

# PCC Leads in Upset League But Beavers Follow Script

San Francisco—UPI—The Pacific Coast conference may not approach the summit of college football power this year but it certainly takes the back seat to no one in the upset department.

For instance: Washington breezed into town last weekend after putting up a hard-nosed stand against Big Ten powerhouse Ohio State, then promptly collapsed before winless Stanford, 22-12.

While the Huskies' tails were drooping at the farm, Oregon State rolled into Laramie, Wyo., only to suffer a humiliating 28-0 pasting to a so-so Cowboy squad and watch its Rose Bowl hopes all but go down the drain. The loss doesn't count in the PCC standings, of course, but will

be hard to live down when the faculty fathers pick the Rose Bowl representative after the campaign ends.

**Some Followed Script**

The Beavers, pre-season favorites to go to Pasadena next January as the dying PCC's final sacrificial offering to the Big Ten, had shut out a fair UCLA club, 14-0, the week before.

The rest of the contests on the Coast went pretty much to form.

Powerhouse Oregon, perhaps stronger than the Web-foot squad which came out on the long end of everything but the score against Ohio State at the big bowl last January, smashed Southern California, 25-0, in Portland. California ran Utah into the turf at Berkeley's Memorial stadium, 36-21, and College of Pacific coasted to a 26-8 triumph over Brigham Young university at Stockton.

Up north, Washington State squeezed out a hard-earned 8-0 win over Idaho in the 59th renewal of "the battle of the Palouse." UCLA dropped a 21-14 decision to Florida university in a Friday night contest at Los Angeles.

## Zora Folley Cooper foe At London

New York—UPI—Two international heavyweight fights feature this week's boxing schedule.

Zora Folley, top American contender for the heavyweight crown, fights Henry Cooper of England at Wembley Stadium, London, tonight. Unranked Cooper was making his bid for a shot at the title.

At Madison Square Garden, Friday night, contender George Chuvalo of Toronto, meets Pat McMurry of Tacoma, Wash., in a 10-rounder that will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC. Chuvalo, 21, and McMurry, 26, will be making their TV debuts. Canadian George is rated 10th among contenders and is a slight favorite at 13-10. McMurry is unranked.

**Folley Risks Prestige**

In the London fight, Folley risks his prestige. Zora of Chandler, Ariz., is ranked number one by the National Boxing Association and number two by the Ring Magazine. Cooper is unrated but he once knocked out Brian London, who recently stopped Willia Pastrano.

Wednesday's TV fight will be staged at the Montreal forum, where welterweight contenders Gil Turner and Ralph Dupas are slated for a 10-rounder. Dupas of New Orleans is ranked sixth, but he is favored at 2-1 to beat fourth-rated Turner of Philadelphia.

# Army Powerhouse Tops Football Teams

New York—UPI—Army, with a powerhouse reminiscent of the old Blanchard-Davis era, replaced Auburn atop the United Press International college football ratings today and once-mighty Oklahoma dropped out of the top 10 group for the first time since 1953.

Coach Earl (Red) Blaik's cranking Cadets, who conquered Notre Dame, 14-2, last weekend, moved into the No. 1 spot for the first time since Oct. 24, 1950—the year the UPI coaches' ratings were inaugurated.

Auburn, which now has a winning streak of 17 games, dropped back to second place followed in order by three Big 10 teams—Wisconsin, Ohio State and Michigan State. In a big shakeup of the top 10 group, Navy jumped up to sixth place, followed in order by Texas, Mississippi, Louisiana State and Notre Dame.

**Newcomers Listed**

Navy, Texas and Louisiana State were this week's newcomers in the select group. Oklahoma, upset 15-14 by Texas, dropped back to 11th place. This marked the first week since Oct. 6, 1953 that the Sooners were not among the top 10 teams in the nation. Other teams which dropped out of the top 10 were Pittsburgh and Purdue.

This week's voting again was scattered, seven teams receiving votes for first place. Army had 14, Auburn 10, Wisconsin 5, Ohio State 3, and Michigan State, Texas and LSU 1 each.

In points, distributed on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis for votes from first to 10th places,

Aldershot, England—UPI—The United States will strive to pick up ground on the favored Russians today when they resume competition in the five-day world pentathlon championship.

The Soviets jumped into the lead Monday as Capt. Nikolai Tatarinov of the Russian air force won the 2,500 meter cross-country riding event. Tatarinov displayed faultless horsemanship as he completed the event in 5:07 for 965 points.

Russia's Igor Novikov, defending individual champion, tied Dr. Imre Nagy of Hungary for second place with 950 points.

A United States trio showed comparatively fine skill as it placed within the top 10 in a field of 39 riders from 14 countries.

