'Twenty-One' Quiz Show Cancelled

New York - (UPI) - "Twenty-One," the quiz show once rated the top television program in the country, was seen for the last time Thursday.

The National Broadcasting company announced cancellation of the big money quiz three hours before it went on the air. Along with other TV quiz programs it had come under investigation on charges contestants had been fed questions and answers in advance.

Added to "fix" charges against "Twenty-One" were steadily dwindling ratings. At the height of its popularity, the expensive quiz show that dispensed multiple thousands of dollars swept all audience measuring poles, but in recent months its popularity waned.

The NBC announcement late Thursday said the show would be replaced Oct. 30 by "Concentration," a game program, to be sponsored by Pharmaceuticals, Inc., sponsors of "Twenty-One."

With the airing of "Twenty-One," only "The \$64,000 Question" (CBS) remained of the quiz giants. There have been persistent reports that "Question," which only recently moved into a Sunday night spot, also would be dropped soon.

Produced by Jack Barry and Dan Enright, "Twenty-One" made its debut on Sept. 12, 1956, with Barry as host. Its first big-money winner was college instructor Charles Van Doren, who perspired his way to fame and \$129,000 in an isolation booth.

Van Doren is now under contract to NBC as a performer.

Top winner on the show was Elfrida Von Nardorff, who stayed in the isolation booth for weeks and finally won \$223,000.

First of the quiz shows to go after Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan began investigating them was "Dotto." It was dropped after charges made by Edward Hilgemeier Jr.

Young Crooner Charges Milton Berle Fired Him

Hollywood - (UPI) - A handsome young crooner charged today that Milton Berle fired him from his television show because he wouldn't listen when the comedian "tried to teach me how to sing."

"I'm already listed for next week's show in TV Guide, but as far as I know I'm out of a job," dark-haired Tony Roberts, 24, told United Press International.

Berle, who returned to TV last Oct. 8 after a three-year layoff, denied the charges. He admitted Roberts originally was scheduled to appear next Wednesday but said:

"We just felt there would be too many men on the show. We have Carl Sandburg and the Jordanares all set for it."

Berle said he expected Roberts to appear on his Nov. 5 show, but the singer's personal manager, Ed Kelly, said he wanted no more to do with the comedian.

Ex-President Truman Arrives in Washington to Campaign

Washington - (UPI) - Former President Truman arrives here today on the political trail only a few hours after President Eisenhower leaves for a campaign junket to the West Coast.

The former Democratic president was expected to get down to issues immediately at a lunch honoring Mrs. Truman and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

Domestic issues appeared certain to dominate the speeches of both Truman and Eisenhower in the next few days. Truman has put himself at odds with some members of his party by backing Eisenhower's Quemo-Matsu foreign policy, while the President said at his news conference this week that "foreign policy ought to be kept out of partisan debate."

Ike Clears Confusion
Some confusion over this remark as it affected the campaigning of Vice President Richard M. Nixon apparently was cleared by the President Thursday when he gave Nixon an unqualified go-ahead to strike back at Democratic campaign criticism of administration handling of foreign policy.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles on Tuesday had deplored the injection of the Quemo crisis into the current campaign, and Dulles' remarks were interpreted in some quarters as an oblique swipe at Nixon.

Dulles later issued a statement declaring Nixon had every right to answer the Democratic criticism. The President, in his statement, said Dulles' statement "should clear the atmosphere."

Truman, interviewed during a brief stopover at St. Louis, Mo., en route to Washington Thursday night, complimented the President for learning "at last" that foreign policy should be kept out of political campaign speeches.

But Truman noted that "people are frustrated over foreign policy and particularly farm policy. Those living

in agricultural states are worried, and they've got a right to be."

Eisenhower sets out today on a 5,000-mile political expedition to add muscle and unity to the Republican election campaign. First stop on his winging visits with the voters was this afternoon at Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

His major effort will come in California, where he will be trying to patch up GOP family differences and pick up election prospects for the Republican ticket there.

Nixon, in a speech Thursday night at Salt Lake City where he was continuing his Far West swing, said it was the responsibility of administration cabinet members—not the secretary of state—to get out and fight for Republican policies during the closing weeks of the election campaign.

Predicts Vote Shift
He said "hundreds of thousands of votes will be shifted from the Democratic to Republican candidates in key House and Senate races" if the members of the President's cabinet would "fight... effectively and articulately for their policies."

Two cabinet officers did speak up. In a speech at Muskegon, Mich., Thursday night Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell said labor reform legislation would be the first order of business next January if voters elect a Republican Congress Nov. 4. He

dared Democratic congressional leaders to make the same promise.

He also charged Democrats had created a campaign issue by falsely accusing Republi-

cans of killing compromise labor reform legislation last session. "House Democrats treated labor reform legislation like a skunk at a picnic," Mitchell declared.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, in a speech prepared for delivery today at Chicago, said the Eisenhower administration had

turned back "a tidal drift toward a socialized agriculture."

He said the administration had waged "a long hard fight to change farm legislation to a basis of sound economic principles and away from political expediency. Farmers have had about all the political panaceas they can take."

Pear Tree Spray Recommended Now

All pear trees should be sprayed before the fall rains come, recommended Clifford B. Cordy, county horticultural agent.

Purpose of such a spray is to control a canker which attacks the limbs and trunks of young pear trees, Cordy said. As long as the bark is smooth the tree is susceptible to this disease, Cordy said. Older trees with rough bark are rarely affected.

Recommended dosage is eight pounds of 50 per cent neutral copper and two ounces of X-77 per 100 gallons of water. The trunk and larger branches should be thoroughly sprayed with this solution. Spraying of the young wood is not necessary, the horticultural agent said.

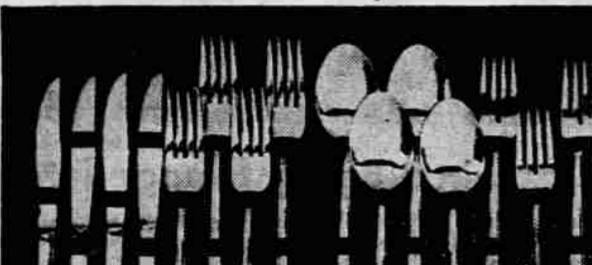
