










Juveniles Spray Car With Bullets

Torrance, Calif.—A carload of juvenile hoodlums roared through a street Sunday night and indiscriminately sprayed it with bullets. One 14-year-old boy was wounded and a woman and a girl narrowly escaped.

Robert Hernandez Luna, 14, was wounded in the left foot with a .22 caliber slug. Mrs. Helen Rogers Brengarten, 49, and a 13-year-old girl, both walking along the streets at the time, were missed by the hail of bullets.

Police in the suburban Los Angeles city said the youths apparently were members of a juvenile gang.
