

# Oregon State Booms Back To Defeat Idaho 20-6

Moscow, Idaho - (UPI) - Oregon State spotted stubborn Idaho an early lead and then boomed back through a wind and rain storm to defeat the Vandals 20-6 in a Pacific Coast conference game Saturday.

The Beavers' Fullback Nub Beamer, Halfback Jim Stinnette and Dainard Paulson, sparked a ground-eating attack which pulled them into the lead moments before the

half, and then won easily with their potent single-wing offense. It was Paulson who hit end Jerry Doman with an 18-yard pass which captured the lead late in the second period, and Stinnette racked up the longest run of the game early in the third when he galloped 55 yards to set the Beaver's game clincher.

Beamer and Stinnette wore down the strong Idaho line by booming up the middle for consistent yardage throughout. Beamer scored twice. Idaho spent most of the game withstanding the Oregonians' hard running assault but managed to take the lead early in the game after recovering a fumble deep in OSC territory.

Center Stan Fanning pounced on the ball on the 12 and five plays later Fullback Ken Hall plunged for the score from a foot out.

**Rear Back**  
The Beavers roared back to the two on short but consistent gains, but a penalty stopped the march. Then Center Doug Bashor intercepted an Idaho pass on the Vandal 46 and the State single wing began to roll.

Paulson ran the end for 18. Beamer plunged for 10, and then Paulson passed to Doman. Beamer plunged for two points and OSC led 8-6 at the half.

Oregon State tallied again early in the third period on a drive starting from its 45. Stinnette carried to his 45, then he hurried to middle, staggered but recovered his balance and raced to the Idaho 2 yard line before halfback Bob Dehlinger knocked him down. Stinnette injured his leg and left the game.

The Beavers ended the scoring moments later when they capped a 55 yard march in 10 plays. Beamer plunged the last foot.

Idaho marched to the OSC goal in the waning seconds but two tries from a yard out failed to cross for the score.

# GP Cavemen Bounce Ashlanders 33 to 7

Grants Pass — Grants Pass high broke a first quarter deadlock with a three-touchdown second canto here Friday night to dump the Ashland Grizzlies 33 to 7 and keep stride with Medford in the Southern Oregon conference football race.

Both the GP Cavemen and Medford have 2-0 standings in the circuit.

The Cavemen dominated the scrimmage action Friday, netting 294 yards while holding the Ashlanders to 49.

Grants Pass struck TD territory first in the game with Jack Dean going over the pay stripe three plays after Lyle Miller had recovered a fumble on the Grizzly 18. Ollie Woolsey kicked the conversion.

**Grizzlies Even**  
Ashland evened the score immediately with Steve Gray running back the kickoff 78 yards to the GP zone and Bob Voris kicking for the extra.

Oscar Nealy set up the first tally of the second quarter by bringing a punt back to the Ashland 12. Dean cracked from 10 yards out. A Dean cast to Nealy was good for 28-yards to give impetus to another touchdown. Dean rounded end for 10 yards and a TD. Woolsey added his second conversion. Dean chucked to John Fox for 20 yards and the third one and Woolsey's toe brought another

point. In the final chukker Gary Huneycutt snared an Ashland throw. Dick Hayes found Fox on a long pass to get in scoring range and Hayes bucked over for the marker.

First downs were in Grants Pass' favor, eight to three.

# Air Force Bombs Out Stanford

Stanford, Calif. - (UPI) - The Air Force Academy struck with equal power on the ground and through the air Saturday to subdue a stubborn Stanford eleven 16-0 before 40,000 fans.

Marching 59 yards in seven plays for a touchdown knocked at the Stanford door all day long in a game that was much more one-sided than the score indicates.

The Falcons had ball control all the way, with Mike Quinlan leading a fleet of fast-running backs and the Academy air attack-featuring Rich Mayo and Johnnie Kunzel — working to perfection. That was topped by the kicking performances from Kunzel and Johnny Pupich.

They were helped along by many Stanford fumbles, four of which were recovered by the Air Force.

The first score was set up when Stanford fumbled and the Air Force recovered on its own 38. Seven plays later Quinlan plunged over from the two.

That score held until the final quarter.

# Portland Fire Safely Quelled; Arson Possible

Portland - (UPI) - A fire in a vacant building Friday night at 820 SE Taylor st. was quickly extinguished without loss but police and fire investigators said yesterday it appeared to be the work of an arsonist.

