The Medical Roundup

LESSENING X-RAY EXPOSURES
At the recent meeting of the American Medical Association in San Francisco, the question came up of cutting down on X-ray exposures of patients. As Dr. Wendell G. Scott of St. Louis said, it is easy to cut down on the amount of radiation, especially in the cases of children and infants in whom it conceivably might do harm. Efforts should be made to cut down on the number of fluoroscopic examinations made with the x-ray screen, because the dose in that case is larger than that for an x-ray film. X-ray men are being more careful also to expose only that part of the body which is under examination. Exposures over the pelvis of women—where the ovaries are—are being held to a minimum. Films should never be made of the pelvis of a woman if there is any chance that she has just become pregnant. Today, the new fast x-ray films are cutting down greatly on the dosage of x-rays needed to get a picture. I personally can see no sense in scaring people about having their teeth x-rayed.

4 State Hospital Patients Escape

Salem—Four persons, including a Portland teen-ager accused in the beatings of women last fall, escaped from the Oregon State hospital Sunday night. The youth, Larry Robert Molstrom, 18, was described as dangerous by hospital officials. The others were not considered dangerous. The escape was made by cutting a hole in a screen in the receiving ward. Molstrom was admitted to the hospital after a psychiatric examination. He had been charged with three counts of assault with intent to kill.
