

Bird Hunting Season Opens on Saturday

Portland - (UPI) - The upland game bird season gets underway in Oregon at 8 a.m. Saturday and at the same time the water-fowl season opens for a 95-day run.

The seasons run through Nov. 16 for upland birds and through Jan. 13 for water-fowl.

The state game commission said reports from biologists throughout the state indicated this year would be one of the best for upland birds for a long time. The waterfowl populations in the Pacific flyway also show a gain from last year.

West side hunters were cautioned there is no open season on bobwhite and valley quail in Linn county. In addition, the Hungarian partridge is protected throughout the area west of the Cascade summit.

The commission said water-fowl gunners would have to depend primarily on local birds for early shooting. A few migrants are coming into the state but no real buildup has taken place with the exception of the Klamath-Tulelake area where about five million birds, mostly pintails, are reported.

Hunters were urged to check their regulations.

Dickerson Lost to UCLA; Barnes Assumes Duties

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Coach George Dickerson, 45, named to succeed the late Henry (Red) Sanders as head football coach at UCLA, was confined to the UCLA Medical Center today with no hope of coaching the rest of the year.

He was readmitted to the Medical Center Thursday night on the eve of UCLA's game with Florida tonight in the Coliseum. Doctors said he must have "complete rest of not less than three months."

A UCLA spokesman said Dickerson was in a state of "complete physical exhaustion" and would be "lost to the Bruins for the remainder of the football season."

First Assistant Billy Barnes was named by UCLA Athletic Director Wilbur Johns to take over Dickerson's duties as head coach.

It was Barnes who assumed head coaching duties in preseason practice when Dickerson was hospitalized for 12 days for "nervous exhaustion." The head coach missed a week and half of workouts.

Dickerson was appointed head coach in August after Sanders died of a heart attack.

Almost immediately, Dickerson created a stir with charges that other schools were attempting to steal UCLA football players. His charges were climaxed when he flew to Berkeley and berated Cal Coach Pete Elliott in his office.

Dickerson complained to Elliott of the activity of Cal's chief recruiter in Southern California and drew a bitter blast from Elliott on his return to UCLA that the Bruins coach had broken a trust.

Raiders, Vikings Vie On Saturday Evening

Portland - Portland State's stingy pass defense and Southern Oregon's high-powered passing attack meet head-on Saturday night in an Oregon Collegiate conference football game at Ashland.

The two teams carry identical won-loss records of 1-2 into the fray and both lost their most recent grid encounters. PSC dropped a thrilling 31-21 decision to Oregon Tech last week end, while Southern Oregon was routed 60-13 by powerful Lewis and Clark.

The Red Raiders, despite being crushed, managed to complete 25 passes for 267 yards against the Pioneers and displayed a wide-open style of attack that could explode at any time.

Jack Brown, who completed 23 throws against Lewis and Clark, handles the key quarterback job and has favorite receivers in Larry Maurer, Larry Yarnell and Jim McAbee.

Portland State will combat SOC's fine aerial game with an airtight pass defense that has allowed a slim 130 yards, only 9 completions in 35 attempts and that has picked off five errant tosses.

One member of that defensive secondary may not be ready for action against the Raiders, however, as Gary Hamblet, outstanding freshman, is nursing a bruised knee picked up against Oregon Tech.

Herman Winterholler, steady senior left halfback, will probably miss Saturday's battle due to a sprained knee, which was injured against the Owls. His place in the starting backfield will be taken either by freshman Al Parent or sophomore transfer Bernie Jones.

The rest of the Viking backfield will remain the same with George "Killer" Kane, sensational breakthrough threat, scheduled to start at right half. "Bulldog" Bill Turner, pile-driving senior, to open at fullback, and Ward Sayles, who hit 9 of 14 passes against OTI to run the club at quarterback.

Head Coach Les Leggett will take a 30-man traveling squad to Ashland for the OCC contest with Southern Oregon. The Vikings will leave by bus Friday morning and will arrive in Medford, team headquarters this week end, in time for an afternoon workout.

Milwaukee - (UPI) - The World Series was a story of heroes and hams and, ignoring the unusually large herd of goats, you had to give the halo to "Bullet Bob" Turley today.

There have been times in the past when they whispered that the baby-faced fast-baller wasn't the most stout-hearted of competitors. And there was no secret that he was in the Yankee doghouse after blowing the second game of the classic.

But it was Turley whose courage, as well as his craftsmanship, carried the New York Yankees back to the championship of the baseball world.

And, in so doing, Turley had to make as great a comeback as the Yankees — first and only other team since the 1925 Pirates to trail three games to one and come back to victory.

Wins Fifth Game

"Bullet Bob," who mastered a cunning curve ball this year to become a 21-game winner, was flattened in the second game of the series. He lasted only 25 pitches when he gave the Milwaukee Braves two singles, a double and a walk for four crushing runs.