If it was, it would be the 29th such blaze in the city since Aug. 9.

Authorities Friday called on artists at both Portland newspapers to sketch from a witness's description the face of an arson suspect seen at one of the set fires. The witness, Harry R. Price, described the man he had watched at the fire and artists George Hoerner of The Journal and Paul Craig of the Oregonian went to work. Police are using the resulting sketches in their intensive manhunt.

Price said the man jumped up and down and laughed gleefully as the flames shot into the sky at the Norene Tire Company fire Oct. 5.

# Special OSAA Committee Asks Objective Study on Problem Of Districting for Athletics

An immediate and objective study of the total problem of athletic districts and classification has been recommended to the Oregon School Activities association by a special committee which met last week.

OSAA consideration of constitutional chances permitting schools of one classification to make decisions on problems peculiar to their own classification was also proposed.

The committee, of which Medford School Superintendent Leonard Mayfield is a member was named to study a proposal for redistricting a number of Class A-1 high schools and to prepare a questionnaire for polling the schools.

Study of the total district problem in the state should be undertaken irrespective of the outcome of the current poll, a committee statement said. It asked that the matter of revision of districts and/or the advisability of new classifications be looked into. The committee suggested the study at the earliest possible date. Within Own Orbit

# Auburn's Winning Streak Ends Saturday; Three Teams Bowled Over in Grid Upsets

United Press International Army and Ohio State upheld their national ratings with ease Saturday but Auburn's 17-game winning streak was ended and three other top powers were bowled over like tennpins in a day of sensational football upsets.

The first-ranked Cadets, sticking primarily to the ground, swept aside out-manned Virginia, 35-6, and fourth-ranked Ohio State walloped Indiana, 49-8. The latter game at Columbus, Ohio, was enlivened when Ohio State

Coach Woody Hayes ran onto the field and protested that Indiana players were "piling on" and guilty of rough play.

Georgia Tech, meanwhile, punched over a touchdown in the fourth period to gain a 7-7 tie that ended Auburn's longest major college winning streak in the nation. The Engineers elected to try for a tie instead of a two-point conversion that would have meant victory and Tommy Wells came through with the tying one-pointer.

In three other major up-

sets, Iowa toppled Wisconsin from the unbeaten ranks, 20-9. 15th ranked Purdue defeated fifth-ranked Michigan State, 14-6, and Tulane sank the sixth ranked Navy, 14-6. Tenth-ranked Notre Dame narrowly avoided another upset with a 9-7 decision over Duke but Oklahoma, rebounding from the Texas upset, crushed Kansas, 43-0. The Sooners, ranked 11th last week, thus made a strong bid to break back into the top 10.

Army amassed 316 yards rushing and 141 passing and scored in every period in a business-like triumph over Virginia. The Cavaliers were held to 39 yards on the ground and made only 101 in the air although they completed 18 of 33 tosses. The Cadets scored on drives of 73, 68, 66 and 95 yards and added a fifth touchdown on a 24-yard interception.

Fullback Bob White scored Ohio State's first four touchdowns to lead the Buckeyes to their most impressive victory of the season. Three Ohio State touchdowns were set up by fumble-recoveries and two by interceptions.

Quarterback Fred Braselton intercepted a pass and then capped a 36-yard drive that cut Auburn's margin to 7-6 and set the stage for Well's tying conversion. Braselton completed three straight passes and then sneaked into the end zone himself for Georgia Tech's touchdown. Auburn took a 7-0 lead in the second period on Ed Dyas' two-yard plunge climaxing a 61-yard drive.

Iowa overcame a 9-0 half-time deficit with two third-period touchdowns, one after a fumble recovery and another after an interception. The Hawkeyes then clinched the game on a 68-yard scoring pass from Randy Duncan to Bob Jeter in the fourth period.

## Michigan State Leads Off

Michigan State took a 6-0 lead in the second period but Purdue tied the score when Len Wilson went four yards to climax a 58-yard drive in the same session. The Boiler-makers finally slipped the fifth-ranked Spartans the "mickey" with a 54-yard third period drive which ended when Bob Jarvis plunged over from the one-yard line. Bob Spoo passed for the two-point conversion that insured Purdue at least a tie.

