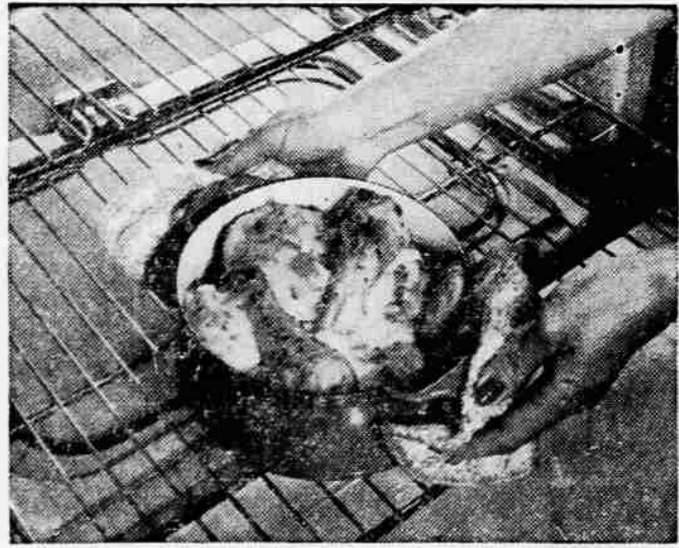
At this meeting Mrs. Myrna Frink, school principal, will introduce the faculty and parents will have an opportunity to visit each classroom and view the work plans for the year.

New York—UPI—Before juicing oranges, grate the peel and store it in an airtight container in the refrigerator. Some of its many uses: add to pancake batter, mix into sweet rolls, sprinkle in fruit salad, add to chocolate fudge candy or frosting.

A quick, easy, and trouble-free fryer recipe is 'Bake A Fryer, Mushroom' dish. To make cut up one fryer and arrange pieces close together in a flat baking dish or casserole. Stir 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder (a little Oregano or poultry seasoning, too, if wished) into one can of condensed cream of mushroom soup until it is smooth and creamy. Pour the soup evenly over the chicken and sprinkle the top with paprika and chopped parsley or parsley flakes. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour or until chicken is tender and golden. Serve right from the casserole.

Here's What To Do When Power Goes Off

Washington—UPI—Know what to do when a power failure causes the home freezer to stop?

The Agriculture Department gives these tips on how to keep food from spoiling:

Don't open the freezer door unnecessarily because warm air raises the inside temperature.

Try to find out how long the electricity will be off in the area. If only for a few hours, food will not spoil. Food in a full freezer generally does not thaw for two days. In a freezer only half full, the food should keep well for one day. The larger the freezer, the better the insulation.

Before an emergency arises, locate the nearest place to get dry ice. Saw a 50-pound chunk into smaller pieces and set them on cardboard on top of the food. Do not touch the ice with bare hands.

Put a small pencil under the lid to allow gas from the ice to escape.

Or arrange with a local freezer plant to transfer the food there in emergency. To carry frozen food from one freezer to another, put crumpled newspapers around the packages and pack them in cardboard boxes.

Fall Planting Said Best Time For New Roses

New York—Fall brings football, school and turning leaves to the cooler sections of the country and it's also a reminder for the rose gardener to plan for planting. Experienced rose growers have learned that fall planting gives roses a good start because the root system has the chance to become established during the winter when the plants' energy is not being used for the production of flowers and foliage.

This year leading growers will feature the two spectacular All-America roses Ivory Fashion and Starfire, which will be available to consumers for the first time. Plants that have won the All-America Rose Selections award are a good bet for beginners and experts alike for they have come through years of testing in all types of soil and climate. Only the very best of the world's roses can survive this rigorous testing.

Ivory Fashion is a white floribunda that can be used for hedges, group plantings and colorful highlights or feature points. Starfire is a grandiflora of cherry red that will stand out beautifully against walls, fences and evergreen shrubs.

Gardeners will also want to consider some of the past award winners such as the gay floribunda Fusilier (red) and Gold Cup (yellow), and the hybrid tea White Knight. These varieties were introduced last year.

All-America Rose Selections varieties are stocked by almost all leading nurseries. They are identified by a green and white label, the hallmark of quality in roses.

Rep. Groener Tells Of Police-Pressure

Portland—UPI—State Rep. Richard Groener said Friday that pressure is being put on state policemen to hand out more traffic citations to motorists and that many "bad" arrests are resulting.

The Milwaukie Democrat called for a shakeup in top state police echelons and cited State Police Superintendent H. C. Maison as responsible for the alleged pressure on patrolmen.

Maison said at Salem he did not "care to comment" on the charge made by Groener. "That's his personal opinion," he said.