But they hadn't seen the last of Turley.

He came back on Monday, with the Yankees trailing three games to one, and won the fifth game with a five-hit 7-0 shutout. Two days later they sent an SOS to the bull pen, with the Yankees leading by one slim run in the 10th and on and two out. Turley strode in and fired three pitches to close it out.

Gets Call Again

Then, Thursday, the Yankees put the finger on Don Larsen in the climactic seventh and final game only to find the "perfect game" man wanting. And when the Braves dashed him out of there with only one out and two on base in the third, it was Turley again who was summoned desperately from the tree-shaded bullpen in center field.

He got them out of that one and over the six and two-thirds innings he pitched yielded a mere two hits — even though one was a home run to Del Crandall.

When they handed out this halo, even the Braves admitted, they put it on a lion.

Invasions by Army, Navy Add Spice To Week End College Football Menu

Midwestern invasions by Army and Navy, both of them in the role of underdogs, adds an intersectional spice this Saturday to a college football program that will stress an increase in all-important conference competition.

Army visits Notre Dame in what will be their last meeting at least for several seasons, and Notre Dame is a highly controversial one-point favorite.

Navy, an untested rebuilt version of last year's Cotton Bowl champions, visits Michigan, a team that has been installed a five-point pick on the basis of its surprise 12-12 tie with Michigan State last week. The Wolverines played most of that one without backfield stars Stan Noskin and John Herstein and will be much stronger if they're back.

Intersectionals also dominate the slim Friday night program with Louisiana State a one-point choice over Miami of Florida in their clash at Miami's Orange Bowl, host UCLA is rated only even money because of its spotty record as it meets Florida, and Denver is a solid choice over visiting Montana in a Skyline Conference game.

In another major intersectional clash, Michigan State hopes to bounce back from that Michigan standoff when it meets Pittsburgh at East Lansing, Mich. The seventh-ranked Spartans are 12-point favorites.

The majority of big games on Saturday will be conference contests and the Big Ten is a typical example with five big games.

One of these, in which Ohio State's fifth-ranked Buckeyes who are defending national champions are seven-point favorites over Illinois, will be nationally televised.

Another big game is on tap in the Southeastern Conference where Auburn, the nation's No. 1 team, puts its 16-game winning streak—longest in the nation—on the line as a seven-point pick over a Kentucky team anxious for a shot at the league title.

Coast Schools Like Pass-Run Extra Pointers

New York - (UPI) - Major college football teams in the Midwest prefer the old kick after touchdown method over the new two-point conversion rule.

Pacific Coast schools, on the other hand, appear to be reaching for the newly-found gridiron gold mine and are trying to reap dividends with a pass or run after almost two of every three touchdowns.

A national survey by the NCAA service bureau reveals that most major colleges agree with the Pacific brand of football. A look-see of the first top 100 games played this season shows that more squads went for the controversial two-pointers after scoring than the traditional one-point kick. Results, however, proved there were fewer successful conversion efforts even though more conversion points were recorded.

Grill Heads NW Rushing

Portland - (UPI) - Gary Grill, the former Albany prep ace who scored three touchdowns for Lewis and Clark against Southern Oregon last week, holds the individual rushing yardage leadership among Northwest conference football players.

Grill has 344 yards in three games and an average of 8.7 per carry. In second place is Stan Solomon of Willamette, last week's leader.

Passing is led by Charlie Alvaro, College of Idaho, with 29 completions in 66 tries for 327 yards. Keith Driver of Willamette has the best percentage among passers with 12 for 22 and 54%.

Linfield and Hank Crawford leads in pass receptions with nine for 100 yards. Driver tops the punters with a 40.7 average.

Lewis and Clark holds the rushing and offense leadership with 932 and 1106 yards, respectively. College of Idaho has 335 yards passing.

Linfield fullback Sel Spray was named "back of the week" and Pacific guard Chuck Peterson was "lineman of the week."

Brown Has Conference Pass Lead

Portland - (UPI) - George (Killer) Kane, Portland State halfback, held the rushing lead among Oregon Collegiate conference football players today after the third week of the 1958 season.

Kane had 203 yards on 39 attempts. He also was tied with Larry Maurer of Southern Oregon in scoring with 18 points on three touchdowns.

Jack Brown of Southern Oregon led the passers with 35 out of 57. Brown hit 23 out of 39 against Lewis and Clark last week, for a new NAIA single game record. The old mark was set by Andy McDonald of Central Michigan in 1951 when he completed 21.

John Willmarth of Eastern Oregon has averaged 45.8 yards on 7 punts to lead that department.

Southern Oregon is first in passing as well as total offense. The Red Raiders have a 317-yard per game total offense average and 218 in passing. OCE leads in rushing with 177 yards.
