

# Cavemen Tip Crater In District 6 Mix

Central Point-Grants Pass High got off to a head start here Friday in Southern Oregon conference football.

The Cavemen of the Climate community capitalized on end sweeps and two of three passes to subdue the host, Crater Comets 26 to 7 in the tussle which lifted the curtain on the 1958 District 6 A-1 campaign.

GP crossed the pay line once in the first period, once in the second and twice in the third. The Comets tabulated in the third stanza and the fourth was scoreless.

A poor Crater punt set up the 40-yard punch for the first GP touchdown. On the fourth play of the series of end rumps, Jack Dean went over from the seven.

The Comets came back to drive to the Grants Pass five-yard line but lost the ball on the six. The Cavemen moved from there to the Crater two, where the Comets held on downs. Crater ran the ball out to the 40. On a snap to Loyal Higinbotham in punt formation, the pigskin went over his head. He fumbled trying to pick it up and Jerry Patterson nabbed the ball and ran 11 yards for a Grants Pass touchdown. Ollie Woolsey kicked the extra point.

**Two Pass TDs**

Grants Pass then drove from the third quarter kick off and passed for a TD on a 25-yard play. Dick Hayes to Marvin Terry. Woolsey again kicked the bonus. On the following kick-off, a Comet muff gave GP the ball on the Crater 36-yard line. That set the stage for another 25-yard Hayes to Terry scoring pass play.

The Comets turned a Grants Pass fumble on the Cavemen 33 into a touchdown. Glenn Cote made the recovery. On the next play Kerman Bennett took a pitch-out and tallied on an end sweep. Bob Fowler converted.

A fumble on the GP 25 lost Crater another scoring chance after Bennett had obtained the ball for the Comets on a pass interception.

The prestige-packed Medford-Marshfield game at Medford ended in a 3-0 win for the No. 3 Black Tornado over the No. 2 coastal power, James Madison of Portland, another member of the football elite in fourth position, ran over Benson, 14-7, in Portland interscholastic league competition. It was the fourth straight win for the Senators.

North Bend retained its reputation with its defeat of Coquille, 44-12, while Astoria survived a tough engagement with Beaverton, winning 26-14. All the other teams rated in the top 10 with Friday night games came through unscathed.

Roseburg defeated South Eugene, 21-12; Gresham beat Clackamas, 13-0; and South Salem walloped The Dalles, 32-19.

## FORTY-NINERS, RAMS TO HAVE SELL OUT

**San Francisco**—The San Francisco Forty Niners, three-point underdogs, tangle with the Los Angeles Rams today before a sell-out crowd of 59,000 in Kezar stadium.

Whipped by the Rams in their pre-season exhibition tilt, 40-38, San Francisco had to come from behind last Sunday to score its 23-20 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The odds-makers doubt that they can do it again against the strong Rams which, says Coach Frankie Albert "are the toughest in the western division."

But Albert will gamble again with his sophomore quarterback, John Brodie, who pulled the team together for the victory against the Steelers. However, if Brodie isn't getting the job done, Veteran Y. A. Tittle will be at the throttle in a hurry.

Playing with the quarterbacks in the backfield will be Hugh McElhenney and R. C. Owens at halves and Joe (Jet) Perry at full.

## Tony Anthony Sops McBride

**Baltimore**—Elongated but explosive Tony Anthony, who floored Archie McBride five times for a technical kayo, announced today, "I'm quitting the light-heavyweight division to go after the heavy-weight title."

Anthony's ninth-round triumph over heavyweight McBride in their return bout at the Coliseum here Friday night made the 23-year-old New Yorker eager to take on a heavyweight contender next.

Stubborn McBride, 29, of Trenton, N. J., suffered three more trips to the canvas Friday night than his two bounces in their first fight at Syracuse, N. Y., on Sept. 3. But in the Syracuse bout, Archie rallied so effectively that Anthony got only a disputed split decision.

## YMCA Swim Classes Billed

Swimming classes for beginners through life saving are now underway at the Young Men's Christian association.

The YMCA aquatic program is designed so the individual may progress at his own rate of development. Progression is from tadpole to flounder, flounder to minnow, minnow to fish, fish to flying fish and flying fish to shark. The fish, flying fish and shark classes are intermediate skill levels. When a person has reached the shark level he may then move into Life Saving.

Classes this fall at the Y are offered twice a week for each level. The weekday classes, after school, are designed for youngsters who live close to the YMCA. For youngsters who live in the country or out of town the classes are repeated on Saturday.

A play swim follows each lesson in which youngsters can practice the skills learned that day.

## California Stuns WSC By 34-14

**Berkeley, Calif.**—UP—California, unleashing a corps of fleet backs, stunned favored Washington State, 34-14, Saturday and ended a seven-game losing streak that had stretched back to last season.

Jack Hart's running and Joe Kapp's quarterbacking gave the Bears the start they needed in a nationally televised game that saw Bob Newman, the Cougar's vaunted passer, relegated to supporting role.

Hart intercepted one of Newman's heaves and raced it back 55 yards for a touchdown in the second period, then set up the third California score in the same quarter by teaming up with Kapp for a 28-yard gain which put the ball on Washington State's 10.

It was a bad day for Newman, who saw three of his passes get intercepted. In addition to Hart's theft, Steve Bates grabbed a Newman toss earlier on the California one and raced it back 38 yards out of danger, while Gus Gianullas grabbed another pass by Newman on the Bear's goal line in the fourth period and returned that one 20 yards.

Fumbles by Washington set the stage for two other Bear tallies, each of them being recovered by left end Charlie Tolston. In each case, fullback Bill Patton smashed over the touchdowns from seven and one yards away.

Newman did have his bright moments, however, and hit Leroy Rath for touchdown passes in the second and the fourth periods. One was from 24 yards out and the other from seven to climax a pair of sustained drives.

## SPORTS McLoughlin Victor Over Ashlanders

McLoughlin of Medford moved out after a slow start here Friday and bounced Ashland 19 to 0 in a ninth grade football game.

The Bulldogs got their first touchdown in the second quarter after Ashland had lost the ball on downs on its own 33. Jim Dexter cracked 22 yards to the 11. George Clearwater mate to the three and to the one. A motion penalty set Mac back to the six but Dexter smacked over the goal on the next play.

In the third period a quick kick put Ashland back to its 27. David Caldwell, trying to pass was dumped for a 10-yard loss and Rod Fuller lost 14 more to the three in punt formation. Fuller kicked out and Craig Laurence of McLoughlin ran the ball back 22 yards to the three. Dexter scored on the next play and converted for 13 to 0.

## Pass Scores

A third quarter pass, Laurence to Bob Clausen for 36 yards, was the other scoring play. The Bulldogs got to the Ashland 23 in the fourth but an interception stopped the drive. Later Dexter intercepted a Caldwell pass and ran the ball to the Ashland eight. McLoughlin reserves gave up the ball four plays later on the one-yard line.

Deepest drive for Ashland was to the McLoughlin 30.

Penalties for offside and illegal movement held down the Bulldogs.
