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GOLD HILL Council to Open Bids

Gold Hill - A special meeting of the Gold Hill city council will be held Monday evening, Oct. 20, to open bids on drainage facilities on Second ave. Bids are to be in by 5 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 17. At the last meeting of the council, a curfew ordinance was passed. The curfew hour is 9 p.m. and covers ages up to and including 19 years. Parents of violating children will be held responsible, with fines being not less than \$5 and not more than \$100, imprisonment in the city jail will not be less than one day and more more than 20 days.

The curfew issue was brought about due to the request of Police Chief Floyd Taylor so police would have backing in keeping youngsters off the streets late at night. The curfew went into effect on Oct. 6.

There will be three seats on the council open, each for a four-year term. Five men have filed petitions seeking election Nov. 4. They are Delos Walker, Fred Lester, Fred Lewis, Olov Lokken, and Kendall Dufur. The latter is seeking reelection to the council. Other councilmen whose terms expire this year are Floyd Lance and Melford Hood.

Milton Steinmetz has filed as candidate for mayor, now held by Ernie Cooper, whose term expires this year.

Ferd Jones, is seeking reelection as city recorder. Both are unopposed.

Ex-Servicemen Get Jobless Pay

A permanent unemployment insurance program will give coverage soon to Oregon ex-servicemen, according to the state unemployment compensation commission.

The new program allows a peacetime serviceman who registers for employment to collect jobless benefits while looking for a civilian job. Earlier laws covered only World War II and Korean veterans.

A serviceman may receive unemployment compensation if he has had 90 or more continuous days of active service in the Armed Forces, a spokesman said. His service must have begun after Jan. 31, 1955, or active service ended after Oct. 27, 1958. Also, he must have been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

Servicemen will not receive benefits until after periods covered by lump-sum terminal leave and mustering-out payments, it was explained. Unemployment benefits may be held up when a serviceman is receiving educational and training allowances.

The Oregon agency will take claims and administer the program and will be reimbursed for added benefit and administrative costs.

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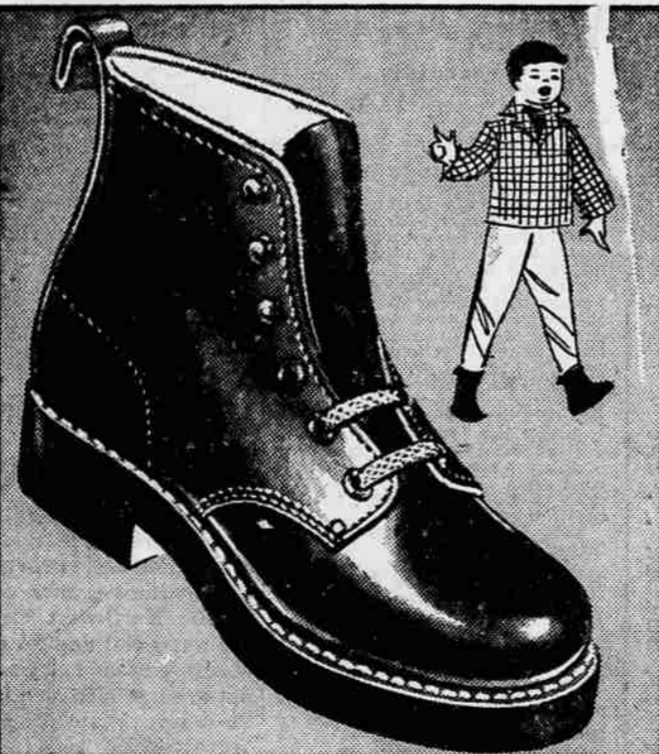
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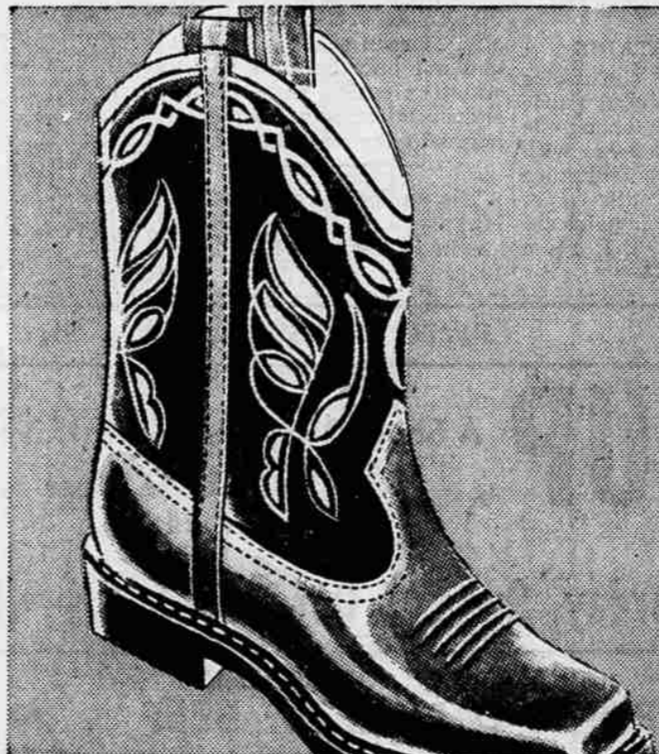
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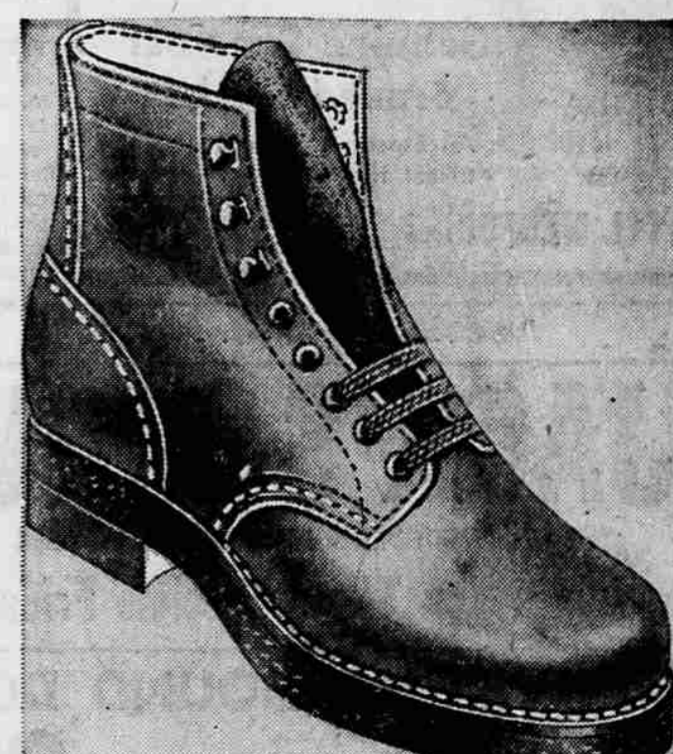
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
