## Army Weapons Ready Market Among Collectors

Probably the largest group of specialists among gun collectors is the one who concentrates on those used by the Army. Certainly arms used by the Army are far easier to collect than those of any other branch of the armed forces if only because there are so many more of them.

That is true, however, only of those weapons that were in the widest use, such as the Colt .45 automatic, and does not apply to certain others that were ordered in limited quantity.

An example of this latter category is the 1899 model of the Smith & Wesson .38 revolver.

This six-shooter, which was also used by the Navy at the turn of the century, was purchased in limited quantity for the Army, probably not more than 1,000 being purchased in all.

It has a six-and-a-half inch, tapered blued barrel marked with the name of the Springfield, Mass., manufacturer. The fluted cylinder swings

**MEXICO REPRODUCES 1840 BRITISH STAMP TO HONOR POSTAL SERVICES**

If one country reproduces the stamp of another, the act is generally frowned upon as counterfeiting—just as much as if the item were paper money.

And so when an acquaintance told me he had just paid \$20 for an official reproduction of a British stamp by the Mexican government, I went along to take a look.

He was quite correct. The reproduction was a perfect likeness of the first stamp ever used for postage purposes. It was what is known as the one penny black that was issued in 1840.

However, the purchase in reproducing it was not to counterfeit but to honor the British for having made the greatest contribution to the development of postal service. The stamp was reproduced as a principal ornament on a series of large Mexican airmail stamps issued in 1940 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of postage stamps.

The reproduction was surrounded by the legend which

**BERRY DESIGN MARKS LATE VICTORIAN MILK-GLASS PICES**

Berry glass is that in which the principal feature of the design is berries.

It was quite common along in the 1870 and '80s, and today is generally has a fairly high collector's value.

Why there was such a rush to ornament sets of glassware with berries, I don't know. Probably one manufacturer brought out a design featuring currants, and when it caught on, a competitor countered with another honoring the raspberry. In any case, it wasn't too long before the glassmakers had to start doubling up, at which point glassware appeared featuring two and even three different kinds on the same item.

Just which kind of berry glass is the most sought after at the moment is impossible to say, but that with the strawberry design has long been one of the most desirable.

As a rule, the strawberry design is a simple one, consisting of a vine carrying both berries and leaves. Its use is

generally restrained. On the goblets, for example, the design is restricted to the lower part of the bowl, the upper part being left plain.

What firms made it I have been unable to learn, but it is usually found only in milk white glass. Even that, however, is rare enough so that the goblets command a price of from \$10 to \$18 each.

As for the pitcher that should go with them, that is so rare that I have seen only one. The owner most unreasonably demanded \$50 for it, and got it, too, though not from me.

Oddly enough, the strawberry design is rarer still in clear glass goblets in that commanding half again or even more as much as in the milk white.

So far as other colors go, I have seen one piece in the strawberry design that was appropriately done in red. It was a sugar bowl and was not for sale.

## Peddlers May Be Violating County Regulations

A number of peddlers may be violating an ordinance without realizing it, and the county may be losing some additional revenue also without knowing it, according to Karl Janouch, county treasurer.

Answering an inquiry from the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, Janouch discovered peddlers selling goods outside any city limits must make a deposit in the county treasurer's office equal to the license fee. The license fee is \$25 for those selling on foot and \$100 for those using "a conveyance." The regulation does not apply to those selling agricultural goods, Janouch said.

**May Be Charged**  
 Those violating this law may be charged with a misdemeanor and are subject to a fine of from \$50 to \$500 and, or to a jail sentence of from one to six months.

Janouch said he has not had any inquiries about this regulation since 1952 when a half dozen peddlers came in to ask about it. They left without paying anything, he said.

"No peddlers have that kind of money," the county treasurer said. "Also, most of them sell in the city limits. Then they come under city regulation and not county regulation."

Janouch said another thing which makes this law particularly undesirable from the salesman's point of view is that an invoice of the wares must be filed.

Last such license application filed was in April 30, 1947, according to the county treasurer's records.


