San Francisco—(UPI)—Five Pacific Coast conference football teams get a chance to accomplish Saturday what they are seldom able to do in the Rose Bowl—knock over a Big Ten opponent.

The PCC-Big Ten contests highlights a schedule which includes topnotch intersectional games for every major team on the Pacific Coast.

While the Washington Huskies entertain Minnesota at Seattle, four other teams will tackle Big Ten opponents in the Midwest. California will be at Michigan State, UCLA at Illinois, Southern California at Michigan, and Washington State at Northwestern.

In other top intersectionals, Rice visits Stanford, Kansas plays at Oregon State, UCLA visits Missouri, San Jose State hosts Hawaii, and College of Pacific meets Arizona Tempe State at Stockton in a night game.

The best game on the Pacific Coast might well be the one in Stockton—despite the fears and tears of COP Coach Jack Myers.

Long Victory Striving

The Sun Devils from Arizona State have the nation's longest victory string at 13 games over three seasons, and Myers insists they're the greatest thing since hula hoops. The committees, who were appointed with the concurrence and approval of the National Ski association, will also serve in similar capacities during the North American Ski championships at Squaw Valley, Feb. 21-March 2, 1959. The Olympic games are scheduled Feb. 18-28, 1960.

VA Domiciliary Golfers Will Oppose Ashland's Oak Knoll Team at Camp White Sunday

Camp White—Eight Oak Knoll golfers from Ashland will visit Camp White Sunday, Sept. 28, to play a team of veterans on their pitch and putt course, a feature of the recreational program at the Veterans Administration domiciliary. The matches will start at 1:30 p.m.

This is the opening contest of the veteran members with a visiting team.

An average of between 35 and 40 men play the game systematically each month, according to Al Birman, sports director. "Most of these men spend from four to six hours daily on the course," he stated.

During the past season, which started in March, special tournaments have been held.

Williams Designed
The golf course was planned by Al Williams, former Rogue Valley Country club pro. Work was started in March 1957 and completed July 2, that year. It is a five-hole course now and is being enlarged to nine holes. The larger course will not be in shape until next season, it is reported.

The course measures 256 feet from tee for Hole 1; 156 feet for Hole 2; 240 feet for Hole 3; 235 feet for Hole 4, and 300 feet for Hole 5.

Klamath Indian Reservation Not Open to Hunting

Portland—Portland area office of the bureau of Indian affairs today cautioned hunters that the Klamath Indian reservation in southern Oregon is closed to all but Klamath Indians and that the tribes will have an aggressive trespass control program in effect during the season.

Area Director Don C. Foster said that Klamath tribal members will be deputized by the Klamath county sheriff to assist sheriff's deputies, state police and state game commission agents in enforcing the restriction.

The Jackson creek rd. in the vicinity of Yamey mountain used in former years for access to the Weyerhaeuser tract on the west side of the reservation will also be closed, Foster said. BIA has been advised by the game commission that hunters will be permitted to use the Skellock rd. to reach areas open to hunting in the Weyerhaeuser Timber company's holdings.

Foster said no trespassing signs will be posted on the reservation and on the Jackson Creek rd., and urged the cooperation on the part of the general public to recognize tribal rights.

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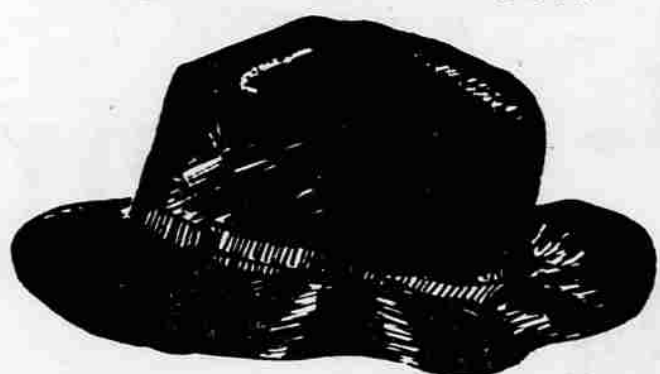

THE RED HAT PLEDGE

"Be a careful sportsman"

The 10 Commandments of Safety

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.
2. Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
3. Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
7. Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

State Red Hat Days Observance Begins

Oregon Red Hat Days began today and will continue through the hunting seasons. For the fourth consecutive year sportsmen and landowners are cooperating in a program to bring about improved relations between their groups, safe and more productive hunting and greater awareness of sportsmen's outdoor responsibilities.

Under the program hunters pledge to be law abiding, to respect the rights and property of others and to be careful with fire and firearms. Hunters are asked to wear red hats and special buttons as symbols of their pledge.

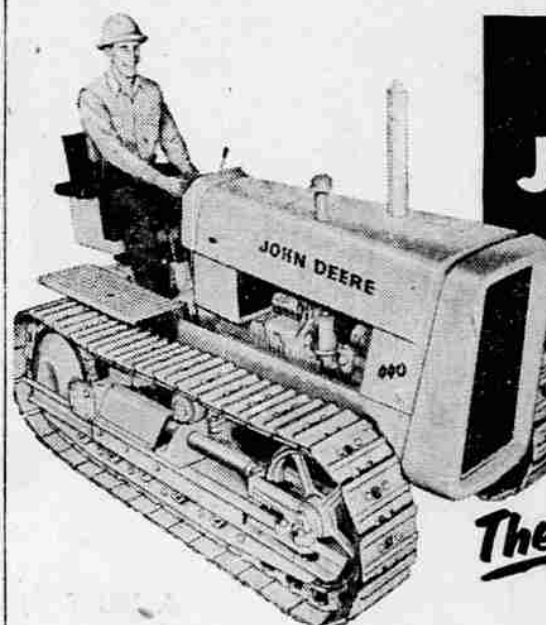
Red Hat Days was initiated in 1955 by the Portland, Ore., chapter of the Izaak Walton League. Now 27 states have similar programs and an identical project on a national scale has been started by the IWL.

Abuses for which correction is sought are carelessness

with fire and firearms, trespassing, hazing and killing of domestic livestock, trampling crops, littering, illegal hunting, leaving gates open when found closed, cutting fences, damaging equipment, shooting near homes and other buildings and other game law violations. It is pointed out that only a small minority create these problems but that the actions of the minority spoil hunting privileges for others.

In the three past seasons of Red Hat Days in Oregon hunting accidents and hunter-caused fires have dropped in number. The Oregon Cattlemen's association has reported less livestock killed or wounded.

Many ranchers are now using "hunting by permission" signs rather than "no hunting" or "no trespassing" postings but much private property remains closed to hunters because of abuses.
