Shasta Ski Bowl Open For Season, Road Completed

Yreka, Calif.—Chairs were to be mounted starting today on the \$300,000 ski lift in the Mt. Shasta ski bowl, it was reported.

Contractor for the 6,552 foot lift is Heron Engineering company of Denver, Colo. The lift will take skiers and view-seekers from 7,800 feet to 9,300 feet on a 20-minute ride.
Paving of the final seven miles of the Everitt Memorial highway was completed Tuesday. A 14-mile road will take visitors and skiers into the ski bowl. Contractor is Jess W. Briggs, Redding. The work was completed in approximately two-thirds of the time allotted under a U. S. bureau of public roads contract.
The ski bowl is already receiving reservations for the lodge, it was reported. The building will start serving food Saturday with a smorgasbord dinner. The snack bar will be open also.
Next year an aerial tramway is planned which will carry skiers up to 11,127 feet where there is a natural bench of year-around snow.
The memorial highway was named for John Everitt, Shasta national forest supervisor who died in a sudden nighttime flare-up just below Panther meadows where the ski bowl is located. He died more than 20 years ago.

New York—Stocks declined in the first half of today's session and then turned higher under the leadership of metals, low-priced autos, steels, and special issues.
After the industrial average had touched its low on a three-day loss of more than 14 points stocks looked attractive again to some investors.
A sizable group of them moved up 2 points more, including Polaroid, Litton, International Telephone, Magna Copper, Consolidated Electronics, Zenith, Lorillard, Brunswick Balke, and Youngstown Sheet & Tube.
Studebaker-Packard, whose stockholders accepted a re-financing plan, rose a full point to a new high and led the market in turnover. American Motors rose more than a point.
