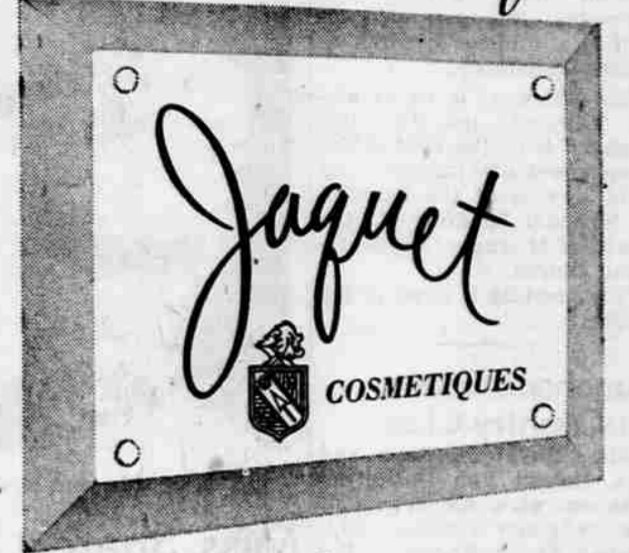
Also visiting at the home of the Foleys that day were Mrs. Foley's uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Marmie E. Olson, Central Point.

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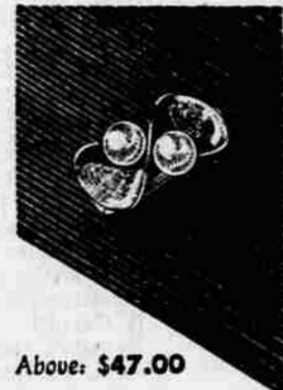
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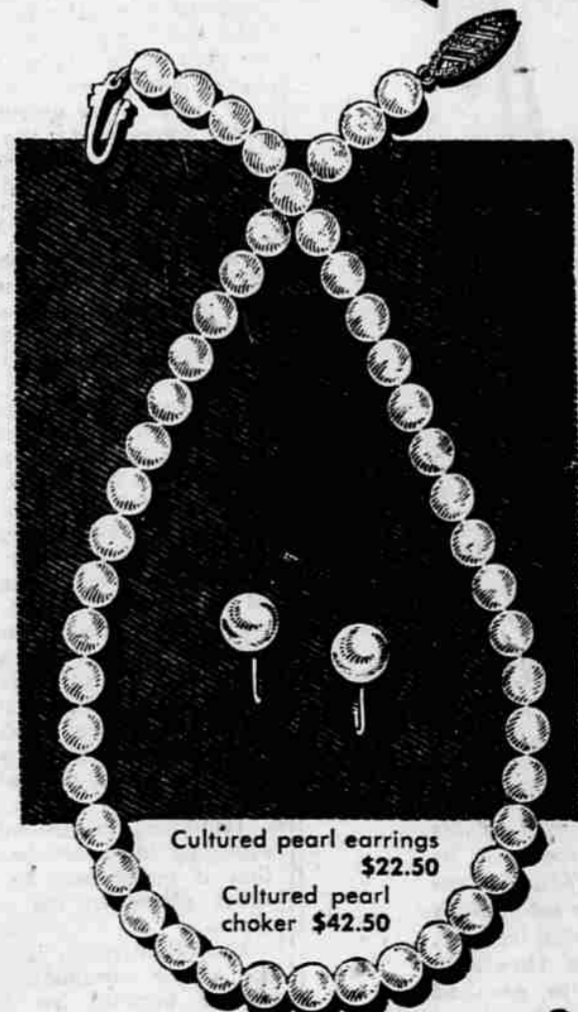
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
