

# Gillman Wants To Forget Penalty, Tapping Charges

Los Angeles—UPI—Coach Sid Gillman of the Los Angeles Rams, refusing to take an easy way out to account for his team's loss to the Chicago Bears, said Monday he wanted to forget about charges of wire tapping and excessive penalties.

Gillman said at a Southern California Football Writers association meeting that he did not plan to protest the alleged wire tapping or the officiating at the Chicago game in which the Rams were penalized 100 yards in the first half and the Bears penalized only five yards. "Poor Football!" The coach, refusing to hide behind the penalty controversy as a means of explaining

the team loss, said "In my opinion we didn't play good football. Whether or not the penalties had anything to do with it is open to conjecture." However, he did suggest that the National Football league adopt a plan in which coaches could grade and ultimately reject officials believed to be doing an unsatisfactory job.

# California Bears Favorites; Split T Finally Clicking

San Francisco—UPI—What happens when a football team loses eight games in a row and then comes back to win the next three against tough competition?

Coach Pete Elliott's University of California Bears have done just that—and all of a sudden are playing the role of favorites to go to the Rose Bowl.

California finished off the 1957 season by losing five games in a row, the only victory out of 10 games last year being a 12-0 triumph over Southern California.

# Army Tops Ratings For Second Week

New York—UPI—Army was No. 1 in the United Press International college football ratings today for the second straight week but Ohio State replaced Auburn in second place in the wake of a wave of upsets.

Of the first 10 teams, only Army remained in the position it held last week. Iowa and Oklahoma moved back into the select group and Northwestern made its first appearance of the season in the top 10.

Army, a 35-6 victor over Virginia, received 23 first place votes and a total of 330 points from the 35 leading coaches who rate the teams for UPI. Ohio State advanced from fourth to second with eight first-place votes and 295 points as a result of its 49-8 victory over Indiana.

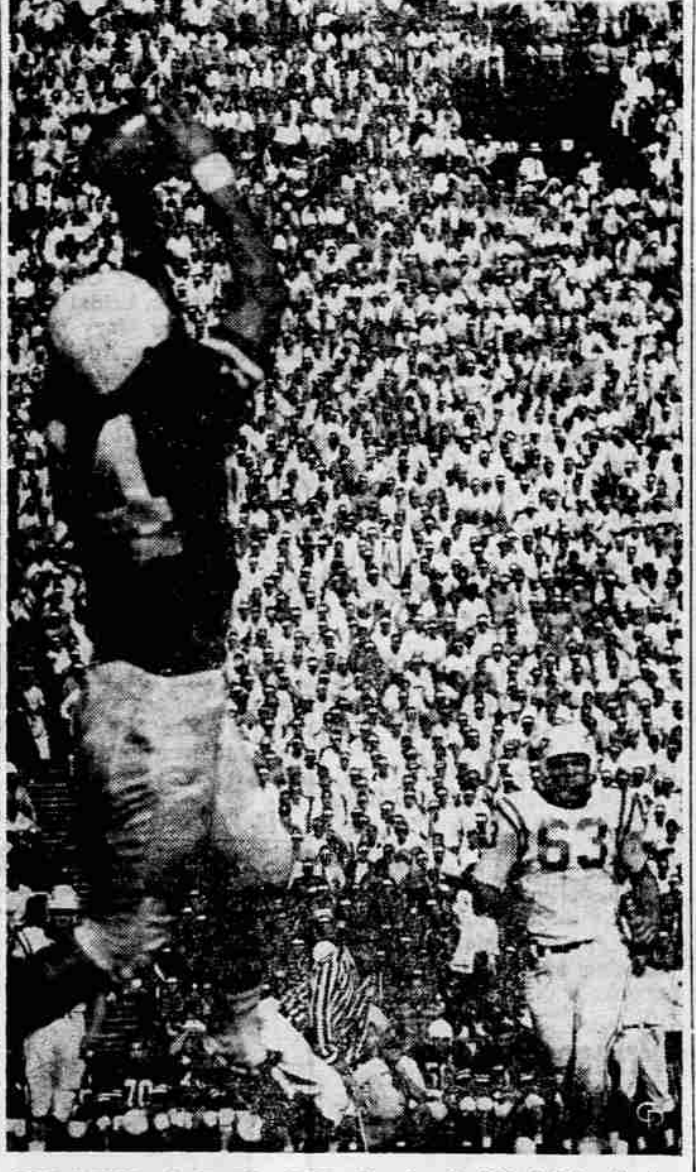

# Kramer Plans Independent Australian Tennis Tour

Los Angeles—UPI—Jack Kramer, miffed by 10 months of bickering with Australian tennis associations, today, put his pro tennis tours there independently.

With the pro tour next January in jeopardy as a result of the impasse, Kramer announced he was investing \$22,500 in a portable court and would use stadiums other

than those belonging to the tennis associations in Melbourne, Sydney and anywhere else he can't reach a fair agreement on rent and tickets.

# Sinclair Week's Sales Tax Proposal Draws Rejections

Washington—UPI—Treasury officials and the chairman of the Republican National Congressional committee today rejected Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks' plea for a national sales tax on manufacturers.

They asserted that the administration will not recommend such legislation despite Weeks' announcement that he will try to sell the President on the idea.

Weeks told reporters last Saturday that he will urge the administration to include in its legislative proposals next January a board uniform excise tax levied at the factory. He said federal revenue is too dependent on the income tax which falls off sharply in times of economic recession.

