

Washington State Outplays Oregon for 6-0 Victory

Eugene, Ore. — (UPI) — Inspired Washington State used injured Bobby Newman long enough to get one touchdown and outplayed favored but futile Oregon throughout Saturday for a 6-0 Pacific Coast conference football victory on rain-soaked Hayward field before 18,500 homecoming fans.

Newman, the nation's leading passer, came into the game in the second period and on his first play threw a key 12-yard pass to Chuck Morrill to keep an 88-yard touchdown drive going.

Morrill, a human battering ram who wrecked Oregon's usually strong defense, teamed with Halfback Keith Lincoln to drive to the one-foot line. From there, Newman, his left leg encased in tape, plunged to the game's only score.

The victory gives Washington State a 3-1 record in PCC play and puts the Cougars strongly back in the running for the Rose Bowl.

A star along with Morrill Saturday was Bill Steiger, Washington State's great end-halfback who was outstanding on both offense and defense. Steiger ran 19 yards from punt formation to start the Washington State scoring drive and twice more during the game he made first downs from the same formation.

Washington State completely dominated the first half that Oregon had only 11 yards rushing and 27 from passing. The Cougars had three other golden scoring chances, driving to the Oregon eight, the seven and the two. Dick Cople missed a Washington State field goal try in the first period and late in the half a Newman to Morrill handoff was fumbled on the Oregon two.

Oregon, looking little like the nation's 14th ranked team and the seventh best in defense, got a break in the third period when Dave Fish recovered a fumble on the Washington State 11, but Steiger broke up a fourth down pass. Late in the game, Oregon, led by a 35-yard pass from Dave Grosz to Charlie Tourville, got to the Cougar six after a long march but the Cougars again held.

Morrill, who also starred on defense, had 69 yards in 15 carries in Washington State's first half.

Morrill wound up with 77 yards in 18 carries. Oregon finished with a net total of only 150 yards rushing and passing.

Novikov Victor In Pentathlon
Aldershot, England — (UPI) — Igor Novikov, a Russian sports instructor who almost never smiles, was mighty pleased over his record-breaking performance in the world pentathlon championship.

The 29-year-old Soviet athlete scored a record 4,924 points in walking off with the individual title Friday for the second straight year. Sweden's Lasse Hall set the old mark of 4,833 points during the 1956 Olympics.

Novikov's brilliant performances in the five-event competition enabled Russia to retain the team title with 14,146 points. Hungary was second with 13,022. Finland finished third with 12,452 and the United States wound up fourth with 12,310.

Foes of SF, LA Favored In Pro Play

The Baltimore Colts, Cleveland Browns and New York Giants must break a National Football league jinx to win their Sunday games.

During the six-game program, those three clubs play teams they already have defeated this year by large margins. The Colts, Browns and Giants are favored, but NFL clubs have a tough time defeating the same rival twice in a season.

Of the teams that won the first 30 of the 60 home-and-home games last year, only 12 went on to win the second meeting.

Cleveland (3-0) is a 9 1/2-point favorite to defeat the visiting Pittsburgh Steelers 12-7. The Browns won their first 1958 clash with the Steelers. 45-12. Baltimore (3-0) invades Detroit and is a 4 1/2 point favorite to tame the Lions (0-2-1). Baltimore opened its season with a 28-15 victory over Detroit. New York (2-1) opened with a 37-7 victory over the Chicago Cardinals (1-2) and is a 5 1/2 point choice to down the visiting midwestern club again.

Sunday's Western division feature pits the Los Angeles Rams (2-1) against the Bears (2-1) at Chicago. The Bears are favored by 5 1/2 points.

In inter-division games, the Eagles (1-2) are 1 1/2 point choices to defeat the San Francisco Forty-Niners (1-2) at Philadelphia and the Redskins (1-2) are favored over the Green Bay Packers (0-2-1) by 6 1/2 points at Washington.

Utah State Gets 27-14 Victory
Missoula, Mont. — (UPI) — Utah State exploded for four touchdowns, two of them in the final two minutes of play, to defeat Montana State University 27-14 before 7,500 homecoming fans.

The Grizzlies took an early lead in the first half but fell apart and the Utah offense found openings good for three touchdowns.

Montana opened with a second quarter touchdown by Junior fullback Joe Pepe who plunged over the Utah one yard line. Halfback Russ Grant ran the extra point and Montana held an 8-0 halftime lead.

Utah State's powerful ground game began to roll in the second half and early in the third quarter the Aggies drove for their first touchdown when halfback Buddy Allen circled right end for a 14 yard scoring run.

The Aggies knotted the score when quarterback Rolfe Kerr passed to halfback Don Schieff.

The two teams slugged it out near the midfield during the remainder of the third quarter before the Grizzly defensive unit fell apart in the final stanza.

New Mexico Tips Arizona
Albuquerque, N. M. — (UPI) — New Mexico mixed passes with the sensational running of Don Perkins to grind out 434 yards and smash Arizona, 33-13, Saturday before a homecoming crowd of 13,500.

Perkins, who went into the game the nation's second best rusher, gained 138 yards in 12 carries, including a 79-yard touchdown run. He also took a pass to complete a 54-yard scoring play.

UCLA Victor Over Washington 20-0

Seattle, Wash. — (UPI) — Don Long wound up his college football career Saturday by running and passing UCLA to a 20-0 Pacific Coast conference victory over the University of Washington on a wind-swept and rain-lashed field before 33,500.

Winds ruined the last five minutes of Washington's homecoming day. But Long already had ruined the first 55 minutes.

Long was one of six UCLA seniors who were limited to five games this year because of penalties imposed on the Los Angeles school by the PCC, and he made sure that he would be remembered by Washington for a long time to come.

