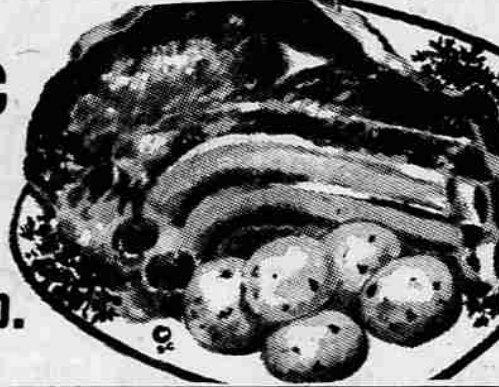

Balloon Pilot in Secret Talks After 19-Mile-High Trip

Alamogordo, N.M. - (UPI) - Lt. Clifton M. McClure huddled in top secret sessions with Air Force officials early today to describe his reactions to conditions on the edge of space during his flight in a giant balloon rig nearly 19 miles above the earth's surface.

The 280-foot, helium-filled bag touched down early Wednesday night at the White Sands missile range, about 30 miles northwest of Alamogordo.

McClure, 26, of Anderson,

S.C., stepped from an instrument-jammed gondola under his own power and then was whisked off in an Air Force helicopter to a top-secret area for a routine physical examination and questioning.

In Good Condition He was released from the base hospital today "in good physical condition," but was hospitalized from newsmen until at least 2 p.m. (p.s.t.) when the briefing was to end.

A terse report by the Air Force indicated McClure was forced to return to earth earlier than expected apparently because of a failure in refrigeration equipment on the gondola.

The flight was scheduled to last for 24 hours. McClure went aloft at dawn and touched earth again at 5:45 p.m. (p.s.t.).

McClure radioed that he could "see the edges between darkness and light" from his highest position of 99,300 feet above the rolling desert floor. He described it as a "very startling sight."

Nine experts followed the flight of the balloon in a van on the ground, constantly firing questions at McClure as to what he saw.

Another Setback The premature return of the balloon was another in a series of setbacks in the Air Force project titled "Manhigh III." The launching was switched from Crosby, Minn., last week because of a rush of northern weather. The flight was called off at Alamogordo Monday because of adverse weather conditions. On Tuesday, a sudden wind collapsed the first balloon. The Air Force used its last spare balloon in Wednesday's lift.

The data recorded will be coupled with McClure's verbal account to give scientists some answers to questions about what future space travelers will encounter.

Nixon Points to Integrity of Administration

Philadelphia - (UPI) - Vice President Richard M. Nixon said today the Eisenhower administration is one that has maintained one of the highest levels of honesty and integrity in history.

He told a Republican breakfast rally here before leaving for Columbus, Ohio, on a drumbeating tour for the GOP that Sherman Adams resigned because "He had made a mistake" but there was "no proof or indication that public interest had suffered."

Many Said in Jail "About the only way you could get anybody out of the government during the Truman administration, was to put them in jail - and it happened to scores of people," he said.

Nixon said the Eisenhower administration came through for the people on both domestic and foreign fronts. He said the enthusiasm shown by citizens' groups in 1952 and 1956 should continue this year.

Valley Residents Should Get Facts On Basin Program

Residents of the Rogue River valley are obligated to get the facts on proposed Rogue basin development to make up their minds on whether the plans are warranted and to make their decision known to the Corps of Engineers. That was a declaration by Bill Jess, Eagle Point, in a talk to Medford Kiwanis club yesterday.

Jess, president of the Rogue River Basin Flood Control and Water Resources association, addressing Kiwanians at Rogue Valley Country club, outlined what is known of Engineers plans and listed benefits.

Facts on basin studies are expected to be made available early next year. First step for residents of the valley is to get the facts and the next to make up their minds on them, Jess pointed out. The basin matter is "one decision we're all going to have to make and are going to have to live with it as long as we live in this area," he stressed.

The speaker mentioned to the bureau of reclamation proposals which were turned down 10 years ago. He said that if the Corps of Engineers plans are turned down, the door will have been shut on both federal departments, which are engaged in basin study, planning and development. If residents turn the Engineers' plans down they should recognize what they are foregoing and why, he stated.
