

Iowa Holds Big 10 Lead In Offense

Chicago - (UPI) - Iowa jumped off to a commanding lead in Big Ten team offense with its win over Indiana last week, official conference statistics showed today.

The Hawkeyes piled up 503 yards in 85 plays to average 5.92 yards per play.

Michigan State, on the basis of its tie with Michigan two weeks ago, holds the top berth in defensive statistics, having allowed only 131 yards from scrimmage.

Iowa is second in defensive figures. The Hawkeyes allowed Indiana only 140 yards but two Hoosier touchdowns counted against the Hawks in defensive ranking.

Gophers 350 on Ground

Minnesota recorded 330 yards against Northwestern last week, 220 on the ground, while Ohio State posted a total scrimmage gain of 290 yards against Illinois.

Although Wisconsin scored 31 points against Purdue, the Badgers, who threw only three times and recorded no passing yardage, rank fourth in offense.

In individual statistics, Dick Thornton of Northwestern holds the lead in total offense while Randy Duncan and Ray Jauch of Iowa top passing and rushing.

Thornton recorded 138 yards against Minnesota, 109 by passing and 27 by rushing. Duncan completed nine of 13 passes for an average of .692, accounting for 104 yards. Jauch, with a 64-yard run to his credit against Indiana, posted 108 yards by rushing.

Sisler Gets Portion of Series Fund

New York - (UPI) - The Yankees sliced their World Series melon like world champions, but they're pikers alongside the Pirates.

Maintaining their traditional World Series generosity, the Yankees cut in such part-timers as Sal Maglie, Virgil Trucks and Murry Dickson for huge chunks in the division of the series spoils made public by Commissioner Ford Frick Thursday.

All told, 32 members of the Yankees will each collect a full share of \$8,759.10 in the mail today while 31 members of the losing Braves each will receive \$5,896.08.

The Pirates, who finished second to the Braves in the National league race, came through with the most generous gesture of the year—and maybe even in World Series history—when they voted a full share of \$1,507.04 to their batting instructor, George Sisler.

Not Regular Coach

Sisler, a Hall of Famer, is not a regular member of the Pittsburgh coaching staff but he puts in long hours teaching Pirate batters how to hit, is immensely popular with all of them and the size of his share was a token of their appreciation.

"I think this is the first time a batting coach ever was so appreciated," Frick said. "I think it's a fine thing."

Frick also said he thought both the Yankees and Braves were "very generous" with their splits.

The Yanks voted a half share \$4,379.54 to Maglie although he left the club June 14; three-quarters of a share \$6,569.33 to Dickson, who joined them Aug. 22 and full shares to Trucks and Duke Maas, who were obtained from Kansas City on June 15.

The Braves listed financial awards to several non-players, including door men and parking lot attendants at Milwaukee's County Stadium.

Webfoots Seeking Third Triumph In Coast Loop

Eugene - (UPI) - Coach Len Casanova's Oregon Webfoots go after their third straight Pacific Coast Conference football victory here Saturday against the Washington State Cougars.

Oregon is ranked the seventh best defensive team and the eighth best offensive team in the nation and leads the PCC in both total offense and total defense. Washington State is second in the PCC in offense and defense and its Bobby Newman is the nation's leading passer.

Limited Duty

Newman, hurt against Idaho last week, is expected to see at least some limited

action. He has a capable replacement in Davey Wilson.

The Cougars, beaten twice in four games, are 2-1 in the PCC and still nourish Rose Bowl hopes. They've lost to California and beaten Idaho and Stanford in conference games and lost a one-point decision to Northwestern of the Big Ten. Saturday's game here could make or break them.

Casanova has warned his warriors not to let down. Oregon has been "up" for its last two games, against Oklahoma and Southern California.

A Homecoming crowd of more than 20,000 is expected.

Beamer, Bates Might Be Able To Give OSC Boost

Corvallis - (UPI) - Deflated Oregon State, with fullback Nub Beamer back on the traveling squad and tackle Ted Mates hopeful of seeing action, planned for Lewiston, Idaho, this afternoon.

The Beavers meet the Idaho Vandals at Moscow Saturday afternoon in their third Pacific Coast conference football game of the season.

Both Beamer and Bates were on the sidelines last

Saturday as Oregon State dropped a 28-0 decision to underdog Wyoming.

Coach Tommy Prothro, plagued by injuries all season, hopes the two stalwarts will be able to help provide the impetus necessary to get the Beavers on the comeback trail. Jim Stinnette, the other top fullback, may start in the backfield Saturday along with shifted Dainiard Paulson at tailback, John Horrillo at wingback, and Gary Lukehart at quarterback. Leon Criner will open at tailback if Oregon State kicks off.

Idaho, 1-3 for the season, will outweigh the Beavers up front and will have its one-two passing punch of Joe Espinoza and Gary Farnworth along with rugged fullback Ken Hall, Bob Dehlinger of the Vandals also is the nation's seventh-ranked pass receiver.

Oregon State, 2-2 for the season is 1-1 in PCC play.

Undeclared Records To Be Risked in PCC

West Coast football season reaches the half-way mark this week end with Oregon and California putting their perfect Pacific Coast conference records on the line against Washington State and Southern California in the featured tilts.

California, eligible for the Rose Bowl, has won two games in a row, but is a three-point underdog to the Trojans from USC. However, Coach Pete Elliott has his split-T formation working, finally, and a Golden Bear victory wouldn't be out of line. The Trojans, after winning their first game from Oregon State, 21-0, have lost to Michigan, North Carolina and Oregon—the latter by a 25-0 score.

Oregon, Rose Bowl entrant last year and not eligible for the annual drubbing from the Big Ten this season, takes on a puzzler in the Washington State squad.

Disappointing Cougars

The Cougars started off the year with a 40-6 route of Stanford. But since then they have lost to Northwestern and California and barely squeezed by Idaho last week, 8-0.

Good news hit the WSC camp in mid-week when it was announced that quarterback Bobby Newman, who had been on the injury list, will be back in action.

In another important game, Washington tries a comeback against UCLA. The Huskies, who had looked powerful in downing San Jose State and Minnesota and barely losing to Ohio State, were upset by Stanford last week. UCLA coaches have announced that they will try a flanker with their single wing in an attempt to throw the Husky defense off balance. This game will be televised over NBC in the West.

Beavers Picked

The fourth PCC game involves Oregon State and Idaho. The Beavers are heavy favorite, but the Vandals have given a good account of them-

selves in most games this year.

The Beavers have been the disappointment of the PCC season. They were supposed to be heavily laden with tal-

ent. But injuries have cut their strength and they have taken beatings from USC and last week, Wyoming, 28-0.

Fullback Nub Beamer, out with injuries, will be in shape for this contest.

In major intersectionals, Stanford plays host to the Air Force Academy, and College of Pacific tangles with Cincinnati. Two perfect records

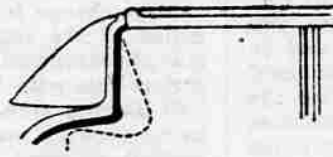
go on the line here.
