## Hospital Auxiliary Grows in Scope

Volunteer work done by members of Rogue Valley Memorial Hospital auxiliary compares favorably with services performed by other auxiliary groups elsewhere in the state, according to the local president, Mrs. John Winton, Eagle Point. Four representatives from the Medford hospital attended the annual convention of the State Council of Hospital auxiliaries held at Gearhart October 13-14.

Reports and exhibits were presented from throughout the state, Mrs. Winton states, and few groups in other cities offer as many varied services as does the Rogue Valley auxiliary.

Also attending the convention, in addition to Mrs. Winton, were Mrs. C. E. McIntyre, Mrs. Glen O. Bessonet and Mrs. Shelby M. Tuttle, vice president of the state council. Mrs. Rex von Krohn of Grants Pass was elected president of the group for the coming year at this meeting.

Since its organization four years ago, the Rogue Valley auxiliary has maintained a growing list of "service groups" to perform various tasks to aid the hospital staff in providing better patient care and to add to the patients' comfort during convalescence. Such groups include the women who give daily attention to patients' flowers, and those

who operate the cart which is taken through the building regularly to offer magazines, personal items, stationery, etc., to patients, and coffee to staff members and visitors.

Each week the sewing group meets to make any needed items of hospital linen, and the surgical dressings unit rolls bandages. At the request of the hospital staff, women appear "on call" to help feed patients unable to feed themselves, or write letters for patients. Assistance in clerical work is given the hospital staff when needed.

Representatives of most of these groups will appear on a television program Wednesday, October 22, on KBES-TV, at 4:05 P.M. The women will demonstrate their work at that time.

Since moving into the hospital building on Barnett road last May, the auxiliary has operated the snack bar and gift shop adjacent to the lobby, and Mrs. Winton states that staff members and visitors have been enthusiastic in their acceptance. Recently, the auxiliary added an "information clerk" to the main desk to assist regular staff members in receiving visitors. These services operate during daytime and evening hours.

Outlying chapters have been added at different times, each group taking on a particular project for the hospital. Some of these are continuing, while others have completed their initial projects.

Other services offered include arranging for tray favors for all major holidays, maintaining a memorial fund for anyone wishing to make gifts in lieu of flowers, and assisting the hospital staff in their civil defense program of preparation for any possible disaster. For the past four years, the auxiliary has assumed responsibility for publicizing National Hospital week each spring, and assists the staff with various teas and social events.

The magazine contest is open to everyone, individuals and groups — Girl Scouts, Foods classes in schools, etc. between the ages of 13 to 20. The contest sponsored by COPCO for the 4-H groups is open to girls of all ages eligible for 4-H. COPCO is simply encouraging the 4-H groups, it is stated.

Most of the recipes entered in the COPCO contest will be sent on to the Seventeen magazine contest.

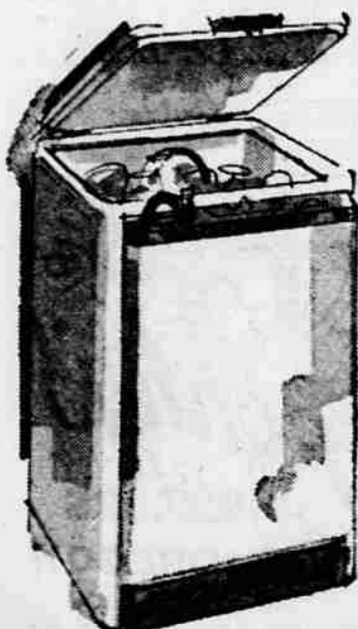
