

Cooper Outpoints Folley; Yank Ring Prestige Hit Again

London (UPI)—Henry (Twin) Cooper, London's lightly regarded blond plasterer who upset Zora Folley—top American heavyweight contender—said today, "I expect a title fight with Floyd Patterson, and I expect to beat him."

Lanky Cooper, who delivered the third stunning blow to American boxing prestige within a month, had good reason to believe that his 10-round decision over Folley Tuesday night would boost him to a title shot.

Henry, twin-brother of less known heavyweight Jim Cooper, apparently has the inside track with Patterson's manager, Gus D'Amato, over the other two Europeans who recently beat invading American contenders.

Those European upset victors were Ingemar Johansson of Sweden, who knocked out Eddie Machen of Redding, Calif., in the first round, on Sept. 14; and Brian London

of England, who stopped Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach in the fifth round, Sept. 30.

Fought as Favored

Not only did Cooper snap the top American contenders' winning string at 21 bouts, before a capacity crowd of 9,000 at Empire Pool; but he fought as a favorite to promote Harry Levene of London, a warm friend of champion Patterson and D'Amato.

Cooper, who survived a third-round knockdown and bloody face cuts before outpointing Folley, had been promised a title fight if he licked the contender from Chandler, Ariz.

Levene said today, "Cooper earned a title shot. I hope to match him with Patterson for London in June. D'Amato promised me a title bout if I could produce a worthy contender. Cooper's my boy, and I'm confident he can beat Patterson."

At New York, D'Amato said, "Levene is my very good friend. Cooper will be given close consideration as challenger — if he deserved the decision last night—and the early reports indicate he did."

Coach Jim Sutherland of Washington State College admitted today he didn't know whether to concentrate on defense or offense for the game against Oregon at Eugene Saturday.

Sutherland said Oregon has one of the best defenses in the nation and is getting better every week on offense. "So what do we concentrate on?" he asked.

Bobby Newman, the nation's passing leader hurt against Idaho last week, is expected to see action against the Ducks but on a limited basis.

At Eugene, Coach Len Casanova continued to avoid heavy contact work. The Oregon mentor said his team wasn't deep enough to take a chance on practice injuries.

Oregon and Wisconsin lead the nation so far this season in the least number of points given up by major teams—six each.

All reserved seats for the Homecoming game at Eugene Saturday have been sold out but many general admission tickets still are available.

At Corvallis, Coach Tommy Prothro said he hoped that either injured Nub Beamer or Jim Stinnette would be able to help out at Moscow Saturday. Tackle Ted Bates and tailback Grimm Mason still are on the doubtful list with injuries.

Agagianian Stock Mounts

Vatican City (UPI)—Speculation hardened today that Gregory Peter XV Cardinal Agagianian, 63, an Armenian, would be the next pope if the Sacred College of Cardinals breaks with 400-year-old tradition and selects a non-Italian.

Generally the speculation remained wide open with the Italian press naming first one cardinal and another despite a stern admonition by the Vatican City newspaper Osservatore Romano. The election comes ten days from now in the Sistine Chapel of St. Peter's.

The situation was far different than in 1939 when Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli, the Vatican secretary of state, was the outstanding candidate. The College of Cardinals named him in a 20-hour session; the new conclave may last for days.

Most students of Vatican affairs agreed that Cardinal Agagianian, 15th patriarch of Cilicia of the Armenians, who was born in what is now Soviet Armenia, was the most outstanding non-Italian candidate.

Although his origins were in the Near East, most of his education was obtained and much of his adult life spent in the West. He is one of the most accomplished linguists in the Sacred college with a thorough knowledge of church and world affairs.

Storm Stalls Two Engines on Airliner

Tampico, Mexico (UPI)—A Guest Airways Constellation with 71 persons aboard encountered a storm Tuesday night over the Gulf of Mexico which stalled two of the engines but made a safe landing at the Tampico airport.

Delegates to a housing industry sponsored women's conference on housing said Tuesday they would willingly forego some features of the houses to insure trees in the yards.

They blasted builders for bulldozing trees from lots and recommended the builders plant trees where none exist.

The delegates criticized television antennas that grow from rooftops. While some were resigned to them, others thought the TV industry should develop some way to eliminate the antennas.

The home-makers also took an adamant stand for sidewalks — not for walking but as a place for their children to skate and ride tricycles and bicycles in safety. A few dissenters said they saw no reason to build sidewalks just as "a parking place for bikes."

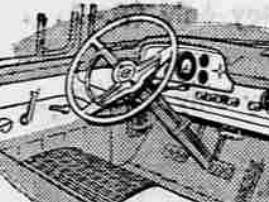
