Paris Favors Giant Buttons

This will be a year for giant buttons if the Paris designers have their way. Buttons on new French styles are oversized to go with new large collars of suits and dresses. Treatments of the buttons include textured effects, hand-carved or jeweled surfaces, two-toned types which go well with mohair fabrics, and use of gold wire and rhinestones.

Look for the shirtwaist for little girls this fall. The traditional style competes with the relaxed silhouette for the small fry set. The shirtwaist dresses come in old favorites like plaids, plus blues, rusts, brown, green and blue-green.

A new type of suit for college men is said to be "self-pressing." The fabric is a blend of acrylic fiber, dyneel, and wool. Tests showed wrinkles hang out overnight, and trouser creases resist the effect of rain or snow. The fabric also feels like flannel and withstands hard wear. It comes in herringbone patterns and stripes.

Men may turn into swash-buckling types when it comes to sportswear. A new trend is to "buccaneer" pants. They stop at mid-calf, with legs split up the side. Some models have rope belts. The pants come in white or navy, trimmed with contrasting stripes down the side, or in all-over striping.

Perk up an old tweed suit with a new fox collar. A fur that matches the fabric will bring the suit up to date. Try a red tweed with red fox. Make the collar detachable for easy cleaning, then the suit also can be worn into spring.

Take an idea from Maggy Rouff of Paris to modernize a fitted dress. Get two look-alike belts, in matching or contrasting colors and wear one at the waist, the other just under the bustline. They give a high-waisted effect.
