Miss Eula Wintermote, formerly home demonstration agent of Jackson county and presently serving in the same capacity for Linn county, will receive the Distinguished Service Award at the National Home Demonstration Agents' association convention to be held at the Drake Hotel in Chicago November 5.

The association traditionally recognizes one or more agents for outstanding service. Agents must have a degree in home economics and must have served 10 years or more in extension work.

Miss Wintermote has helped develop leadership workshops for organizations, consumer interest programs, food and nutrition projects, especially in weight control, and has cooperated with health and welfare service through the school lunch program, the announcement states.

After leaving Medford, Miss Wintermote studied at Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical college in 1957, receiving her master's degree in home economics. She then returned to Oregon and took over the Linn county work. While in Jackson county, Miss Wintermote was active in many civic and service organizations.
