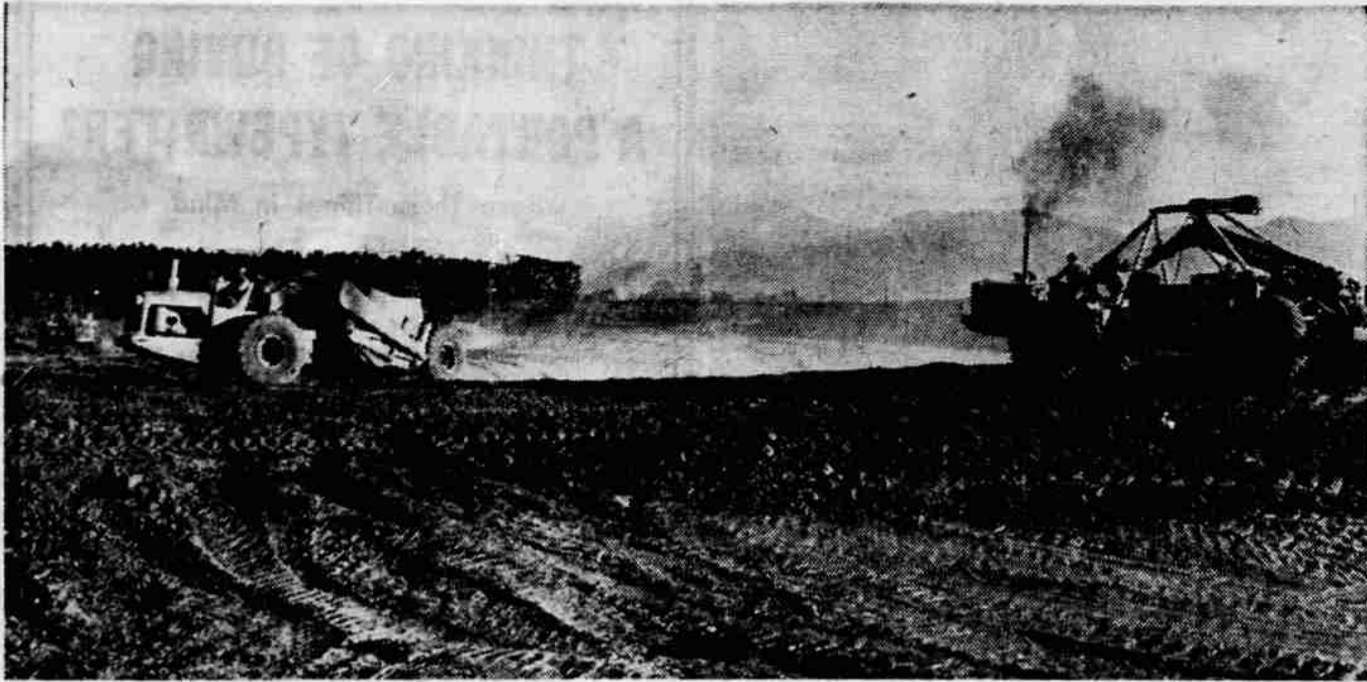

CAB Authorizes Additional Stops For Two Airlines

Washington—UPI—The Civil Aeronautics Board has authorized Pacific Airlines to extend its service from Northern California to Portland and West Coast Airlines to extend its service from the Northwest to San Francisco and Sacramento.

The CAB Friday granted Pacific Airlines the route from Crescent City, Calif., to Portland, and West Coast permission to fly from Salem, Bend-Redmond and Newport-Toledo, Ore., to San Francisco-Oakland and Sacramento.

West Coast was also authorized to fly into Salem. A request by Pacific Airlines to serve Reno on its San Francisco, San Jose, Sacramento run was held for further study.

Meanwhile Gov. Robert D. Holmes has recommended to the board that it extend service of West Coast Airlines through Oregon to include Salt Lake City, Utah.

"I feel that potential air traffic in eastern Oregon areas justifies first-rate single line service to and from major commercial and business centers with which eastern Oregon cities have community of interest," he said.