The tailback from Beverly Hills, Calif., accounted for 157 of UCLA's 244 total yards. In the first half alone, Long's running and passing resulted in all but 14 of UCLA's total of 250 yards.

UCLA took the opening kickoff and marched 78 yards in 12 plays with Long's ground - aerial operation accounting for all but two yards of the drive, including the 22-

yard touchdown pass to Marv Luster into the end zone.

On the first play of the second period Long passed eight yards to Jim Steffen, in the end zone, but that effort was nullified by an illegal use of hands penalty. So, Long and Steffen repeated the performance on the next play, only this time from 23 yards out. This touchdown was set up by a 51 yard pass from Kirk Wilson to John Brown.

Long's understudy, Chuck Kendall, passed nine yards to Don Wallen, who also played his last game Saturday, in the third quarter for the last UCLA touchdown. The score was set up when tackle Bill Leeka, another senior playing his last game, went high in the air to intercept quarterback Bob Hivner's pass on the Washington 34.

UCLA kept Washington's split-T attack bottled up. The Huskies never did set up a serious scoring threat and the only time the Washington defense really sparked came in the final period when they pushed UCLA for the Husky 19 back to the Bruins' 43 and forced a punt.

Golden Bears Beat Trojan Team 14-12
Los Angeles — (UPI) — University of California, outplayed most of the game, capitalized on fumbles by butter-fingered Southern California backs Saturday to score a 14-12 Pacific Coast conference win before 34,872 fans in Memorial coliseum.

The powerful Southern California defenses bottled up California's Joe Kapp most of the game while the Trojans turned loose their "mystery" back, Angelo Coia, for the first time this season, and he proved no disappointment.

Five key fumbles proved costly for the Trojans, handing the Bears one touchdown and preventing USC from possibly scoring the go-ahead TD in the final period.

But for the fourth quarter fumble, California would have never gotten-out of its territory in the second half.

As it was, Southern Cal's inability to score the extra point conversions cost them their third game and fourth consecutive loss.

Eagles Net 12-6 Win Over BYU

Provo, Utah — (UPI) — North Texas State, the nation's second most effective defensive team, scored a narrow 12-6 victory over Brigham Young University here Saturday before 6,594 fans at Cougar stadium.

The Eagles, who had held all opponents to an 80-yard average in four games, scored touchdowns in the first and third quarters to notch their fourth win in five games. BYU suffered its third consecutive loss for a 2-3 season record.

The first half was largely a defensive battle — NTS' favorite game — with the Eagles holding a 6-0 edge.

Montana State Gets 2-0 Win
Bozeman, Mont. — (UPI) — A sputtering Montana State college offensive that netted 21 first downs but only two touchdowns snapped Idaho State's winning streak at 16 games before a homecoming crowd of 8,500 fans Saturday afternoon.

Montana State, carrying a string of four consecutive wins into the game, was harassed and forced to come from behind as Idaho State's Bengals played dogged defensive football and took advantage of all the breaks they got.

A gusty wind, sometimes reaching 50-miles per hour, hampered the passing attack of both teams and was a factor in the scoreless first half.

The only serious scoring threat was by the Bobcats who took the ball on a poor kick by Idaho's Keith Berry on the ISC 48 yard line. Montana drove most of the way on the ground to a first down on the Bengal 10 but fell short by one yard of hitting paydirt.

One of the Bobcat's seven fumbles halted another drive on the ISC 16 yard line in the second quarter.

Utes Drive To 20-6 Victory
Salt Lake City — (UPI) — Down-trodden Utah unleashed a successful scoring drive in the final two minutes Saturday and then stopped a Denver scoring thrust on the one-inch line as the game ended to gain a 20-6 Skyline conference victory over the Pioneers.

A homecoming crowd of 17,536 fans saw the wild contest under overcast skies in Ute stadium.

Most of the action was crammed into the final two minutes of the contest.

Quarterback Lee Grosscup gave the Utes a 20-6 lead by hitting little Stan Uyeshiro in the end zone with a five-yard pass. The play came on a fourth down with five yards to go. Dick White kicked the conversion.

The touchdown came with one minute and 57 seconds remaining in the game, and many fans began filing out of the stadium believing that Denver would be unable to cross the Ute goal.

Irish Pat Pounds Canadian in Ring

New York — (UPI) — Pat McMurry, the redeeming United States heavyweight who was saved from a possible knockout by the "image of Gene Tunney," will get another fight soon at Madison Square Garden because of his upset decision over Canadian champion George Chuvaleo.

The opponent probably will be fourth-ranked contender Nino Valdes of Cuba in late November or early December.

Before ex-Marine Sergeant McMurry of Tacoma, Wash., took charge in the third round Friday night and gave 10th-ranked Chuvaleo a bloody beating, he was staggered by a terrific Chuvaleo left hook in the second session.

"The instant that punch knocked me groggy," unranked Irish Pat said today, "the image of Gene Tunney popped up in my mind, and I ran like a thief until my head cleared."

Broke U. S. Loss Streak
After that, the rangy boxer puncher from the Northwest hammered out a lopsided victory that ended the most disastrous four months for United States heavyweights in ring history. He broke our losing streak in international heavyweight competition at eight straight since June 15.

The more experienced McMurry, 26, who at 188 1/2 spotted Chuvaleo 18 1/2 pounds, gave the big, bull-shouldered 8-5 favorite from Toronto, Ont., such a bloody beating it seemed Dr. Alexander Schiff might order the bout stopped at the end of the seventh and ninth rounds.

The three ring officials favored McMurry, 8-1-1, 7-3 and 8-2, as he registered his 30th victory in 33 bouts. The United Press International agreed, 8-2.