Speaks for Himself Weeks emphasized he was speaking only for himself. Nevertheless, the wide publicity given his statement in the closing weeks of the congressional election campaign had caused some dismay among GOP campaign strategists. They feared voters might tend to associate Republican congressional candidates with Weeks' advocacy of a new, and unpopular tax.

Rep. Richard M. Simpson (R-Pa.), chairman of the Republican National Congressional committee, took the lead in publicly repudiating Weeks proposal.

"I have been assured by officials in the Treasury department that the administration is not contemplating any recommendation to the Congress for the enactment of a new broadly based excise tax as recently mentioned by Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks," Simpson said.

Doubts Consideration This was confirmed by a United Press International reporter in private talks with top Treasury officials.

"We have no intention of recommending such a tax and haven't even been considering it," one official said. "You will note that Weeks said he was speaking for himself—well, he sure was!" Simpson, a key member of the tax-writing House Ways and Means committee, went on to say that in the absence of a recommendation from the administration he doubted that Congress would even

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# Youngster Said Emotionally Upset

New York—UPI—Melvin D. Nimer Jr., 8, who "confessed" the fatal stabbing of his parents, is suffering from an emotional disturbance but it will not prevent him from leading a normal life with his grandparents in Utah, the youth's attorney reported today.

The attorney, Harris B. Steinberg, said there was nothing in a psychiatric report he received from Bellevue hospital to indicate that Melvin ever had been hostile to his parents. The boy said he killed his parents in their Staten Island home Sept. 2, because of their strictness, but he later recanted the "confession." No one has been arrested for the crimes.

## USE JET PLANES

Santa Fe, Argentina—UPI—Smugglers are using jet planes to fly contraband into Argentina, police said today. They announced arrest of two men at a secret airfield used by the smugglers and seizure of a truckload of \$100,000 worth of contraband from the United States.

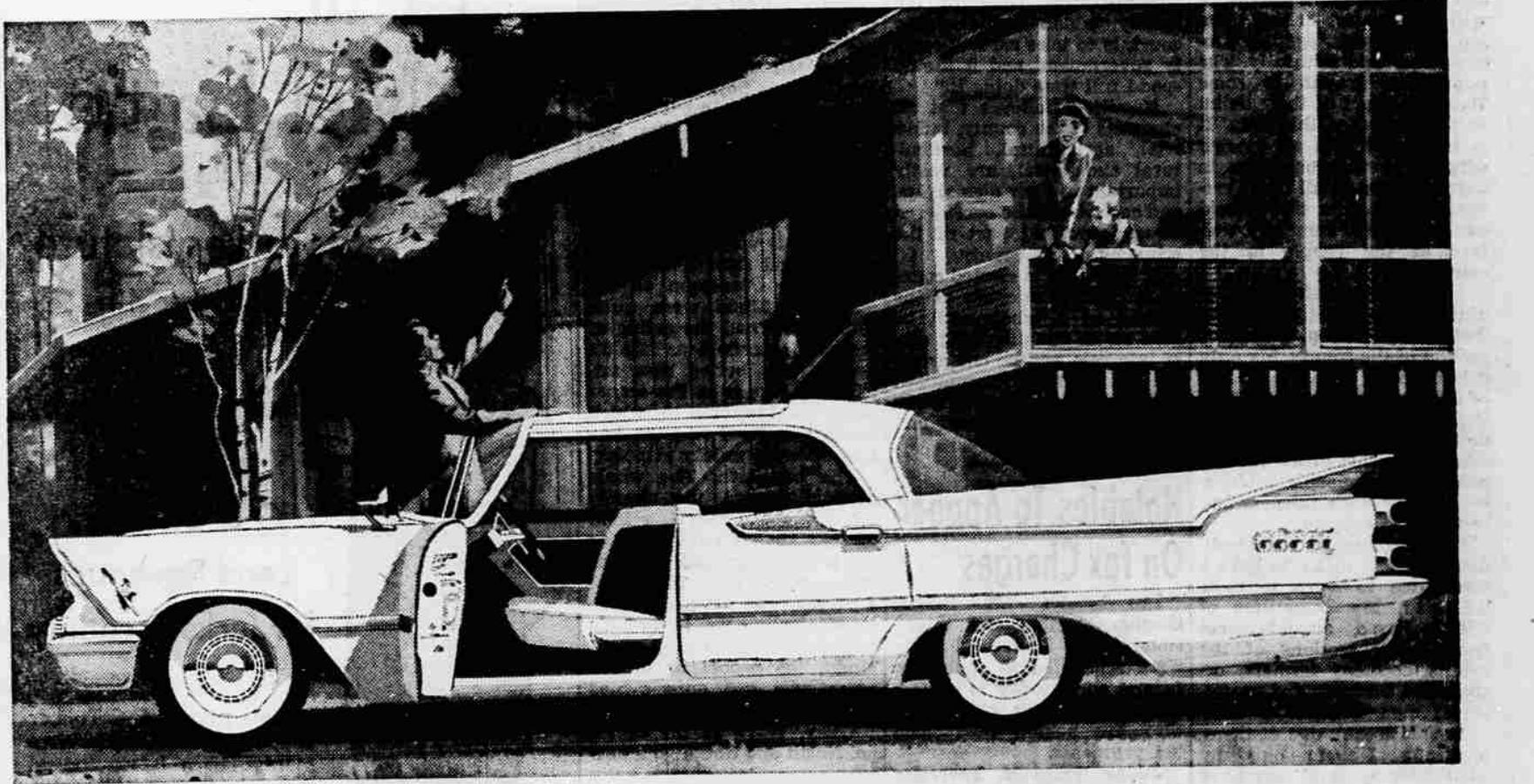
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