600 Students Have Departed From Little Rock

Little Rock, Ark.—UPI—About 600 students, a sixth of the total enrollment of Little Rock's four closed high schools, have transferred to schools outside the city.

Ashland—Southern Oregon college opened defense of its Oregon collegiate conference football title here last night by defeating Portland State college 21 to 14.

Portland, Ore.—UPI—Powerful Oregon scored on a 66-yard run by Halfback Willie West on the third play of the game and then rolled to a 25-0 Pacific Coast conference victory over fumbling Southern California Saturday night before a near capacity crowd of 32,734 fans in Multnomah stadium.

It was Oregon's biggest margin over the Trojans since 1915 when the Webfoots won 34-0 in the first game of a rivalry which ended Saturday night because of the impending breakup of the PCC.

West, a fleet junior from San Diego, got a block from Quarterback Dave Gross and outraced the pursuing Trojans into the end zone to start things off for the defending co-champion Webfoots.

U.S. Army Installs First Of Launchers

Taipei, Formosa—UPI—U.S. Army missilemen installed the first of their Nike Hercules launchers on a mountaintop near Taipei yesterday and began assembly of the atomic-capable ground-to-air rockets.

Veers From Path But Sets Record, Gives Vital Data

Achievement Ranks With Red's Sputnik I Washington—UPI—America's "Pioneer" moon rocket shot into space yesterday on an epoch-making flight that broke the barrier of gravity for the first time but failed to find a path to the moon.

Less than 15 hours after its pre-dawn launching at Cape Canaveral, Fla., the Air Force rocket had streaked 67,830 miles into unlimited space - a new altitude record for a man-made vehicle.

But the Defense Department said the Pioneer had veered too far off course to reach the "near vicinity" of the moon and go into the hoped-for orbit. Its ultimate destination was uncertain.

Despite its failure as a moon shot, the Pioneer was a tremendous scientific achievement, ranking with Russia's Sputnik I earth satellite as a milestone in man's attempted conquest of space.

First Free of Gravity It became the first man-made object to break free of the earth's gravity and in addition was supplying valuable scientific data that will bring closer the day of manned space flight.

A late position report, almost a third of the projected 225,000-mile trip to the moon, indicated the rocket might be slowing down or perhaps striking a course more parallel to the earth.

Shortly after it roared off the Canaveral launching pad at 4:42 a.m. (EDT), the Pioneer was clocked at 25,000 miles an hour. By 7:47 p.m., when the last speed check was reported, it was making about 3,000 mph.

Between 4:47 p.m. and 8:09 p.m., the rocket covered some 2,830 miles.

New Light

The signals it was sending back shed new light on the mysterious band of radiation that encircles the earth and now poses one of the barriers to man's first venture out of the earth's atmosphere.

It became apparent as early as 1:45 p.m. that the rocket was "departing from its intended trajectory." In a later announcement, the Pentagon said the Pioneer obviously would not come within 50,000 miles of the moon, the proximity necessary for the hoped-for orbit.

In the first 12 hours that it sped across the heavens, the rocket was hit by only one micrometeorite. As it penetrated deeper into space, its internal temperature began dropping from the 40 degrees reported earlier.

Maximum Reading Dr. W. W. Kellogg, acting chairman of the satellite panel of the International Geophysical year committee, reaffirmed an earlier report that the Pioneer show a radiation reading of four roentgens an hour when it was about 10,000 miles up. He said the data indicated this was a "maximum reading."

A roentgen is a unit of radiation. Atomic industrial workers are permitted to receive no more than three-tenths of a roentgen per week.

The Pentagon reported that all ground stations in the world-wide network of monitoring posts had obtained telemetering signals by 8:09 p.m. EDT.

Odds 10-1 Scientists estimated that the odds were 10 to 1 that the Pioneer would fail to circle the moon. Its failure in that regard did not detract greatly from its value as a scientific instrument and as a giant step for the United States in the race for space.
