Drivers Licenses Suspended Listed

Salem - The department of motor vehicles has released names of 454 drivers whose licenses were ordered suspended during the period beginning Oct. 6 and ending Oct. 10.

Length of suspension varies, depending on charges involved, recommendation of court, discretionary action by the department or requirements of Oregon law. The department said some of the licenses involving financial responsibility and court recommendations may have been reinstated after suspension was ordered.

The department warned drivers that the penalty for driving while suspended is a jail sentence of no less than two days and up to six months, and there may be imposed a fine up to \$500. Under licensing procedures, this will also result in an additional year of suspension.

Japanese Find Jars Said 10,000 Years Old

Chiba, Japan - Japanese archeologists reported today the finding of eight ancient earthen jars they said may be the oldest in the world.

Scholars of Tokyo and Meiji universities said the jars may be more than 10,000 years old. They planned chemical tests to confirm their estimates.

The oldest known earthenware discovered so far is reported to be a 7,000-year-old find in Egypt.

Butler, Alcorn Debate; Shout on Integration Item

Chicago - (UPI) - Democratic National Park Chairman Paul Butler and his Republican counterpart, Meade Alcorn, debated good-naturedly for more than two hours Thursday night, then erupted into a shouting match on the question of integration.

Alcorn and Butler covered a wide range of subjects in their appearance before a dinner meeting of the Radio-Television News Directors association, trading quips much of the time.

Butler termed the integration controversy the nation's "great domestic crisis" and predicted it would "probably lead to a third party movement in the South" among Democrats by 1960.

"This is because the Democratic Party as a whole will not tolerate the Faubus (Arkansas Gov. Orval E. Faubus) kind of un-American attitude," Butler said.

Angry Argument Butler touched off the angry argument over integration when he quoted Lee Potter, chairman of the Virginia State Republican Committee and aide to Alcorn, as saying "our party is for segregation."

Alcorn interrupted to say Potter was speaking for the Virginia GOP party and not the party's national position. The GOP chairman went on to ask:

"If your party is so much for civil rights, Mr. Butler, where are you going to repudiate Faubus of Arkansas, Almond of Virginia and Eastland, Sparkman and Byrd?"

"And when you do that, how many members of the Senate are going to be left to listen to you?"

Butler countered by saying he would "repudiate the gentlemen you named as soon as you repudiate the five Southern Republican Congressmen who signed the Southern Manifesto of 1957, protesting the Supreme Court decision outlawing school segregation."

Rescue Crew Tries To Reach Plane

Christchurch, N. Z. - (UPI) - Rescue workers fought 40 below zero cold Thursday to reach the side of a giant U.S. Air Force Globemaster transport plane that crashed in the Antarctic wastes. Six of the 13 men on board were killed and "several" of the seven survivors were reported critically injured.

The plane crashed early today as it was attempting a supply air drop to a U.S.-New Zealand base at Camp Hallett. In the crash, a load of lumber on board apparently shifted position on impact and smashed into the men on the cargo deck of the big C124. Emergency SOS signals were sent out automatically by a battery-powered radio on the wrecked plane, and air and overland rescue efforts started at once.

Three weasels, with medical assistance and supplies, started out from Camp Hallett for the crash scene, 30 miles to the north. But en route one of the weasels tumbled into a crevasse and the other two tracked vehicles were slowed down to two miles an hour by rough country. Bitter cold also hampered the rescue efforts.

St. Louis, Mo. - Former President Truman complimenting President Eisenhower for learning "at last" that foreign policy should be kept out of political campaign speeches:

Vatican Officials Seek Iron Stove

Vatican City - (UPI) - Vatican officials raced against time today to find the little iron stove used to announce to the world that a new pope has been chosen.

Vatican sources admitted Thursday night that the stove, last used 19 years ago to announce the election of Pope Pius XII, was missing. Every storehouse in Vatican City has been searched without finding a trace.

The age-old stove has been used in several conclaves to burn the ballots of the electing cardinals. When a new pope is chosen, the cardinals mix the ballots with dry straw and a white smoke rises above the Sistine Chapel to announce the news.

If the vote fails to gain a majority, the ballots are mixed with wet straw to yield black smoke.

Church sources said that if the stove is not found in time to be installed by the Oct. 25 opening of the conclave, a new one will be used.

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