Moscow, Ida.—UPI—Pass defense will be the lesson for the Idaho Vandals, according to Coach Skip Stahley.

# SPORTS FANFARE

A proposal for change in Oregon high school athletic alignments, which would bring about shake-ups or additions in four Class A-1 districts, is outlined in a story in today's sports section. As this writer sees it, the plan would be no real improvement over present arrangements except for the eight schools in the Willamette valley who request it.

The schools seek to join in a district which will restore old rivalries, cut down travel with its compactness and resolve scheduling difficulties. In those respects such a circuit can be termed a "natural" and the schools have every right to petition for their plan. However, it appears that these schools, while having their own problems solved, would just be passing on headaches to someone else.

Should the Oregon School Activities association approve the plan, after study, it would spoil or lessen some of the other natural rivalries and throw a heavier travel burden on other schools, some of whom can less afford it.

**SCHOOL HEADS TO DISCUSS REDISTRICTING PROPOSAL**

A proposal for redistricting Class A-1 high schools in the Willamette valley and southern, southwestern and central Oregon for athletic purposes will be discussed at a meeting here Wednesday of superintendents and principals in present District 6.

Representatives of Ashland, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Crater and Medford High schools will convene for noon luncheon at McLoughlin Junior High School. The meeting has been called by Medford School Superintendent Leonard Mayfield to sound out district sentiment on the plan.

Mayfield was appointed by the Oregon School Activities association last week to a five-man committee to study the matter. The special OSAA committee is to convene at Eugene on Thursday morning. Old rivalries sought.

Willamette valley schools, who wish to restore old rivalries and apparently also achieve a closer knit circuit, have proposed the change. They want Springfield, North and South Eugene, Corvallis, Lebanon, Sweet Home, Albany and North and South Salem all in District 8.

They would put Marshfield and Roseburg into District 6 with Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls and Crater and Ashland into District 5 with Willamette, Cottage Grove, Douglas, Coquille and North Bend.

District 8 now includes Albany, Corvallis, Lebanon, Sweet Home and two Salem schools plus the central Oregon schools, Bend, Prineville and Redmond which probably would be switched to District 7. Marshfield, North Bend, Cottage Grove and Roseburg are now in District 5 with Springfield and the two Eugene schools. Coquille, Douglas and Willamette are now competing in different A-2 districts.

**PROTHRO PLANS BACK CHANGES**

Corvallis—UPI—Coach Tommy Prothro of Oregon State indicated today he may shake up his backfield before the Idaho game at Moscow Saturday.

Prothro indicated he may switch Dainard Paulson back to tailback from fullback and put wingback John Horroilo in the fullback position where injuries to both Nub Beamer and Jim Stinnette crippled the Beavers. He also said Paulson might start over both Paul Lowe and Leon Criner at tailback.

Derald Swift, who also has been on the injured list, might get the starting call at the blocking back spot over Gary Lukehart. With Horroilo at fullback, Earnel Durden probably would get the call at right half, or wingback.

Despite Oregon State's 28-0 loss to Wyoming, Prothro was not disheartened. "It isn't over yet," he said. "We've been in tight places before when we didn't look good."

**KING REDLEGS COACH**

Cincinnati—UPI—Clyde King will return to the major leagues next season as the Cincinnati Redlegs' pitching coach. The former Dodger relief ace was the personal selection of new Cincinnati Manager Mayo Smith, who labeled King "one of the best pitching instructors" in baseball.

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**Aussies Get Golf Title Of World**

The Australians achieved their victory in an 18-hole playoff Monday when Bruce Devlin and Bob Stevens sank long putts for birdies on the final green. That gave Australia the match, 222 strokes to 224, plus the huge silver Eisenhower Trophy that went with it.

Michigan State: Coach Duffy Daugherty sent his second team into scrimmage against the freshmen Monday, and

end Jason Harness suffered a cut over one eye. Center Arch Matsos and halfbacks Art Johnson and Jim Wulff sat out drills with injuries.

Minnesota: Coaches at Minnesota made some lineup changes to plug gaps caused by injuries. Right halfback Arlie Bomstad was sidelined with an injured arm, and second string end Jerry Friend is out with a bad knee. However, veteran right half Billy Chorske resumed practice after being out with a knee injury.

Wisconsin: Wisconsin's unbeaten football team rested and watched movies while the

reserves trounced the freshmen in a practice scrimmage. Standouts for the reserves were Gil Blackman, Dave Bichler, Bill Kellogg and Tom Anthony.

Northwestern: Coach Art Parseghian, happy over Northwestern's win against Minnesota, guarded against any letdown by promising an extensive drill on the Wildcats' offense this week. The squad came out of week end play without any major injuries.
