Holmes, Hatfield Clash Over State Board of Control

Portland - (UPI) - Robert D. Holmes, Democrat, and Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, Republican, candidates for governor in November, clashed here Wednesday over the State Board of Control.

Both appeared at a meeting of the League of Women Voters.

Holmes said he again intended to ask the Legislature to abolish the Board of Control "which Mr. Hatfield once favored doing." Hatfield said he had changed his mind since visiting the various institutions.

Hatfield said he was the only member of the Board to "comply with the law", which requires each member visit each institution once every 90 days. Holmes called the 90-day visit law "ridiculous." Hatfield then said state officials take an oath to uphold all laws.

Holmes, in his talk, said he would recommend a bonding program to finance an estimated \$156 million worth of state institution buildings in the next 10 years.

He also said he could see no tax cut if the state maintained present services.

Hatfield spoke on economy in government and said money could be saved by more efficiency.

Hatfield also said he favored federal aid for school building construction but feared encroaching federal control if such a program was extended. Holmes said he favored increased federal aid and did not fear losing control.

Crosby, Minn. - (UPI) - The Air Force said Wednesday night it will launch its "Man High III" balloon flight to the stratosphere from a site in New Mexico due to continued adverse weather conditions in Minnesota.

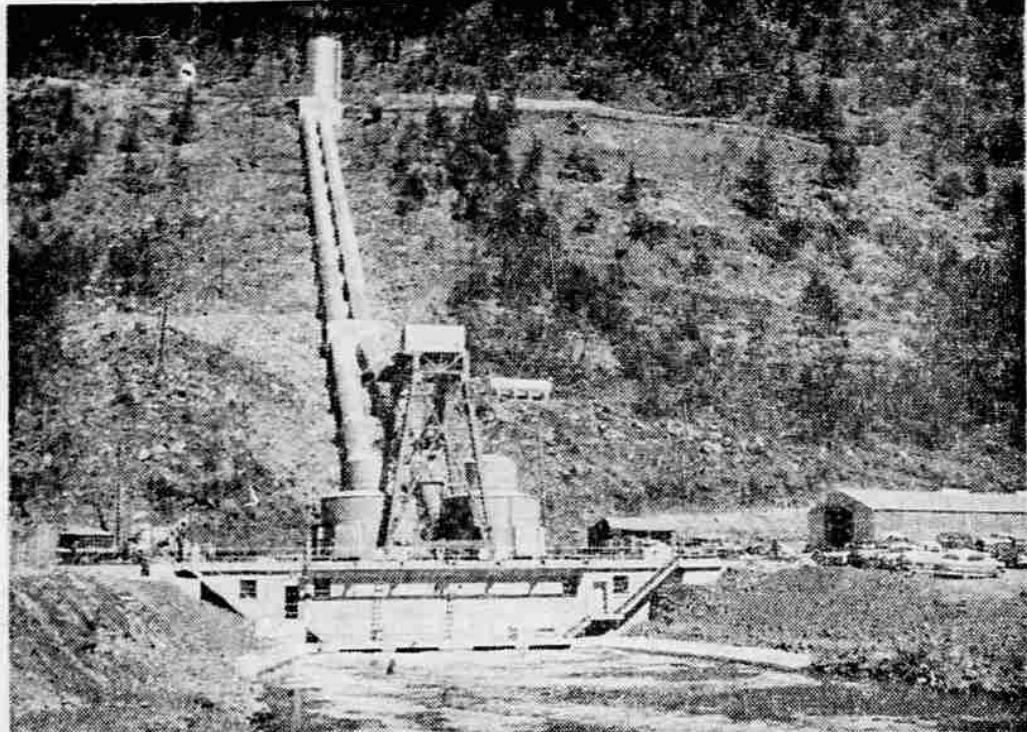
The decision came after high stratospheric winds forced a third postponement of the projected exploratory flight to study man's reaction to space.

Technicians began moving the gondola, designed to simulate a rocket cabin, the giant plastic balloon and other equipment from the site of an open pit mine near here where previous flights had been launched.

First Lt. Clifton McClure, 26, Anderson, S.C., is scheduled to attempt the balloon flight to an altitude of 20 miles.

An Air Force spokesman said the balloon probably will be launched late next week from the Air Force Missile Development Center at Holloman Air Force Base in Alamogordo, N.M.

Susan B. - I can't stop my giggling fits.

Mrs. R. B. - It's a real problem in our household.

Susan B. - My problem may sound like a silly one, but it's serious to me. I am better - but I can't help it. I'm 15 - old enough to know I'm giddy. I have the most awful giggling fits in the worst places, like church and at assembly in school.

What makes it harder for me is that I have a kid sister of 13, who is just like me. Whenever I think I've got myself under control I hear her going off and that breaks me up.

Last year I got thrown out of classes several times because I couldn't stop giggling. I really want so much to stop and I can't help myself. If things go on this way, I won't ever be able to go out with boys because they think I'm awfully silly - and they break me up worse than any thing.

Mrs. R. B. - Silly as it may sound, this has become a real problem in our household. My husband is a hard-working professional man and he loves a peaceful home. But from the minute he comes home there are these constant crazy outbursts of giggles.

Every single evening we are forced to send the girls away from the table. If we have company we don't dare let them dine with the adults. We have been embarrassed dozens of times in church or on other formal occasions. We are always forced to leave.

Until she was 13, Susan

was the world's most beautifully behaved little girl. She never got anything but A's in conduct in school. We were rather strict with the girls and they still try hard to do as we wish, but they seem unable to help themselves.

The Council: If the R. B.'s would think of their daughters' giggling fits as a tic or a stutter it might help them deal with the problem a little better.

Any parent who has had to deal with a stutter or with those jerky, involuntary gestures known as tics knows that he can't order the child to stop. The order will almost always produce a much worse outbreak of the undesired habit.

The child who develops any one of these nervous manifestations is nearly always trying desperately to control it. Some anxiety, some deeply rooted problem has forced its way through into this expression. The child is ashamed by his awareness of something he can't control and this produces even more tension.

Adolescent girls do tend to develop giggling fits, but in Susan's case it has gotten beyond the usually controllable boundaries. Probably the great stress her parents have placed on good behavior has made matters much worse than necessary. The guiltier Susan feels about her behavior, the more uncontrollable it gets.

The R. B.'s should stop making a problem of this. They should try to ignore it as much as possible and encourage Susan and her sister

Price Situation Gratifies Benson

Portland - (UPI) - Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson said here Wednesday that he was gratified at the improving farm price situation across the nation.

The secretary, en route to Salem and Eugene for campaign talks, said he considered the brighter farm picture a justification of the policies he had adhered to despite sharp criticism but he also credited expanding markets at home and abroad, greater research into the uses of farm products, greater efficiency on the farm and less control from government.

Heart Massage Fails; Girl Dies

Portland - (UPI) - Eighteen-month-old Susan Heller of Troutdale, whose heartbeat was restored by frantic rescue efforts Wednesday, succumbed at 6:20 a.m. in a hospital here, 17 hours after she was found floating in Blue lake.

Physicians at first reported success in their heart massage treatment at Providence hospital and a constant vigil was maintained at her oxygen tent through the night.

The child, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George L. Heller, was rescued from the lake by her father who applied artificial respiration in the back seat of their car while his wife drove to a fire station. Physicians at Providence later restored the heartbeat by massage.

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
