

Bruton, Spahn Star as Braves Nudge Yankees in World Series Starter

Milwaukee —UPI— Outfielder Billy Bruton, still bothered by the bad knee that kept him out of last year's World Series, teamed up with veteran Warren Spahn to give the Milwaukee Braves a 4-3, 10-inning victory in the first game of this year's classic.

Bruton singled sharply to right center to score Joe Adcock with the run that gave the Braves a victory before 46,367 fans.

It was the third hit in that inning off the speed-balling Ryne Duren, who was called to the rescue of the Yankees' star southpaw, Whitey Ford, in the eighth.

Adcock got the Braves started with one out in the 10th with a single to right. Duren got Wes Covington to

Fast Balls Bring Nod For Spahn

(Veteran Warren Spahn pitched the Braves to a 10-inning 4-3 victory over the Yankees in the World Series opener Wednesday. He tells his impressions of the game in the following dispatch.)

Milwaukee —UPI— That's one down, and I'm counting on my roonie, Lew Burdette, to make it two today.

The Yankees were just as tough for me this time as they were last year, although I felt a little better about the whole thing because I knew more about them. By the same token, though, they knew more about me, so maybe that made it a standoff.

I don't know if they were looking for a lot of breaking stuff from me—it makes sense that they should—but I threw mostly fast balls.

Too Far Out
I wasn't trying to out-smart them particularly. It simply seemed to me that they were getting too far out in front of my fast ones.

The odd thing about it is that the two home runs hit off me came on breaking pitches. I threw a pretty good change-up to Bill Skowron in the fourth and he put it over the wall, then Hank Bauer picked on a screwball for that two-run homer he hit in the fifth. I realize the Yankees got six hits off me during the first five innings, and the only logical reason I can offer is that I was trying to be a little too careful. I saw that wind blowing out to left field and I knew it could hurt.

Brooklyn Man Perches High On Light Pole

Milwaukee —UPI— Anthony Albano, 61, Brooklyn, N.Y., saw Wednesday's first World Series game between the Braves and Yankees from the top of a 135-foot light pole in center field at County Stadium.

Why?
"I'm a baseball fan," said Albano, who was numbed with fear and cold when firemen got him off his windy, swaying perch.

Albano said he climbed the pole in the morning after sneaking into the stadium. He took that course when he couldn't buy a ticket.

He wasn't discovered until after the game had started, and then it was decided not to interfere with play to get him down.

Ladder Short
Players and fans kept their eye on him, however. Yankee centerfielder Mickey Mantle eyed him a couple of times.

An aerial ladder was leaned against the pole, but it was 35 feet short.

With the pole swaying in the stiff breeze about four feet, fireman Earl Curry, carrying 125 feet of life rope on his back, climbed up to Albano and tied him in a "sling" for the trip down.

The chilled Brooklynite was taken to the Milwaukee County General Hospital for observation.

fly out but Del Crandall singled through the middle sending Adcock to second. Then up came Bruton, who didn't get into the game until the ninth when he batted for Andy Pafko and fanned.

The slender outfielder fouled off one pitch, took a ball, then connected with a Duren fast ball for his winning hit.

Duren also was on the mound when the Braves, behind 3-2, tied the game in the eighth.

Ford was lifted after Eddie Mathews walked and Hank Aaron doubled with none out. Duren struck out Adcock on five pitches. Manager Casey Stengel went to the mound and after a brief chat it was decided to pitch to the left-handed hitting Covington.

Duren got two strikes past him before Covington hit a high fly to Mickey Mantle that enabled Mathews to score after the catch.

The Yankees got the lead first in the fourth inning when Bill Skowron homered.

Milwaukee came right back in the bottom of the fourth. With two out and Aaron on second because of a walk and passed ball, Crandall singled to score Aaron. Pafko drove one through the middle for another safety and Spahn did likewise to score Crandall and put the Braves ahead, 2-1.

Hank Bauer, who extended his hitting streak to 15 games with two hits, homered after Ford's walk in the fifth to put New York in front, 3-2. But then the Braves' eighth and finally that decisive 10th.

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Milwaukee Installed 6-5 Choice Over NY

New York —UPI— With Lew Burdette opposing Bob Turley, the Milwaukee Braves were 11-10 favorites to win today's second game of the World Series and 6-5 picks to win their second straight championship.

