kansas team was due in Portland about noon today and planned an afternoon workout at the stadium.

Oregon State was in fair shape for the game. Fullback Jim Stinette and lineman Spiro Anagnos were on the injured list and may not play but co-captain Jim Brackins was expected to be available for at least part-time duty at guard.

The game will feature the reunion of the 1933 Oregon State "Ironman" team which snapped a 25-game Southern California winning streak here by tying Southern California 0-0.

SOC Might Need High-Geared Offense To Tip Thunderbirds

Ashland—If the Red Raiders of Southern Oregon college cannot polish up their defense, it looks like the men of SOC will have to try and out-offense the visiting Canadians when they clash with the University of British Columbia football eleven tomorrow night on the SOC turf.

All week long the Red Raiders have been hammering on the defensive alignment to try and come up with a workable and stable unit that can show more than was evidenced in action last week.

There also has been some changing around in the backfield but so far the starting unit of Lance Locke, Laval Meunier, Eldon Francis, and Larry Maurer from last week will be in if the Raiders receive the kickoff.

It appears that, while the defense has been having to hustle to get together, the backfield has been running all through them which shows the Raiders might have some special surprises rigged up for

the 8 p.m. grid battle.

A number of new players have turned out this week but only one, Dennis Ludwig, seems to be progressing enough to suit down for the Thunderbird contest. Ludwig is a freshman back from Taft. He has been very impressive on defense.

Injuries are still at a minimum with speedster Del Brood possibly seeing some action in the Raider lineup tomorrow night. End Punk

Biddington is still out with his injured knee but hopes are high that he will be back in time for the Lewis and Clark contest next week in Portland.

The Thunderbirds of British Columbia appear to have small backs but their line is just about the size of the Raiders. Ends, too, appear to be a strong spot for UBC. They have four or five listed well over six feet tall and with plenty of experience.

Comets of Crater Entertain Redmond

Central Point—Crater highlanders will be alert tonight in an effort to keep the Redmond Panthers from putting their air and ground offenses together.

The Comet and Panther grid combines clash here starting at 8 p.m. It will mark

the fifth straight season the teams have met in football.

When Redmond trimmed Hermiston 13 to 0 in its season opener, its passing attack was its most effective weapon and its ground offense did not fare so well. In a 6 to 0 loss last week to The Dalles, the Panthers made good gains along the ground but their aerial game failed to generate.

This week they'll try to blend both into a versatile attack against the Comets. In this attempt the visitors will have about the same weight but more experience against Crater in the line while the Comets may present the edge in both departments in the backfield.

Little Comparison Means

Crater enters the action after wins over Cottage Grove and Eagle Point and probably in its best physical shape so far in the campaign. There's little to go by in judging comparative strengths of the two teams. Hermiston, after losing to Redmond, whipped Scappoose 25 to 20 last week end. Whether The Dalles had a game the week end of Sept. 12 isn't known but that school generally comes up with a good club.

Possible starters for Crater are Tom White and Harold Twedell, ends; Doug Davis and Dave Brown, tackles; George Hunt and Larry Ryerson, guards; Bill White, center; Wayne Allen, quarterback; Bob Fowler or Loyal Higginbotham, left half; Allen Barnes, right half; and Kerman Bennett, fullback.

For Redmond it may be Van Zittick and Tom Alley, ends; Lloyd Rick and Ken Neel, tackles; Jerry Williams and Jim King, guards; Ed Rova, center; Don McCrea, quarterback; Leo Seal and Joe Freedman, halfbacks; and Justing King, fullback.

Columbia Defeats Sceptre 3rd Time

Newport, R.I.—UPI—Columbia, truly the gem of the ocean, was set today to polish off Britain and hold the America's Cup in the most decisive manner since we won it in 1851.

The United States had demonstrated rather embarrassingly that it can build a far better sailboat than the British.

Not even Sir Thomas Lipton back in the 1920s took such a shellacking as has Britain's Sceptre in the most decisive of this sailing "World Series."

Columbia now has beaten Sceptre overwhelmingly in light breezes, moderate winds and Thursday's near gale which whipped up such whitecaps that two spectator boats crashed together and injured the owner of a yacht. Weather forecast for today was more strong winds.

The British were ready to put their boat back in a Cunar liner and take it back home. Assistant helmsman Colin Ratsey admitted defeat in a very bit of understatement.

"We got the winds we wanted Thursday," he said. "We thought in those conditions we could beat Columbia. The results proved we're probably wrong."

They were wrong by more than a mile, as it turned out. Former auto racer and designer Briggs Cunningham brought the flying Columbia home 8 minutes and 20 seconds before the Sceptre. It was strictly no contest over the 24-mile course.

Sceptre was a "dead" boat and her designers must go back to the drawing boards if they hope to win next year the \$500 trophy they lost in Queen Victoria's day and never recovered.

Ashland High Grizzlies Have Yreka Engagement

Grizzlies go back into action this evening with a trip to California. They play at Yreka with game time 7 p.m. (PST) since California still is on daylight time.

It's been two weeks since Ashland had a game and in that time the Grizzlies gained depth as squad members have come along and developed in practice sessions. Competition for several positions had made players step lively and contributed to the improvement of the squad.

The Lithia city team has worked at overcoming the fumblyitis which proved so costly against Roseburg and at being eager but avoiding the overagerness which results in penalties. After dropping the first set Anderson grew sluggish and seemed to lose interest in battling the 21-year-old Green. He broke Green's service only once during the match.

Green, in top form, ached his top-ranked opponent repeatedly, and flawlessly covered every corner of the court.

Anderson recently lost the American National Singles Championships to Ashley Cooper, considered the top amateur player in the world today.
