

# Tornado, Comets Bill Crosstown Grid Rivalry Here This Evening

It's "crosstown rivalry" tonight on the Medford High gridiron with the Black Tornado entertaining its nearest Class A-1 adversary, the Crater Comets of Central Point.

Game time in this Southern Oregon conference and District 6 scuffle is 8 p.m.

Medford, No. 2 rated among the preps of Oregon, aims to launch its league slate impressively. Crater, unranked and unheralded, has something else in mind—a stirring, rousing upset.

The Black Tornado, with victories behind it over a couple of rated foes and with more depth of gridiron talent, is the favorite this evening, but the Comets are prepared for iron men efforts. "Even though they know the odds against them, I think they're going to give them a battle," Coach Leonard Warren of the Comets stated. He said that Crater spirit is high and that the team is "as ready as it's going to be."

### Medford Serious

In Medford, Coach Fred Spiegelberg has brought out that the Tornado is not taking this fracas lightly. He pronounced the Big Wind squad in generally good shape except for a few ailments, most of them minor.

The mentor reported that sophomore Dick Ragsdale may have the starting call at left halfback in place of Gerry Lyons, who suffered a shoulder injury in the Marshfield tangle. Lyons has had no contact work all week. End Jerry Anderson is a doubtful starter because of a touch of flu and Lowell Dean may have first call on offense.

Medford matches a multiple but basically single wing offense against the T of Crater. The Black Tornado has ball packing threats in Ron Reich, Skip Bennett and Lyons, and passers in the persons of Ragsdale and Lyons. With an attack similar in style to Marshfield's, the Comets have good runners in Bob Fowler, Allen Barnes, Kerman Bennett and Loyal Higginbotham, and good passing with Wayne Allen on the throwing end.

Medford and Crater High and McLoughlin and Hedrick Junior High bands and Medford and Crater pep groups will combine to entertain at the game with the halftime presentation having an Oregon Centennial theme.

### Boyd Engages Jim Beecham

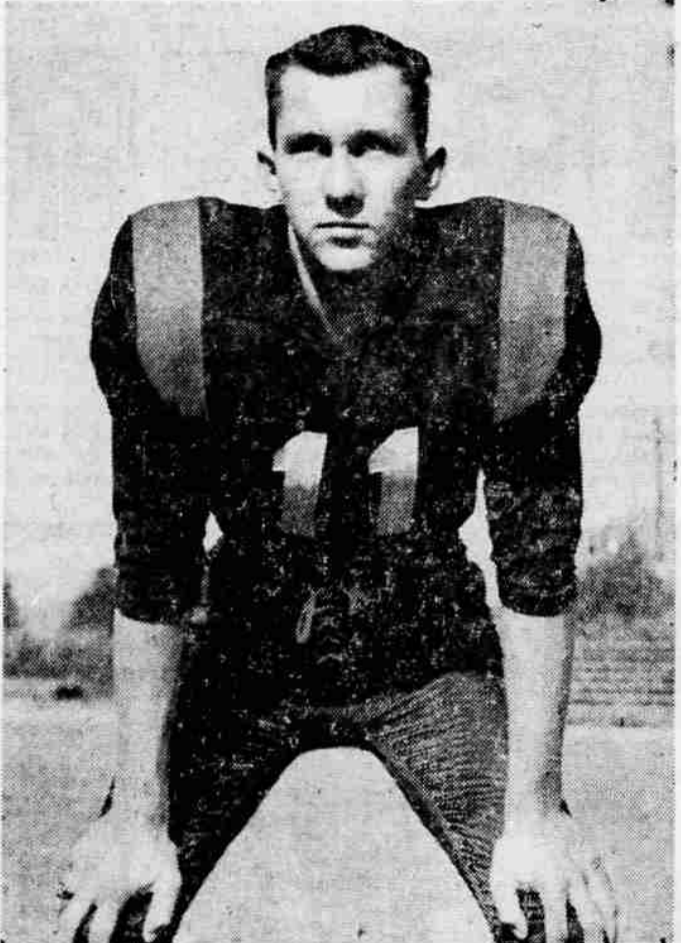

### U.S. Team 4 Strokes Off of Pace

St. Andrews, Scotland—(UPI)—Charley Coe of Oklahoma City, Okla., was carrying the load for the United States squad today as it entered the third round of World Amateur golf team championship, four strokes back of pace-setting Britain.

Coe, winner of this year's U.S. National Amateur title, saved the day for the Yanks again Thursday when he turned in a 77 on the windy old course after an opening round 74.

Bill Hyndman of Philadelphia, who opened with a 79, also turned in a 77 during the second round while Billy Joe Patton of Morganton, N.C., had a 78 and Dr. Frank Taylor of Pomona, Calif., shot a 79.

Britain reached the halfway mark of this 72-hole championship with a team total of 461. New Zealand slipped into second place with a 462, followed by the U.S. with 465 and Australia 470.
