Princess Margaret Leaps To Safety As Speeding Auto Comes To Quick Stop

Bruges, Belgium—(UPI)—A speeding motorist gave Princess Margaret a narrow brush with death or serious injury today in the market square of this ancient Flemish city.

The sightseeing princess leaped to safety just in time from the path of the onrushing automobile—and may have saved a fair-haired little Belgian boy from injury as well.

It looked to bystanders as if the 28-year-old princess had swept the small boy from the path of the car before leaping to safety herself.

Car Screamed To Halt—The near-mishap occurred when a small European car driven by a 37-year-old woman swung hurriedly into a parking entrance blocked by the sightseeing royal party.

The car braked sharply and screeched to a halt just a few feet from Margaret. For an instant the princess appeared shaken but she recovered her royal composure quickly and carried on with her tour of the scenic square.

Lady Labouchere, wife of the British ambassador, was behind the princess and had an even narrower escape. The car was so close to her when it stopped that she instinctively tried to restrain it by placing her hand on the fender.

Party Unavailable—In the hustle of sightseeing, members of the royal party were unavailable for comment on what happened.

The driver, Antwerp secretary Martha Sels explained, "I thought it was one of those tourists who are always hanging around in the middle of the street to take pictures."

Police questioned Miss Sels and released her. Officers said no charges would be preferred.

A police spokesman conceded "It is sometimes difficult to get tourists to move out of the way."

Two Teenagers Are Released from Jail

Two teenage boys were released from the Jackson county jail Wednesday afternoon by District Court Judge James M. Main and placed on parole.

The boys, Richard Earl Smith, 18, of South Pacific highway, Medford, and Travis Edward Moore, 19, Table Rock rd., were arrested Aug. 29, for petty larceny, and sentenced to terms not to exceed one year in the county jail.

Moore was ordered by the county to leave for Arizona to reside with his mother and placed on parole. Smith was also released under direction and control of state board of parole and probation and told to live with relatives.

Holmes Supports State Police Head

Salem—(UPI)—Gov. Robert D. Holmes today stood behind his superintendent of state police in a controversy over alleged arrest quotas and the subsequent summons to a state police private to a disciplinary hearing.

Holmes declared that Police Superintendent H. G. Maion is "the finest and most competent officer in the U.S.A." and said he supports and relies on Maion's judgment. The Governor substantiated Maion's claim that police policy on arrests currently reflects the executive order to crack down on traffic violations for greater highway safety.

Maion has come under fire from two Democratic legislators who accused him of dictatorial methods. Rep. Richard Groener of Milwaukie first raised the arrest quota issue which he said accounted for many trivial and petty arrests. Sen. G. D. Gleason of Portland said he would offer legislation putting state police under civil service.

South Salem School Tightens Dance Rule—Salem—(UPI)—Principal Carl E. Aschenbrenner of South Salem high school said today that alumni and guests of students will be admitted to school dances only if they have registered with the school before 4 p.m. on the day of the dances.

He said the rule came as a result of "undesirable conduct" at and near dances during the past two weeks. Some outsiders, he said, flaunted rules prohibiting smoking and have been asked to leave. Salem police will be hired for special duty.

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Metals, Chemicals, Oils Pace Market

New York—(UPI)—Metals, chemicals and oils paced industrial stocks to a new all-time high today.

Individual gains in the list ran past two points in a number of issues as the market responded to some favorable economic news and generally ignored some bad news, including auto strikes.

The nonferrous metals met support after price increases were announced for lead, zinc and copper. National Lead, Newmont Mining, Magma Copper, and Cerdo de Pisco all rose around a point or more and touched new highs.

The steels were strong as a group with most of the leaders at new highs. Jones & Laughlin, which said it will operate at 80 per cent of capacity in October, ran up more than a point at its high.

Washington—(UPI)—The Federal Communications Commission today granted Television Co. a construction permit for a new TV station on channel 83 at Roseburg, Ore.

The translator station will pick up and broadcast the programs of Portland station KOIN-TV.

The commission rejected at the same time a petition by station KVAL-TV at Eugene, Ore., to hold a hearing on television's application.

Veteran Newsman Leaves Bend Post

Bend—(UPI)—Henry Fowler, a veteran of 42 years with the Bend Bulletin, has left the newspaper to devote all his time to his printing business.

Fowler, long considered an authority on tax matters, had specialized in school coverage during his past few years on the paper. He joined the Bulletin in 1916, shortly after it became a daily. He was a 1914 graduate of the University of Oregon.

Fowler was part owner of the Bulletin when it was sold five years ago to Robert W. Chandler.

Nine Schools on Safety Honor Roll

Nine schools in the Medford district have been listed on the National School Safety Honor roll in the October issue of Safety Education, a magazine for teachers and administrators.

A total of 4,710 schools throughout the country are listed on the Honor roll. The schools receive recognition for efforts to raise safety programs to a nationally accepted standard.

To be listed, a school safety program must be upgraded constantly to remain on the list in future years.

Schools in the Medford district, and the number of years they have been listed, are: Jackson, Lincoln, Roosevelt and Washington, all eight years; McLoughlin Junior High, four years; Hedrick Junior High, and Jefferson, three years; and Oak Grove and West Side schools, two years.

Danger of Fire Becomes Worse

Fire danger in southwestern Oregon was nearing the extremely high point today, forest agency officials reported, and no immediate relief is in sight through the week end.

Curt Nesheim, warden for the southwestern district, state department of forestry, and Carroll Brown, supervisor of Rogue River National forest, said conditions probably would become worse before hunting season starts Saturday.

Generally east winds and low humidity have dried forests out making the fire danger extreme, they said. They asked people going into the mountains to use every precaution possible against forest fires.

The Salvage Chief managed to straighten the barge around late Wednesday and move it about 200 feet seaward. It was hoped the barge would be completely freed at high tide around 2 p.m.

The barge grounded last week after the tug Kiliyang sank about 300 feet off the jetty.
