The Veterans Administration has found that hiring of the handicapped is good business and has done something about it. Through the efforts of their many appointing officers in their central office and their many field installations, hundreds of handicapped are being utilized in gainful employment.

One has only to look at the employment records of any Veterans Administration installation and observe the handicapped at work.

A physician who cannot walk due to polio but does an excellent job from his wheelchair.

A guard suffering from an acute heart attack continuing to work as a file clerk.

Unnumbered amputees doing outstanding jobs as prosthetic officers.

The excellent job performance of the blind as clerk typists in typing pools.

X-Ray technicians developing film in darkrooms with very few realizing the blindness they suffer is not a handicap.

The personnel officer performing his duties well above reproach though industrially blind.

The supply clerk cheerfully and efficiently carrying out required duties and the use of a hearing aid keeps contact with activity around him.

The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Mrs. J. F. — Mildred shouldn't be burdened with a problem child.
Mildred K. — I promised to be a mother to her.

Mrs. J. F. — I am a widow and I live with my daughter, who is in her late 20s. Mildred was married a year ago to a widower about ten years older. This man has a little girl of 7.

I did my best to prevent my daughter from making the awful mistake of this marriage. This man just isn't our kind and Mildred will never be happy with him. Even worse is the problem of the child. She is a real brat—fresh, sneaky and pesky. She has no respect for my daughter and won't obey anyone but her dad.

I feel Mildred ought to put her foot down. She ought to tell her husband she can't take care of this child and that the little girl should be brought up by her aunts or should be sent to a boarding school. A young woman like Mildred shouldn't be burdened with such a child.

Mildred K. — In spite of all the things my mother says against my husband, I happen to love him. I have never been as happy as I have been with him.

The little girl, Wendy, has been a big problem. But my husband and I discussed this before we were married and I agreed to try to be a mother to her. Wendy has been under the care of her aunts, who spoiled her for many years. I am trying to undo some of the damage.

My mother feels I am too young to be burdened with such a responsibility, but many women my age have several troublesome children to handle. Why shouldn't I do as well as they?

My mother makes things harder by pitying me and

Certainly the first year of the kind of marriage Mildred has made involves some rough sledding. It is not easy to suddenly become a mother to a 7-year-old child whose home life has not been normal in the past.

Mrs. J. F. has undoubtedly made matters worse by taking an overly critical attitude toward the little girl, who must feel quite insecure in her new environment.

Mildred seems to be on the right track and Mrs. J. F. must force herself to take a back seat in Mildred's life from now on. She should try to find new friends and interests of her own, leaving her daughter free to live her new and fuller life.
