Mechanics Vote Strike

Washington—UPI—Capital Airlines' 2,500 mechanics have voted to strike rather than accept a contract settlement recommended by a presidential emergency board.

The mechanics, members of the International Association of Machinists, asked the national headquarters Monday to approve a walk-out. No date was set, however. The IAM said 98 per cent of those voting favored a strike.

Las Vegas, Nev.—UPI—Comedienne Martha Raye said on Tuesday night she will soon marry a former Westport, Conn., policeman whose wife divorced her Tuesday, blaming the actress for wrecking the marriage.

Miss Raye, 42, said she and Robert O'Shea, 31, "will be married either here in Las Vegas or when we get back to New York." The star made the statement when informed that O'Shea's 21-year-old wife Barbara Ann, had been granted in Bridgeport, Conn., an uncontested divorce from O'Shea.

Mrs. O'Shea testified that before her husband resigned from the police force of fashionable, suburban Westport in 1956 he had worked part-time for Miss Raye as a bodyguard and that it had developed into "more than a job."

The pretty Mrs. O'Shea, a brunette mother of a 2-year-old girl, sued Miss Raye for \$50,000 for alienation of affections after her husband left her. The suit was settled out of court for a reported "substantial amount."

O'Shea will be Miss Raye's sixth husband. Husband No. 5, dancer Edward Begley, divorced the comedienne in 1956 in Juarez, Mexico.

Law Violation in Pope Vote Seen

Washington—UPI—An organization backing separation of church and state claimed today that American cardinals who vote for a new Catholic pope will be violating their U. S. citizenship.

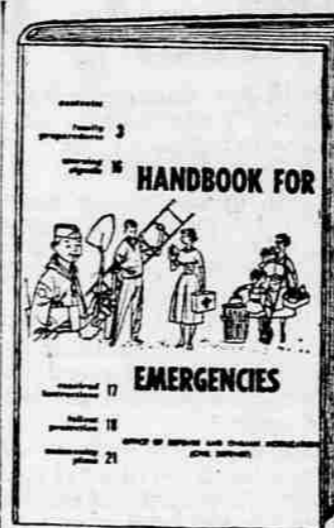
Glenn L. Archer, executive director of Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State, raised the question in a letter to Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Archer said the U. S. immigration and naturalization law provides that a citizen "shall lose his nationality by... voting in a political election in a foreign state or participating in an election or plebiscite to determine the sovereignty over foreign territory."

He said "it is commonly recognized that the pope is a head of a foreign state," and U. S. citizens have no more right to vote in a papal election than in any other foreign election.

The letter urged Dulles to notify the three American Catholic cardinals—Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York, Edward Cardinal Mooney of Detroit and James Francis Cardinal McIntyre of Los Angeles—that they will be violating U. S. law by taking part in the selection of a new pope starting Oct. 25.

March AFB, Calif.—UPI—A B47 crew from the 9386th Bombers Wing at MacDill Air Force Base, Fla., today held a slim lead at the start of the third day of the 10th annual Strategic Air Command bomb and navigation competition.

Lt. Col. Ernest I. Ticknow, 34, of Adair, Iowa, and his pace-making crew have racked up a total of 398.4 points to capture a precarious lead over 78 American and four British crews competing in the two phases of the meet.

Mansfield Raps Alcorn for Accusing Demos of Blocking Far East Solution

Washington—UPI—Sen. Mike Mansfield today bitterly assailed GOP Chairman Meade Alcorn for accusing Democrats of blocking a Far East settlement. He intimated Alcorn himself violated the U.S. secrecy pledge on its Warsaw negotiations with Red China.

Mansfield, a leading Democratic foreign policy spokesman, made the statements to United Press International after Alcorn charged "appears in the Democratic Party" had "dragged the Formosan issue into this campaign."

Alcorn in a public statement Tuesday night, said the "appears" had "endangered the diplomatic objectives of the United States" and added:

"The Red Chinese ambassador in Warsaw, in fact, has been using Democratic political speeches on foreign policy to delay settlement of this problem which threatens the peace of the world."

Dulles Makes Appeal
Alcorn's statement was issued shortly after Secretary of State John Foster Dulles had appealed to both Democrats and Republicans to "calm down" and stop injecting the Formosa issue into the congressional campaign.

A State Department spokesman had "no comment" when asked if Alcorn's remarks went counter to Dulles' no-politics appeal. He also said he could not comment on Alcorn's statement about the Warsaw talks.

"We have a pledge with the Chinese Communists not to talk about the Warsaw discussions," the spokesman said. He added he did not know where Alcorn had gotten his information.

Asked where he had obtained the information about the Warsaw talks, Alcorn said at first it had "been reported in the press" but then went on to intimate he had received it from the State Department.

He said he had "good reason to believe it to be accurate" and acknowledged he conferred with Dulles last Sunday.

Mansfield Disturbed
Mansfield, assistant Senate Democratic leader and a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said he was "deeply" disturbed and disappointed that the subject of foreign policy is being made a political football by the chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Interviewed by telephone in New York where he is attending the U.N. assembly meeting as a member of the U.S. delegation, Mansfield said he had hoped because of the "dangers" involved that both parties would discuss their merits and in a constructive manner to the end.

Calling for the "fullest possible support" to the administration on the basis of results to date in the Formosa crisis, Mansfield added the "stakes are too high for a politician to try to make capital out of a

situation which may have dangerous possibilities for all of us."

Denies Alcorn's Charge
As to Alcorn's charge that Democratic speeches had given the Chinese Communist envoy at Warsaw ammunition for delaying tactics, Mansfield said "to the best of my knowledge that has not been done."

He suggested, the Red ambassador might have drawn on statements by columnists in U.S. newspapers.

"It's a good idea to know what is going on in Warsaw through the lips of the Republican National Committee chairman," Mansfield added.

A spokesman for the Democratic National Committee said Committee Chairman

Paul M. Butler would have no comment on Dulles' no-politics plea until he saw how Vice President Richard M. Nixon and other Republicans reacted to the secretary's ground rules. The spokesman

added that Butler felt Democrats had a right and duty to engage in "constructive, temperate discussions of foreign policy" that did not "impugn the loyalty or patriotism of the opposition."