Before Wednesday's 4-3 10-inning loss, the Yankees were 13-10 favorites.

These odds are on a man-to-man basis. With a bookmaker, a Milwaukee bettor would have to lay \$13 to \$10 and a Yankee rooster could win \$11 with a \$10 bet on the Series outcome.

"I'm going with the guy who won the pennant for me," explained Yank manager Casey Stengel. "I don't worry about odds."

Burdette had a string of 24 1-3 scoreless innings going for him in Series competition —5 1-3 short of the record 29 2-3 scoreless innings which the late Babe Ruth set as a southpaw pitcher for the Boston Red Sox before he was

sold to the Yankees and transformed into an outfielder and the greatest home run hitter of all time.

Three Victories
Also ahead of Burdette is Christy Mathewson's string of 28 1-3 shutout innings in 1905 and 1911.

Burdette beat the Yankees, 4-2, in the second game last year, then hurled two shutouts at them —1-0 over Whitey Ford in the fifth game and 3-0 over Don Larsen in the seventh and deciding game. Turley won the sixth game, but he came in as a pinch batter in the ninth.

"It was worth waiting for," said Bruton of his line smash that fell between the New York Yankees' center and right fielders, scoring Joe Adcock from second with the decisive marker.

Bruton's left knee is still in bad shape more than a year after the injury suffered in a collision with a teammate. That's the reason he didn't start Wednesday's game, but he came in as a pinch batter in the ninth.

"The knee still gives me trouble," Bruton said, "and I have to give it a rest when it acts up. I still can't pivot or get off to a fast start."

Despite his handicap Bruton still manages bursts of speed reminiscent of his former fleetness. He was regarded one of the fastest men in baseball before his injury. This year he stole 11 bases in 79 games.

Federal Forest, Grazing Lands Open for Hunters

Portland —A joint statement regarding public use of lands under their administration was issued today by Virgil Heath, state supervisor of the bureau of land management, and J. Herbert Stone, regional forester of the U. S. forest service.

It was stated that essentially all national forest, Taylor grazing and O&C lands are open to public use, including hunting in accordance with state game regulations. Federal closures are sometimes made on experimental, recreational, and extreme fire hazard areas or for other special considerations, but these would be minor in extent and appropriately posted.

May Be Private Land
Taylor grazing lands administered by the BLM and special use pastures under permit from the forest service are open to hunters and fishermen even though they may be fenced.

However, it was pointed out that there may be private land within national forest or Taylor grazing lands.

Don Bowden of the University of California was taking his morning track workout when he heard groans from the bottom of a 150-foot embankment deep in the hills.

A car driven by Mrs. Doris Scott, 42, had careened off Grizzly Peak blvd. and plunged down the embankment, pinning her underneath.

Rescuers found Mrs. Scott suffered only a few bruises but she could have remained underneath the car for hours or days had not Bowden found her.

Bowden, now a graduate student in political science, broke the four-minute mile on June 11, 1957. His time was 3:53.7.

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Pitching Pattern Adopted After Tilt Got Underway

Milwaukee —UPI— Warren Spahn simply outfoxed them.

While the New York Yankees hung back waiting for Milwaukee's left-handed ace to throw his curves and slider, the aging Spahn kept them off balance with change-ups and uncranked his fast ball into the deepening shadows of the afternoon for a 4-3 victory.

Spahn, commenting on the Braves' win in the opener of the 1958 World Series, said he threw more fast balls in the 10-inning triumph than he ordinarily does.

"We didn't plan it that way," battery-mate Del Crandall said. "But we adopted the pattern when the Yankees started getting in front of Spahn's fast ball."

The Yankees, a sober team in their dressing room, admitted wringing fast balls out of a tired, 37-year-old arm meant the difference between victory and defeat for Spahn. Couldn't Understand

The Yankees didn't understand why they couldn't hit Spahn's fireball—when the Braves pounded the express train delivery of Ryne Duren for the victory.

"But they got into the shadows and they were hard to see," said slugger Hank Bauer. "That Spahn isn't as fast as he used to be and they hit our guy—and we couldn't hit theirs."

Manager Casey Stengel wasn't critical, but he wasn't complimentary either, about the performance of his Yankees.

"We had opportunities the first four or five innings, but we didn't run the bases too good. The first part of the game we had a better chance and they did their best hitting at the end of the game," he said.
