Fred Morlan Says Gilman's Is Bound By Union Contract

He said he had received a letter from Gilman's April 30 terminating the dairy's relations with the union. The letter stated that Gilman's did not consider itself bound by any action taken by the council or the dairy operators' association, Morlan reported.

Nevertheless, according to Morlan, the dairy is still

bound by the continuing clause in the contract signed separately by Les Gilman. He explained this by the statement that neither party has served notice "as provided." The contract reads: "If either party wishes to modify or terminate this agreement, it shall serve notice of such intention upon the other party sixty (60) days prior to the expiration date or subsequent anniversary date."

Morlan said the Teamsters Union served notice on the dairy operators' association that it wished to renegotiate the original 1953-55 contract. And has done so likewise in 1956 and 1958 on subsequent contracts.

But, he said, if Gilman's does not recognize the association's authority to represent it then the notice served by the union was not served on Gilman's.

And, since notice was not otherwise served by the union, or by Gilman's, the continuing clause still holds Gilman's to the separate contract, according to Morlan.

The Central Labor Council reportedly took Gilman's to task for the alleged contract violations May 2. On this date, according to Morlan, it sent the dairy a letter asking it to appear and show cause why it should not be placed on the "Do Not Patronize" list.

Gilman's, it is understood did not answer the letter. According to Shaw, the union then sent a letter to the dairy June 16 asking arbitration and another letter July 1 indicating court action to enforce the contract would be sought. Shaw said he received no reply on either letter.

A letter was then circulated to members of all unions in this area, asking them to not patronize Gilman's. Smith charged last Monday that two union men entered his office earlier in the summer and told him he had to either force his employees to join the union or fire them within five days. He said he refused to comply.

Smith answered the "Do Not Patronize" letter with an ad in the Mail Tribune Sept. 14.
