Gold Hill Woman Honored On Birthday Anniversary

Gold Hill—Mrs. J. A. Bonny was honored at a party Sunday, October 12, in her home on Lampman road, given by members of her family in observance of her 75th birthday anniversary which occurred Tuesday, October 7.

Present for the occasion besides the honoree and her husband, were Mr. and Mrs. Harry Tibbitts and sons, Carl and Harry, and their daughter, Delores, all of Grants Pass, Mr. and Mrs. Rollin Woodford and son, Rollin Jr. and daughter, Nancy from Merlin, and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Boussum also of Grants Pass.

Mrs. Bonny is the mother of 10 children, six of whom are living, and has 20 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. A fact of which she is proud, is that last September 27 marked her 69th year as a resident of southern Oregon. She came here in 1889 from her birthplace of Wellington, Kans., with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Henry, who settled on a homestead site on Sterling Creek road three miles from the Rogue Valley's historic town of Jacksonville. Her father helped build one of Jacksonville's well known fine old homes which is still in use.

Recalls Early Life Mrs. Bonny recalled many interesting stories of her early life in Oregon. These included the one of her father's death, which she said was known to many of the old timers. When she was 11 years old, her family moved to one of Oregon's early landmarks, Steamboat, which at that time had a store and post office. It was located about six miles from Copper, then known at Watkins, which is nearly 30 miles from Jacksonville. Shortly after this time her father heard about an opening for a job as cook in a mining camp at Copper. He went to see about the work and while on the return hike to his home at Steamboat was lost in a blinding snow storm. She told of the posse of 50 men who searched the mountains for her father, finding him frozen to death. The family dog, still alive, had remained faithfully at his master's side for five nights and four days, and had not touched the food in the unheated lunch nearby. A path made by the dog around the body showed that the dog had protected his master's body from wild animals whose tracks were in the snow. This dog lived to be 16 years old.

Enjoys Garden Mrs. Bonny spends many leisure hours in her flower garden, in addition to having several interesting hobbies. One of her favorite pastimes is to prepare weeds, flowers, pine cones and other objects which she uses to create attractive dried winter bouquets. Her kitchen has a large planter, and she starts many small plants in individual pots.

Mrs. Bonny also makes wishing-well planters complete in every detail, using small shells and rocks, which she collects for this purpose. Mr. Bonny assists his wife with making redwood hanging baskets and redwood lamps.

The honored woman received messages from several of her children who were unable to visit her for the celebration. A son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Boussum, formerly of Alturas, Calif., left recently for a tour of the United States after spending the past summer vacation at several of southern Oregon's lakes and scenic spots. Their destination is Miami, Fla. where they plan to spend the winter. They have many friends in the valley.
