The plane will fly at 4,000 miles an hour at altitudes of more than 100 miles, Norblad said before leaving.

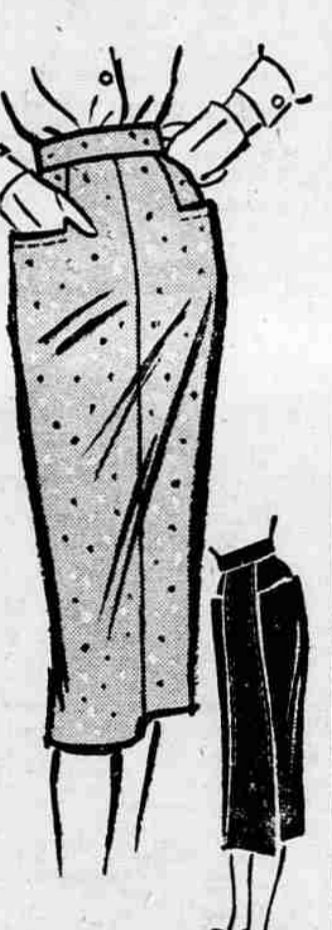
"It should prove that we are not only holding our own in the space age race but rapidly forging ahead," he added.

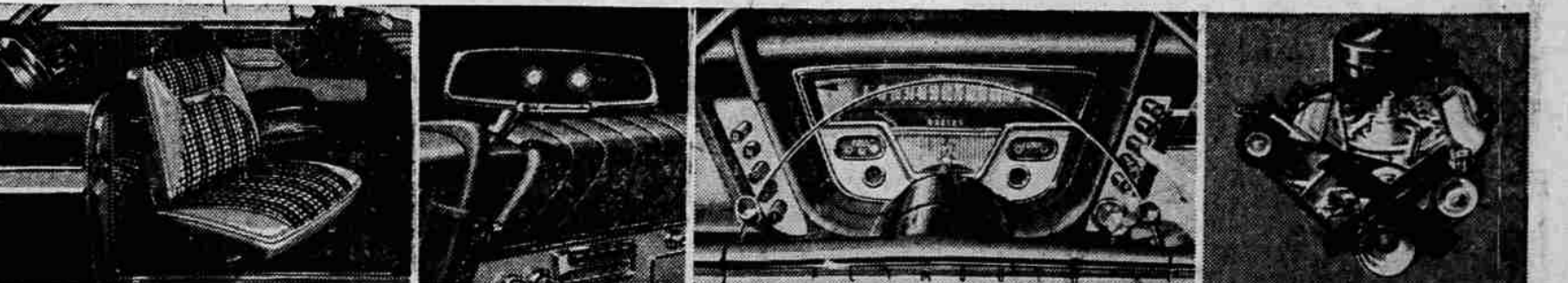
