# Industrials Pushed To New High Ground

New York - (UPI) - Demand for metals, autos and chemicals pushed industrial stocks into new all-time high ground today.

Metals responded to price increases for lead, zinc and copper and to a Russian promise to cut down its exports of aluminum. Steel shares met support on the bright outlook for that industry.

Contract agreements with the United Auto Workers, setting the stage for three years of labor peace in the key auto industry, helped to buoy market sentiment.

Railroad issues responded to rising loadings and a generally improved outlook. Gains at the highs ran past three points in Louisville and Nashville.
