GOP Candidate Attacks Benson

Klamath Falls—(UPI)—Marion T. Weatherford, Republican candidate for Congress from the second congressional district, took issue with Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson while visiting the southern reaches of the sprawling district Monday.

Weatherford said he disagreed with Benson's ideas on acreage allotments and farm prices and with the secretary's soil bank and flexible price supports theories. The Arlington wheat farmer said Benson did not listen to the producers and that farmers should not listen to Benson when he tells them they "never had it so good."

The campaign swing was Weatherford's second around the 18-county district which is larger than the six New England states. He said he hadn't missed a town, even visiting Fort Rock in northern Lake county, which is still without telephone service.

Weatherford said Oregon Technical Institute here should be strengthened and expanded with Federal aid for which it is eligible "because of its outstanding progress in the nuclear field."

Only the family pets were confused.

The machinists switched houses, wives and children after their marriage in separate ceremonies last Friday at Las Vegas, Nev.

The mate-swapping marriage ended a relationship of several years during which the two couples wore identical clothing to dances and were the best of friends.

Recently, the two couples sat down for a frank discussion and decided that they really belonged, not to each other, but to the other's mate.

They decided then to do something about it.

Underwood took a leave of absence from Convair where he worked alongside Holloway and went to establish six-weeks residence preparatory to divorcing Dolores, 38, his wife of 16 years.

Holloway's wife of 21 years, Olive, 40, went along at the same time to establish residence to divorce her husband. The couples shared the costs of the preparation.

In the divorces Mrs. Underwood was given custody of

her three children, Donna, 13, Gail, 8 and Gregory, 7. Mrs. Holloway retained custody of her children, Donald, 17, Sandra, 14 and Terrence, 8.

A fourth child of the Holloways, Bill, 20, was not involved in the marital negotiations. Each wife was granted \$30 weekly support.
