Radioactivity Leaks Checked Following Underground Blast

Atomic Test Site, Nev.—UPI—Atomic Energy Commission teams checked for leaking radioactivity today in a desert mesa which smothered an underground nuclear detonation deep within its rocky vitals.

A nuclear device, dubbed "Tamapais" and designed to yield less energy than 1,000 tons of TNT, was detonated Wednesday in a blast chamber at the end of a tunnel bored into the 7,000-foot mesa.

It was the third shot in the AEC's 10-shot fall series which might be this nation's last if agreement is reached on an international ban on the testing of nuclear weapons.

Scientists, faced with the prospect of firing seven shots in the next 22 days, went to work immediately on the fourth detonation—a 100-foot tower blast scheduled for Friday.

Observers witnessed the underground detonation from two and a half miles distance, but there was nothing spectacular to see as the rock-crushing force of the nuclear explosion at least 415 feet in the interior of the mesa.

Cloud of Dust
Newsmen saw a cloud of dust ascend from the side of the mesa and faintly felt the earth tremble, like a freight train was passing in the distance.

Findings collected here and at private and government seismograph stations across the nation will be reported to the U.S. Coast and Geodetic survey in Washington, D.C.

The scientists hope to learn more about the way energy travels through the earth and the substance of the earth by studying the seismic signals.

McDougall To Take Part in Program

Jerome McDougall, Medford, chairman of the Oregon Education association's state television committee, will discuss the relationship of the committee to school audio-visual personnel at the fall conference of the Oregon Audio-Visual association Saturday at Oregon college of Education, Monmouth.

About 150 persons are expected to attend the conference, according to Jack Edling, president-elect and director of the OCE audio-visual materials center. The conference will deal with clarification of the role of a audio-visual personnel in Oregon's schools.

James W. Sherburne, dean of the Oregon general extension division, will be among the speakers.

Troops To Be Out of Lebanon By Month's End

Washington — UPI — Announced plans to pull all U.S. military forces out of Lebanon by the end of this month appeared threatened today by increased violence and the heightened political crisis in that country.

The State Department announced Wednesday that the U.S. expected to have the last of its troops out of Lebanon by Oct. 31 "barring unforeseen developments." It said today that was still the schedule but acknowledged that events of the past 24 hours had increased the possibility that some U.S. troops might have to remain beyond that date.

Await Developments

Further decisions on the schedule would await developments in Beirut, where the situation still was not clear.

The State Department early today still had no information as to whether or not Premier Rashid who has been in office only two weeks, had resigned. There were conflicting reports on this from Beirut.

Nevertheless, officials said it was clear that the situation, where supporters of former President Camille Chamoun are trying to overthrow the new government selected by President Faud Chehab, had taken a definite turn for the worse which might lead to extremely serious developments.

Domestic Origins

The State Department position, as explained in the announcement Wednesday, was that "the current unrest appears to have essentially domestic origins." The American forces were sent there to guard against outside interferences, the department pointed out, and that situation seems to have improved.

The greatest possibility that some American soldiers might have to stay beyond the Oct. 31 deadline probably would arise from the necessity to protect American lives and property if the current turmoil got completely out of hand.
