PAUL McCORMICK JR.
A Requiem Mass for Paul McCormick Jr., 75, of 21 No. Berkeley way, Medford, who died at home Wednesday morning, will be read by the Rev. William McLeod at Sacred Heart Catholic church Friday morning at 9 a.m. Recitation of the Holy Rosary will be held in Conger-Morris Funeral home Thursday at 7:30 p.m. The body will be taken to Billings, Mont., for entombment.

Mr. McCormick was born April 5, 1883, at Junction City, Mont. Prior to 1926 he was engaged in the cattle business in eastern Montana. From 1926 to his retirement in 1953 he served as district supervisor for the enforcement of the Packers and Stockyards act for the United States department of agriculture, with headquarters at North Portland, Ore., and Billings, Mont.

He served as a captain of cavalry on the Mexican border in 1916, and had overseas duty in World War I. From 1926 to 1933 he held the reserve rank of major in command of the Seventeenth Cavalry, an inactive army regiment with headquarters at Portland.

Mr. McCormick has lived in Medford for the past two years, having moved here from Billings, Mont.

Survivors include his wife, Blanche; a son, Philip McCormick, and a grand daughter, Mary Kay Lehman, all of Medford; and two sisters, Mrs. Fred B. Clarke, Long Beach, Calif.; and Mrs. Guy Williams, Artesia, Calif.

Three Schools to Get Instrument Kits

Three Jackson county schools are scheduled to receive radiological defense instrument kits for use in high school science classes, Col. Arthur M. Sheets, state civil defense director, has announced.

The instruments will serve to acquaint students with the general principles underlying radiation phenomena, he said. The distribution is being made by the office of civil defense mobilizations, and is part of a nation-wide program in which the kits will be distributed to 6,000 high schools.

Schools in Jackson county to receive kits are Ashland, Medford, and Crater High school in Central Point.

Each kit contains nine instruments, two comparison standard sources for food and water, and a manual of instructions, Colonel Sheets said.

Railroad shares, helped by a rise of more than a point in Denver and Rio Grande Western, moved to within a fraction of their high for more than a year.

Residents Reminded Of Spraying Peaches

Valley residents are reminded that the weather is perfect to spray peach trees for peach blight control, Clifford B. Cordy, county agent, explained that the spray should be applied prior to rainy weather.

He added that when the leaves fall off it is too late to spray for blight. This is also an excellent time to control leaf curl, he said.

Spray to be used to control blight is 14 pound of neutral copper to three gallons of water.
