

Northwestern Upsets WSC 29-28

Evanston, Ill. — Northwestern, a winless weakling in Big Ten football, scored its first victory in two seasons Saturday by upsetting Washington State, 29-28, with a crew of sturdy sophomores.

The Wildcats enjoyed their first taste of victory since they beat Illinois late in the 1956 season. They rocked the highly rated Cougars for two fast touchdowns in the second period, one more in the third and a fourth in the final session while they weathered a three-touchdown uprising to emerge with the one-point margin.

The winning margin was reflected in the Wildcats' successful conversions after all touchdowns. They kicked for three and passed for a two-point conversion on the fourth touchdown. Washington State failed on an attempted running conversion and also on a pass try.

The Wildcats confined their game to the ground with quarterback Dick Thornton in charge and halfbacks Ron Burton and Will Fowler doing most of the work to grind out a net total of 336 yards on only 97 for the West Coast. Push Backs Around

A crowd of 27,420 saw the Wildcat line, studded with five sophomores, begin pushing the Washington State backs around in the first period. They showed little respect for the celebrated passing arm of Bob Newman, nailing him for losses of 21 yards on two first period pass attempts and intercepting two of his tosses in the same session.

Burton snared a Newman shot in midfield with little more than a minute to go before the intermission and scampered 44 yards to the Washington State 17. Three plays later, Thornton cut through the Cougar line for five yards to open the scoring. Cougar fullback Carl Ketchie fumbled on the one yard line after the kickoff, Fowler recovered and left it to Burton to plunge for the second touchdown from the one.

The Cougars scored in the third period when Don Ellingsen caught Newman's eighth-yard pass in the end zone. Bill

Steiger's attempt to run the conversion failed. Burton scored for Northwestern on a 61-yard run in the third period and the Cougars scored on another pass from Newman, a 30-yard throw to Gail Cogdill.

The Cougars rallied for three touchdowns in the final period, scoring their second on Chuck Morell's two-yard run after a 67-yard pass play from Keith Lincoln to Cogdill. Cogdill and Dave Wilson collaborated on an 80-yard play with little more than a minute to go to end their scoring and the Wildcats were in possession on the Washington State 30 as the game ended.

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Michigan Beats USC By 20-19

Ann Arbor, Mich. — (UP) — Southern California Saturday threw a heart-stopping scare into Michigan but successive five-yard penalties on an extra-point attempt with five minutes to play proved too much and the favored Wolverines eked out a 20-19 victory Saturday.

The Trojans struck for two touchdowns in the last half of the final quarter but could not make the extra points.

Tom Maudlin, substituting for injured regular quarterback Willie Wood, calmly arched a 36-yard touchdown pass to Hillard Hill but Southern Cal couldn't make either one of two points on conversion.

The Trojans were penalized five yards for delay of game and then five more for offense to make the attempt back to the 13. Maudlin finally passed to Bob Truett but he was thrown out on the 6.

Only a few minutes earlier Rex Johnston sprinted 66 yards off left guard to put Michigan's lead to 20-13 but Johnston's extra point attempt failed wide of the uprights.

Michigan, lightly regarded in the Big-Ten and supposed to be on the downgrade, moved with polish on the offense in its return to the single wing that carried the Wolverines to gridiron prominence in years past.

Fullback John Hernestein, injured most of last season, proved All-America material as the driving force behind the Michigan attack. Hernestein scored on two runs of 12 yards and never made less than 3 yards from scrimmage.

The Wolverines never trailed after Hernestein went in from the 12 early in the first period and Brad Myers converted. The Trojans then struck back to tie it up at the opening of the second period when Maudlin went in on a quarterback sneak and Johnston converted.

But Michigan bounced back with a 74-yard drive capped by Myers' leap into the end zone from the two. Stan Noskin converted for a 14-7 half-time lead and Hernestein boosted it to 20-7 as Michigan moved 65 yards from the second-half kickoff to set up Southern California's last minute heroics.

Michigan State Bears 32-12

East Lansing, Mich. — (UP) — Michigan State unveiled a brand new sporty backfield Saturday as it opened its season with a 32-12 romp over once-beaten California.

Two of the touchdowns were made by sophomores who scored the first time they got their hands on a ball in a college game.

It was the 16th Michigan State win against one defeat of west coast teams in a victory string that includes two Rose Bowl championships.

It was a small speedy pony backfield that gave MSU a 28-20 victory over UCLA in the 1954 bowl game.

It was the same type of backfield operating behind a bruising line averaging over 220-pounds per man that outclassed an injury-ridden West Coast team before 52,639 fans today.

The Michigan State line held the Golden Bears split T offense to a mere 111 yards and 10 first downs on the ground while MSU rolled to 318 yards and 24 first downs.

It was the second bitter defeat by a Michigan State team for California Coach Pete Elliott who as a quarterback led University of Michigan to three victories over Michigan State in the 1940s.

Most spectacular play of the game was a 57 yard Michigan State TD play that started from a punt formation with three minutes to go in the third period. One hundred-seventy-five pound halfback Dean Look appeared to be trapped after taking a wide pass from center, but he got a pass off to quarterback Greg Montgomery before being tackled on California 43.

California, which came into the game with five injuries, scored first on a 24-yard pass from quarterback Joe Kapp to halfback Jack Hart, California scored with five seconds to go in the game when third string fullback Walt Arnold plunged over from the one.

Both California conversion attempts failed. California missed on two other scoring chances in the first half when left half Hank Olquin and end Tom Bates dropped passes from Kapp after they were in the clear.

Kapp who is in third place in all-time California pass completions had little protection against the Spartan line. Los Angeles — (UP) — The wife of professional golfer Martin (Marty) Furgol, 42, today sought a divorce, on charges of cruelty. 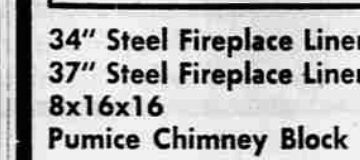
