Glen Hale New President of Superintendents

Glenn D. Hale, superintendent of school district 9, which includes Eagle Point, Shady Cove and Elk-Trail schools, was elected president of the Jackson County School Superintendent's association last week.

Other officers elected are John Harr, Rogue River, vice president; and Alf B. Mervold, county school superintendent, secretary. Miss Francis Klink, supervisor of public health nursing, Jackson county department of health, discussed medications which are sometimes found in first aid cabinets. She said the health department does not propose to police medications found in health cabinets, but placed special emphasis on aspirin tablets and toothache drops.

The superintendents approved a change of date for the county teachers' institute, which originally was scheduled Oct. 20. It now will be held Nov. 10. The change was necessary because of a conflict in dates with the state elementary school principals meeting.

County superintendents decided to continue their public information program on student insurance. They noted that in recent years, accident rate and cost of student treatment in the county had risen above the average for the state.

An extensive public information program with parents, physicians, and school officials in an effort to curb the rising cost of students' insurance rates was believed effective.

Bruce Hitt, assistant county school superintendent, urged the association members to start an education program on school bus safety. He said that unless people concerned, parents, school bus drivers, students and school officials, were ever conscious of school bus safety practices, serious accidents might result.

The superintendents' association set up a committee to study the Flesher report, which is concerned with vocational education in the state. Medford School Superintendent Leonard Mayfield briefed the group on the report.

Also discussed was the schools' part in the Oregon Centennial program, and possible ways in which the schools may participate. Jim McDonald, director of public relations in the county office, was named to work with the local centennial committee.

Chief Hints Arson In Canyonville Fire

Canyonville, Ore. —(UP)—Fire fighters early yesterday succeeded in controlling a 75-acre brush and slash fire that for a time threatened the Canyonville water supply, a private home and a motel.

Fire Chief Norman Hanson said there were signs the blaze may have been started deliberately. It surrounded a tower where city water is stored and was stopped only 400 yards short of a motel.

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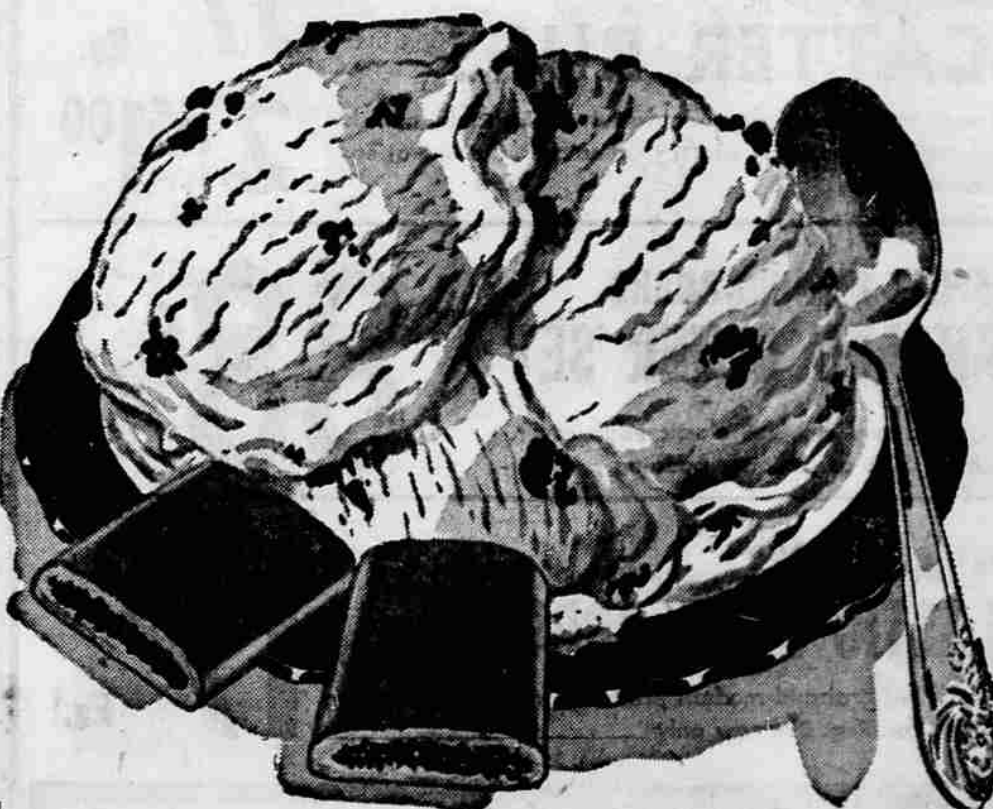
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
