Hedrick 9th Victor Over North GP

Hedrick Junior high ninth grade capitalized on a strong first half to bounce North Grants Pass 20 to 7 in a Friday afternoon gridiron affair.

The Hornets markers came two in the opening quarter and one in the second while GP, which outplayed Hedrick in the second half, got over the goal in the fourth stanza.

Mike McCullough going all the way the first time he had a scoring chance in the mix, returned a punt 60 yards for a Hedrick touchdown. He had been blocking on the play.

Chuck McNair bucked the bonus.

McNair, still in the first period, pushed the last three yards of a drive and Jim Shaw skirted the flank to convert. A reverse for eight yards with John Fisher packing wrapped up another touchdown march. McCullough ran 70 yards to the goal in the third quarter but a penalty nullified the dash.

Dennis Patterson was the scorer for the North club, going over from 10 yards out and then bucking the extra point. He was the big threat for GP and North also got good play out of quarterback Bob Lewellyn.

Grants Pass held the ball much of the second half and ran the Hornets ends well. Hedrick was sharp in the first half and turned in some good gang tackling. The Hornets were good in spots during the second half.

Hedrick coach Barney Riggs said he was "real pleased" with the Hornets for the first game and declined to single out any of his players. He warned that North GP will be tough as the season progresses. The club is under the tutelage of Ron Maurer and Ted Tenney, ex-Southern Oregon college athletes.

Jacksonville High School's Redskins jumped to a first-quarter 6-0 lead over Bonanza, but ran out of steam later on and bowed 27-12.

The unseasonable heat appeared to bother both teams.

Bonanza, working exclusively out of a T-formation, capitalized on a strong passing attack and superior line blocking.

Doyle Branson completed 7 of 9 passes for the Redskins, one of them a toss to Ron Davis which set up their second touchdown.

Jacksonville made 11 first downs to Bonanza's 15.

Ron Davis, Redskins left halfback, scored the first tally after three minutes of the first period on an 8-yard dash off-tackle. He caught Branson's set-up pass in the third quarter and ran the ball nearly 35 yards to the Bonanza 6.

Ben Long scored on the next play with an end run.

Coach Dea Cox praised Ken Perreard for stand-out play at left end for the Redskins.

Jacksonville supplemented its T-formation with occasional plays from the single-wing.

Merrill high, with a potent ground assault, dumped arm-rimmed St. Mary's of Medford 33 to 6 while Chiloquin downed Talent 12 to 7 and Malin lashed Sacred Heart of Klamath Falls 26 to 6 Friday night in District 5B football encounters.

The Huskies of Merrill, who netted 203 rushing yards during the evening built up a 19 to 0 first half bulge. St. Mary's filled the air with passes, tossing 36 and completing 19 for 147 yards but only after the second half kick-off could the Crusaders muster the punch to score.

Chiloquin, paced by John Ochoa, chalked up touchdowns in the second and third stanza to lick the Bulldogs and Malin, whose Rick Illian scored twice, had a 19 to 0 gap after three cantos on the field.

Huskies Tally — Troy Patterson and Buddy Maupin went three and eight yards to TDs to end drives by Merrill in the first quarter.

In the second Pat Salvadori's throw to Charles Roller was good for nine yards and a goal. In the third chucker Maupin tallied on a 23-yard pass interception jaunt and Patterson ended a fourth quarter drive with a two-yard plunge. Maupin kicked three extra points.

St. Mary's third quarter touchdown was on a 20-yard pass play, Bob Evans to Don Davy. The score topped an 80-yard passing drive in which the Crusaders completed nine of 10. The Medford eleven was near the Husky five when the first half ended.

Merrill had 41 yards in the air and a total of 244 net scrimmage yards while SM had just 50 on the ground and a net of 197. The Huskies headed 12 to 11 in first downs. Bob Evans threw 29 passes with 17 complete and Terry Cooper hit two for seven.

An 80-yard pass play, Ochoa to Lyle Kenzler, recorded one goal for Chiloquin. Ochoa swept end for 18 yards and the other after his pass to Lyle Hale for a long gain set up the TD play.

Welburn Runs 95 — Talent scored in the third quarter. The Bulldogs held the Panthers for downs on their four and Rollie Welburn busted loose for a 96-yard gallop. Mike Jacobs crunched for the bonus.

Chiloquin was threatening at the end of the game and Talent was inside the Panther 20 several times but was hampered by penalties. The Klamath county team did its gaining in the air and around the ends. With John Butler, Normal Green, Larry Bradford and Everett McCasland work-

ing well, the Bulldogs gave little in the middle of the line. End Duane Pittman, playing his first football game, did some nice pass catching for Talent.

Illian crossed the goal on 18 and 15-yard runs for Malin while Stan Petrusek and Ron Mullanex went four and 31 for touchdowns. Illian kicked two conversions. Allen Thill went over from four yards away for Sacred Heart.

Eagle Point, Glendale, Illinois Valley Record

Defending champion Glendale, Eagle Point and Illinois Valley were victors Friday in the opening night of Rogue league football contention.

Glendale high whipped Rogue River 27 to 0, Eagle Point won 12 to 0 from Henley and IV trimmed Phoenix 26 to 13 in the District 6 A-2 southern division.

At Glendale Cliff Worley ran the opening kick-off back 70 yards for a touchdown and hit pay soil on an 18-yard dash. Terry Buchanan ran 63-yards to the end zone and also made it to the pay line on a 36-yard scamper.

Bill Turner had a 29-yard run for TD on the Eagle's home turf, topping an eight-play 65-yard EP drive. Bill Skeeters jump-passed to Bill Hubbard for five yards and the other counter.

Turner was the main Eagle offensive gun while Steve Charters had 10 tackles and Ken Jorde eight and four assists to pace defense. Dale Casey was another defensive stalwart.

Races Disappoint Columbia Skipper

Newport, R.I.—(UPI)—The man who skipped Columbia to shattering victory in the America's Cup match said he was disappointed in the races and thought the -rival boats should be bigger and more evenly matched.

Briggs Cunningham, auto racer turned sailor, and all the American crew were delighted at turning back England's 17th attempt to take back the trophy of sailing supremacy captured in 1851.

The fleet Columbia ran away from England's Sceptre in every one of the four races, the British boat limping home with a broken boom in the last race Friday in courageous determination to finish.

Cunningham said he was disappointed the races were so lopsided. The thousands who watched the race agreed. It was like watching a much better horse against a nag, beating him and then running three more times to rub it in.

"This is my personal opinion," Cunningham said. "But I think we should remove these artificial restrictions limiting boat design."

"The original purpose of the America's Cup competition was to test vessels capable of going to sea, not little racing machines of no other value."

"And we should work out rules so that the races are not just runaways decided on the first day."

Sceptre's skipper, Graham Mann, was still smiling when he came across the finish line in the last race an embarrassing seven minutes and five seconds behind Columbia in the 24-mile triangular race.

Mike Consbruck, 160-pound fullback was particularly effective in lone plunges off guard and tackle. Running him a close second was left-halfback George Hand.

The Phoenix team loosened up on the passing and had gained a total of 54 yards through its aerial attack by the time the game was over. IV recorded a total of 25 yards gained in this department. The Cougars had 348 yards rushing and Phoenix 209.
