Warren indicated that Allen would see some offensive service but that he would not take a chance with him on defense although he is valuable to the club in that department too.

The Crater mentor said that Bryson LaCasse, sophomore lineman, will not be able to play because of a knee injury. Tackle Dave Brown and End Tom White, who also were on the crippled list this week, are expected to be ready for battle.

Each club put over three touchdowns but John Champ cracked over for three extra points for the Comets. Final score was 21 to 18.

Grants Pass got the jump in the fray when Dennis Cain ran back the opening kick-off 75-yards to the goal. But Crater marched the following kick back to the North GP goal and Jim Fowler crossed from six yards out. Gil Harrison sneaked the last yard of another push and Crater headed 14 to 6 at the half.

In the third quarter Cain went 60 yards on a reverse to tally for North but the Comets countered when Fowler broke loose for a 45-yard run. Steve Ausland went eight yards on a sweep for the final GP touchdown. Tackles Dave Burns and Tom Kimball and center Dave Molloy were line standouts for Crater.

Determined Duck Squad Heads for Sooner Ruckus

Eugene—UPI—A 37-man University of Oregon football squad, brimming with determination, flew to Oklahoma today for a Saturday football date with Coach Bud Wilkinson's number-one ranked Sooners at Norman.

Coach Len Casanova said he would open with the same lineup which started in the 27-0 victory over Idaho Sept. 20, Oregon's only game to date. This means sophomore Dave Grosz will open at the quarterback slot, backed by 10 lettermen including All-American end candidate Ron Stover.

Stover, captain of the team, said "we'll be ready." Oregon has been made a three-touchdown underdog but the Webfoots were picked to lose by that much against Ohio State in the Rose Bowl and came out on the short end of a 10-7 score.

Oregon planned to arrive in Norman in time for an afternoon workout today.

Oregon has led the Pacific Coast conference in defense for the past two seasons and Casanova has been drilling his team hard this week on ways to stop Oklahoma's new spread offense. The Ducks held Idaho to 30 yards on the ground in their opener.

Casanova holds an enviable record against Wilkinson. His 1943 Santa Clara team defeated Oklahoma in the Sugar Bowl, 20-17. The next year Oklahoma downed his Santa Clara eleven 28-21.

Southern Oregon To Raid Stockade of LC Pioneers

Ashland—An old fashioned shoot-up complete with Indians and settlers is scheduled for a new twist this week end when an out and out Indian war blossoms out again in the Great Northwest.

Scene of the skirmish will be an ancient battleground, called, interestingly enough, a football gridiron where the Red Raider Indians of the Rogue and Southern Oregon college will invade the stockades of the Pioneers at Lewis and Clark college in Portland Saturday afternoon.

But all will not be utter chaos as in the past, for the calvary will be on hand in the form of four referees in easily distinguished black and white stripped uniforms.

These four brave men of honor and fair play will be out to see that the Red Raiders from the southland will have an equal chance to storm the gridiron of the defending Pioneers who are slight favorites to scalp some of the Raiders.

In skirmishes thus far this year the Raiders of the Rogue have fallen but once, although in a second engagement they triumphed by carrying 25 scalped points into their teepees.

The Pioneers have a like record of winning one battle by the skins of their scalps while on a second occasion they beat a forced retreat from a slugfest in the Golden Land to the south.

Recent smoke signals from the Raider encampment revealed the braves of SOC were concentrating on an attack that featured both an up and over aerial offense in addition to a hard charging and sneaky attack on the ground.

Coach Al (Medicine Man) Akins has been experimenting with various defense mechanisms in case the Pioneers should ever break out to charge.

Chief Jack (Wise Owl) Brown will be leading the attack with help from lieutenants Larry (Mau-Mau) Maurer, who will lead the charging front attack, Eldon (Fleet-foot) Francis sparking the left side, and Laval (Glue Paw) Meunier leading the right side.

Chief braves in the attacking force will be Jim McAbee and Gordie Carrigan on the flanks with inside help from Al Sodaro and Bud Brittan. Phil Sword will spearhead the middle of the offense. On his right hand will be

Jim Tacchini and on his left Troy Bellah.

The defensive force will have capable braves in Dick Smith, Marion Jack, John Godlove, Lance Locke, George Juveland, Ray Weinholt, and Merv Newell.

The Rogue Raiders plan to move out when the sun is at its zenith on Friday and return when the stars are near waking the next evening just after the battle.

Portland—UPI—Sam Clack of Eastern Oregon, with 171 yards, and George Kane of Portland State, with 164 yards, lead Oregon Collegiate conference players in rushing after two non-conference games.

In passing, SOC's Lance Locke has a 692 average with 9 out of 13 followed by Jack Brown, also of SOC, with 12 out of 18 for 667. Larry Maurer of Southern Oregon leads in scoring with 18 points and John Willmarth of Eastern Oregon has a 40-yard punting average.