Richie Pettibon scored from nine yards out at the end of an 83-yard drive and from one yard out after a 66-yard push to spark Tulane to its upset of Navy. The Sailors scored their touchdown in the second period on a 25-yard pass from Joe Tranchini to Joe Bellino.

Eighth-ranked Mississippi romped over Hardin-Simmons 24-0, with Halfback Jimmy Hall scoring two touchdowns; 9th ranked Notre Dame topped Duke on Monty Stickle's 21-yard third period field goal; Oklahoma crushed Kansas with 305 yards in the air; 15th-ranked Colorado whipped Iowa State, 20-0, as George Adams tallied two touchdowns; 18th ranked Pittsburgh beat West Virginia, 15-8, and Northwestern walloped Michigan, 55-24, in other games involving the country's top 20.

Seventh-ranked Texas played Arkansas and ninth-ranked Louisiana State met Kentucky in night games.

# Crater Outscores Yreka Miners 33-18

Central Point-Crater high, with Allen Barnes running hard and fast and scoring four touchdowns, out ran Yreka, Calif., 33 to 18 in a non-league grid hassle here Friday evening.

It was an offensive skirmish. The Comet attack moved surprisingly well while the defense had its troubles but held in crucial situations.

Quarter gaps for the Central Pointers were 13 to 0, 20 to 12 and 26 to 12. The schools came out almost even in total net scrimmage yardage with Crater's edge 320 to 311 but the Comets led 19 to 11 in home team.

The home team began a 75-yard touchdown barge after an exchange of interceptions. They needed 11 plays with Barnes being the last five and Barnes passed to Bob Fowler for the conversion. On the kick-off the Comet's Derell Williamson tackled the runner hard. The Miner fumbled and Williamson recovered.

The Comets went 40 yards to the goal. Allen went over from five yards away.

Yreka tabulated off a 65-yard drive with a 20-yard pass play. Jerry Dillen to Fred Wolgamott. Then for Crater, Barnes capped a 67-yard drive with a one-yard scoring play and Fowler ran for the bonus.

A Dillen to John Titus aerial for three yards was the point-making play of a 70-yard surge.

In the third quarter the Miners were halted on the Comet five. Crater drove back the whole 95 yards to score with Barnes making the last four. In the final canto Allen intercepted a Yreka throw and returned to the Miner 40. Barnes eventually scored on a two yard play. Fowler bucked the extra. Dillen passed to Joe Nichols for 15 yards and a touchdown to end a 55-yard march.

The Owls put their league win in the 1958 OCC book while handing the Red Raiders their first loss in two conference games.

OTI held the Ashlanders to a net scrimmage again of 8 yards, 43 running and 45 passing. The Klamath club had 13 first downs and Southern Oregon four. Owl touchdowns grossed in every quarter with one each in the first and third and two each in the second and fourth. At halftime it was 20 to 0.

# SAN DIEGO STATE TOPS PIONEERS 33-0

San Diego, Calif. - (UPI) - University of San Diego scored an impressive, 33-0, victory over Lewis and Clark college of Portland this afternoon in Balboa stadium.

Junior halfback Bob Keyes was the undisputed star of the contest, scoring three touchdowns and gaining nearly half of the winning team's total yardage. He scored on runs of 89, eight and two yards and set four school records despite a painful rib injury.

The former Antelope Valley junior college all-American gained 209 yards for an average of 12 yards per carry. He scored his first touchdown

in the opening period, following left end Merle Reed's play for the first points early in the game.

Keyes made points again in the second and third periods with frosh halfback Tom Gates adding the final tally in the last few minutes.

The Homecoming victory was the third of the year for San Diego against only one setback. The Pioneers obviously were no match for the Aztecs, lagging far behind in first downs and failing to resist the stronger team's advances.

# Governor Asks Log Truck Laws

Salem - (UPI) - Legislation regulating the log-hauling industry to protect truck operators from unscrupulous business practices and protect the highway-using public from dangerously operated or loaded trucks was asked Friday by Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

The Governor said this could be achieved through laws similar to those in the state of Washington.

Gov. Holmes said he has asked the Public Utility Commissioner to prepare legislation like Washington's.

"It would require that all log hauling on public highways would be under schedules of rates sufficient to cover all costs of operations, at moderate speeds, including complete safety maintenance of equipment," the Governor said.
